

and find that the large recitation room adjoining the room occupied for the experimental school will be most convenient for the juvenile department, especially for the proposed course of object teaching, but that if this room, now occupied for classes of the normal school is used for this purpose, other rooms must be provided for those classes. This object can be secured by dividing the upper lecture room so as to make two rooms on the south end, and the classes will thus be much better provided with recitation rooms than they now are. The expense of the proposed alterations, together with the heating and furnishing, and supply apparatus for the proposed juvenile department, the Committee estimate at six hundred dollars.

Whereupon after full discussion of the subject the Committee was authorized to proceed with all the necessary arrangements at an expense not exceeding six hundred dollars.

The Committee then adjourned.

Prof. Cochran submitted several papers rec. commanding Mr. L. Roy C. V^b Mr. Woolworth in behalf of the Committee appointed to make alterations in the building as authorized at the last meeting of the Committee stated, that on a re-examination it was found that the proposed alterations could not be made for less than One thousand dollars. Whereupon and after full discussion, it was resolved that the Committee be authorized to expend that sum in the alterations which may be found necessary for the accommodation of the department proposed to be established in object teaching.

The Committee then adjourned.
