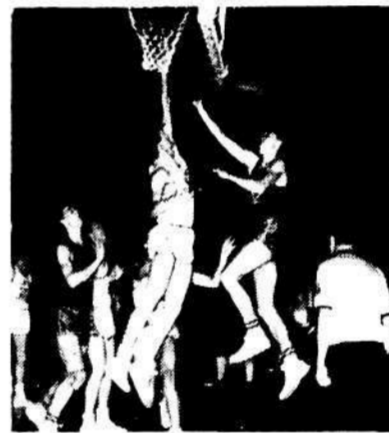

Representatives Elect Hathaway

The first order of business at this initial meeting was the election of officers for the current year. By a unanimous vote of the men present, Merlin Hathaway, Athletic Director here at Albany, was elected to serve as the first president of the conference.

Weber And Chase Assume Posts

Robert Weber who is the director of athletics at Cortland State was elected to serve as vice-president. The secretary-treasurer position was awarded to G. Hal Chase of Oneonta.

Athletic Directors of Genesee, Oswego and Potsdam present at the meeting were Frank Ackers, John Gamski and Sam Molnar respectively.

Six-Fold Purpose

The purpose of the New York State Athletic Conference is a six-fold one:

- 1. To facilitate the organization and administration of a program of intercollegiate sports among member colleges.
2. To foster a closer and more wholesome athletic relationship among the member colleges.
3. To strengthen the physical and education programs of the member colleges.
4. To give college students laboratory experience in working out the philosophy, organization and administration of a sports program.
5. To encourage student interest and participation in a greater variety of sports activities for men, including paymays and such games as badminton and ping-pong.
6. To serve the public schools:
a. As a model inter-school athletic organization.
b. As a source of information and inspiration in regard to the aims and values of physical education in the life of our people.
c. As a clearing house for athletic problems.
d. As liaison between individual colleges and the public schools.

Membership

Any four year college, accredited by the Middle Atlantic States Athletic Association, located in New York State is eligible for membership in the new conference.

An institution may be elected to membership of the conference by a 3-2 vote of all members. All colleges enrolled in the conference agree to abide by the minimum eligibility rules adopted in all intercollegiate competition sponsored by the conference.

Pratt's Life
Pratt is a former Vice-President of Tel-Aviv's "Shaare Zion" Lodge of B'nai B'rith; he is a Haganah veteran, and a member of the Honorable Society of the Inner Temple in London.

He was educated at Basle and the University of London; he obtained his law degree in 1934, and was called to the bar in 1937. Pratt served in the defense of Tel-Aviv. Lat was invalidated from the service after becoming a lieutenant, because of battle injuries.

Resuming his law career, Pratt's activities in the Israel Bar Association rapidly led him to membership on the Central Committee of the Tel-Aviv Branch of the organization.

Early Life
Pratt was born in Rovne, Russia in 1912, and moved to Palestine in 1923. He is now married.

Pratt served as Israel Consul and Consul General in Chicago from December 1953 to August 1957 with Consular jurisdiction over fifteen states in the Middle West and Middle South.

He assumed his post as Consul General of Israel in September 1957.

Forum and Hillel

Forum of Politics is primarily concerned with topics of current interest. It is headed by Lee DeNike '59.

Hillel is the Jewish student's religious organization on campus.
