Non-credit course offerings announced by the College of General Studies at State University of New York at Albany include a course in jewelry making and design, reading improvement, and an English course for speakers of other languages (ESOL).

The jewelry design course will be given by Kenneth Welch, a member of the art faculty and a graduate of the master's fine arts program of the Rochester Institute of Technology. The course will be given Tuesday and Wednesday evenings (6-8) for seven weeks, starting June 30.

The six-session reading improvement course, led by Mrs. John Tibbetts, will be held July 7 to August 11 from 1-3 p.m. on the uptown campus. Practice with reading machines, perception exercises, vocabulary improvement, directed reading with emphasis on finding main ideas, skimming, scanning, and fact retention--the course is designed to increase reading speed and comprehension. Records, graphs, and charts will be kept to show individual progress.

An evening course in English for speakers of other languages will be held three times a week for seven weeks starting June 29. The course will enable the student to take part in a variety of experiences and practice in conversation, pronunciation, grammar, writing, reading and vocabulary development. Emphasis will be placed on American English usage and idioms. The specific subject matter will be developed around areas of student interest Informal activities may include field trips and participation in cultural events in the vicinity. The course is designed for the intermediate-advanced level student who wishes to maintain and improve his skills in English.

Roger R. Revelle, Richard Saltonstall professor of population policy and director of the Center of Population Studies at Harvard University, will give the Sigma Xi Address at installation ceremonies for the State University of New York at Albany chapter of the Society of the Sigma Xi at 8 p.m., Thursday, May 14, in the Campus Center Ballroom. His topic will be "Ecology and Ethics."

Installing officer for the 4 p.m. ceremonies will be Frederick C. Lindvall, national president of the society. Other events planned are a reception at 5 p.m. for Dr. Lindvall and Sigma Xi delegates and an installation banquet at 6:15.

Dr. Revelle's research interests include oceanography, geology of the sea floor, natural resource analysis, and population study. He formerly was chairman of the committee on natural resources for the White House Department (1963-68) and has served as dean of science and engineering at the University of California at LaJolla (1958-61). He later was university dean at that institution.

The educator has been honored by Pakistan and India, as well as receiving the Albatross Medal from the Swedish Royal Society and the Agassiz Medal from the National Academy of Science. He also has served in several capacities for the United Nations.

The purpose of Sigma Xi is "the encouragement of original investigation in science, pure and applied." It offers national lectureships for its membership and grants-in-aid to young men starting new fields of research, and publishes the journal, American Scientist.

There are only about 150 chapters of the society in the United States, and approval of a chapter at Albany is seen as a tribute in part to the quality of the science and mathematics departments. It also denotes the strength of the graduate research programs undertaken by faculty and students.

During the six hours various displays and events will be presented by Milne students each of whom was responsible for planning and carrying through his own ideas.



At the 126th annual commencement exercises Sunday morning (June 7) at State University of New York at Albany, an estimated 1,600 degrees will be conferred by Acting President Allan A. Kuusisto.

For the first time the university, in cooperation with WMHT-TV, will broadcast the commencement exercises live. Coverage will begin at 9:30 a.m. on the local educational television, channel 17.

Bachelor degrees will be awarded to 1,100 candidates. Seven hundred three will receive bachelor of arts degrees and 393, bachelor of science degrees.

Master degrees will be awarded to 479 candidates. This year's master's degrees include arts, 168; science, 147; social work, 33; public administration, 25; business administration, 25; and library science, 78.

Doctoral degrees will be conferred on thirty candidates, an increase of nine over the number awarded last year. They include 17 doctor of education degrees and 13 doctor of philosophy degrees.

In the class of 1970 are 240 honor students. One hundred seventynine will be graduated cum laude; 50, magna cum laude; and 11, summa cum laude.

The commencement ceremony will take place at the Campus Center Mall beginning at 10 a.m. Prior to the program, the academic procession will move from the Campus Center to the mall beginning at 9:25. In the event of rain, two commencement exercises will be held in the physical education building; the undergraduate exercise at 10 a.m. and the graduate program at 1 p.m.

The traditional torchlight ceremony will be held Saturday evening at the ceremonial entrance to the academic podium beginning at 9 o'clock. Immediately following the ceremony, the President's Reception for graduates and families will be held on the Campus Center Terrace on the podium level.

Richard G. Johnson, a career Foreign Service officer, has been named by the U. S. State Department to serve as diplomat-in-residence at State University of New York at Albany for the next academic year. Most recently Mr. Johnson has served as counselor of embassy and deputy chief of mission in Sofia, Bulgaria, from 1967-1970.

During his year on the State University campus, the diplomat will be visiting professor of public affairs at the Graduate School of Public Affairs and senior fellow of the Comparative Development Studies Center. He is familiar with the French, German, Italian and Polish languages.

Mr. Johnson, a native of Connecticut, has a Yale B.A. and an M.A. from the School of Advanced International Studies at Johns Hopkins. He has served in Florence, Prague, Bad Homburg, Warsaw, Algiers, Asmara, Paris, and Brussels, in addition to Sofia.

During 1953-56, Mr. Johnson served in Washington in the U.S. Department of State Office of Eastern European Affairs (Polish, Baltic, and Czechoslovak section), and in 1964 he attended the NATO Defense College in Paris. In Brussels he served as political advisor for EURATOM affairs in the U.S. Mission to the European Communities.

State University of New York at Albany has appointed Dr. Jerome Eckstein as chairman of the newly-established department of Judiac Studies. For the past four years Eckstein has been professor of philosophy of education in the School of Education. Reportedly, the department is the only one at any of the SUNY units concerned with Judiac studies.

Dr. Eckstein attended two Jewish theological seminaries for 14 years. He received his Bachelor of Arts from Brooklyn College, with honors in philosophy and election to Phi Beta Kappa. Subsequently he completed three years of graduate study in psychology and one year in philosophy at the Graduate Faculty of the New School of Social Research. Later he attended Columbia University where he completed his doctoral studies.

An undergraduate major in the field of Judiac studies may be possible by September 1972. The program planned to be broad in scope is expected to integrate courses in language and literature; history, archaeology, and social sciences; and philosophy.

Prior to coming to the university, Professor Eckstein taught philosophy for three years at Columbia. For a similar period he also taught philosophy at Adelphi-Suffolk College, Adelphi University, where he was coordinator of the humanities division.

In 1968 a committee comprising students, faculty, and administration recommended the organization of a Judiac studies department. Also urged was a sequence of courses in Hebrew language which was offered for the first time during the fall semester last year.

Dr. Eckstein has published articles and reviews in a variety of journals: The Philosophy

Quarterly, The Journal for the Scientific Study of Religion, Judiasm, Commentary, Ethical

Theory and The Union Theological Seminary Quarterly Review.

He has also published a book, The Platonic Method: An Interpretation of the Dramatic
Philosophic Aspects of the Meno, which is in its second printing.
