TENNIS TEAH TO PLAY COLUMBIA ON MAY 23


The Milne Tennis Squad will play Columbia High on May 23. The game is to be played at Ridgefield Park.


The Annual Outing of Theta Mu Literary Society will take place at That-cher Park on Friday, May 30.
