

UNIVERSITY AT ALBANY NAMES ELLEN BRAUN COMPLIANCE COORDINATOR AND LARRY TREEN ASSISTANT FOOTBALL COACH

ALBANY, N.Y. – University at Albany Director of Athletics and Recreation Dr. Lee McElroy announced today the hiring of Ellen Braun as compliance coordinator and Larry Treen as assistant football coach.

Braun, who served as the school's interim compliance officer during the 1999-2000 academic year, will be responsible for determining and maintaining NCAA eligibility for 19 Division I intercollegiate sports programs, including more than 450 varsity athletes. She will also maintain student-athlete clearinghouse certification, handle processing appeals, waivers and reports, and serve as an athletic department liaison with financial aid and the registrar's office.

Previously, Braun worked in the University's athletic department as assistant to the academic advisor and assistant women's soccer coach from 1997-99. As an undergraduate, she was an athletic department intern with duties related to NCAA certification, eligibility and regulations.

Braun, 25, earned a master's degree in educational administration and policy studies and a B.A. in rhetoric and communication from the University at Albany. She won a combined eight varsity letters as a member of UAlbany's women's soccer and softball teams. A native of Biddeford, Maine, Braun captained the Great Danes to a 1997 ECAC Division II softball tournament berth and a 23-15 record.

Treen will work with the defensive backs as an assistant coach on Bob Ford's football staff in 2000. He coached the inside and outside linebackers the last two years at Norwich University in Vermont. In addition, he handled the Division III program's kick and punt return special teams, defensive scouting reports, and in-season and off-season weight and conditioning program.

Treen, 25, was a captain and two-year lettermen as a safety and linebacker at Norwich, where he graduated magna cum laude with a bachelor of science degree in criminal justice. He originally went to the United States Military Academy in West Point, New York, and was a member of the Army football team from 1994-96.



UNIVERSITY AT ALBANY NAMES SCOTT BEETEN **HEAD MEN'S BASKETBALL COACH**

ALBANY, N.Y. - Scott Beeten, who has coached at both the collegiate and scholastic levels for nearly 30 years, has been named head men's basketball coach at the University at Albany, as Director of Athletics and Recreation, Dr. Lee McElroy, announced today. Beeten, who previously was the associate head coach at the University of California-Berkeley, becomes the 14th head coach in the UAlbany program's history. The Great Danes competed at the NCAA Division I level for the first time last year.

"Scott Beeten embodies the qualities needed to run a successful Division I program, and he will represent our University exceptionally well," McElroy said. "He has tremendous integrity, values the student-athlete, and is committed to the University's high academic standards. Throughout his career, he has been associated with institutions that have academic missions similar to the University at Albany. These schools have also achieved winning traditions. Additionally, his varied experiences as a coach and recruiter provide him with a working knowledge of the national scene."

Beeten has spent the last three years at California-Berkeley as an associate head coach on Ben Braun's staff. The Bears, who compete in the Pacific-10 Conference, produced a pair of National Invitation Tournament (NIT) teams during that stretch. California posted its first postseason title, since winning the 1959 NCAA crown, by capturing the '99 NIT championship. Cal finished with a 22-11 record, and beat three top 10 schools in the same season for the first time with victories over North Carolina, UCLA and Arizona. In 1999-2000, the Bears reached the NIT quarterfinal round, and fashioned an 18-15 overall mark.

Coach Beeten worked at George Washington University from 1990-97 as the top assistant coach under Mike Jarvis, the current St. John's head coach. For seven seasons, Beeten handled all game preparation, recruiting and travel, and served as director of summer camp. The Colonials earned three NCAA tournament berths, including a "Sweet 16" appearance in 1993, and received three NIT tournament bids. George Washington won the Atlantic-10 Conference's Western Division in 1996, and was the '91 conference runner-up.

Previous to his appointment at George Washington, Beeten was both an associate head coach and assistant coach at the University of Pennsylvania for five years during the mid-1980s. The Quakers won the Ivy League title on three occasions in 1984, 1985 and 1987, and played in two NCAA tournaments. During that period, he also was an assistant coach for the gold-medal winning United States squad at the '85 Maccabiah Games.

In 1981-82, Beeten took over as the junior varsity head coach at Richard Stockton College, a NCAA Division III school in New Jersey. He was named the varsity head coach the following year, and led the Ospreys to a 14-10 record in one season with the program.

In addition, Beeten was an assistant for one year at Temple University, where the Owls won an East Coast Conference regular-season title and Big Five championship in 1976-77. He also was a graduate assistant and freshman coach at Lehigh University in 1971.


Beeten, 53, also compiled an outstanding career on the high school level in New Jersey and Pennsylvania. He was the head coach at Mainland Regional in Linwood, New Jersey for four years, and had a combined 82-24 record. His teams captured one NJSIAA state championship and two NJSIAA South Jersey crowns. Beeten received New Jersey Coach of the Year honors in 1981, and was voted Atlantic County's top coach three times. From 1971-76 at East Stroudsburg (Pa.) High School, his squads reached the PIAA state tournament twice, won four Monroe County championships, and produced an 83-39 record.

Beeten received a B.A. in history and a master's degree in education from Lehigh University, where he was a three-year starter in both basketball and baseball for the Engineers. The St. Louis Cardinals selected him in the Major League Baseball draft. Beeten and his wife, Anita, have two sons, Todd and Chad. Todd played his collegiate basketball at Eastern Michigan University.

Beeten takes over for Scott Hicks, who resigned on June 6 to accept the head coach position at Loyola College in Maryland. The Great Danes went 11-17 overall in their inaugural Division I campaign in 1999-2000.

FOUR UALBANY PLAYERS NAMED TO FOOTBALL GAZETTE'S DIVISION I-AA NON-SCHOLARSHIP PRESEASON ALL-AMERICA TEAM

ALBANY, N.Y. – University at Albany's J.T. Herfurth has been chosen to the Football Gazette Division I-AA non-scholarship Preseason All-America Football Team. Herfurth, a 6-foot-6, 300-pound offensive tackle, was named to the national first team. UAlbany's Samson Brown, Chris Phillis and Jelani Dandles were honorable mention selections.

Herfurth, a senior captain, has made 20 consecutive starts at left tackle. He blocked for an offense that was ranked 13th nationally in scoring at 37.0 points per game and 26th in total yards (424.1 per game) in 1999. Herfurth earned Football Gazette honorable mention All-America honors and was a second-team All-Northeast Conference choice.

Phillis, a split end and kick returner, averaged 100.2 all-purpose yards as a sophomore. He had 33 receptions for 635 yards and six touchdowns, and his receiving vardage was the sixth highest single-season total in school history. A native of Saratoga Springs, N.Y., Phillis was named to the '99 All-NEC squad in two categories, and was a first-team wide receiver.

A sophomore free safety, Brown is the team's top-returning tackler with 62, including 30 solo hits. He added six pass break-ups and two fumble recoveries in his first season as Brown, a 6-foot-1, 200-pound defender, was a first-team All-NEC choice one year ago.

Dandles, of Albany, N.Y., made a successful transition from wide receiver to cornerback last year. He started all nine games on defense, and recorded 32 tackles, including 23 solos. The 6-foot, 185-pounder had two interceptions with four pass breakups.

Brown and Dandles were the lone freshmen on the 1999 all-conference team. The UAlbany duo led a defensive unit that allowed 17.3 points per game, and created a plus-10 turnover differential for the fourth consecutive season.



UNIVERSITY AT ALBANY NAMES MIKE GATLEY AND CARLTON OWENS ASSISTANT MEN'S BASKETBALL COACHES

ALBANY, N.Y. – Mike Gatley and Carlton Owens have been named as assistant men's basketball coaches at the University at Albany, as head coach Scott Beeten announced today. Gatley has coached on the professional, college and high school levels since 1985, while Owens has been a college assistant at the University of Texas and St. Peter's College.

Gatley has coached professionally with four different organizations over the last five years. He led the American Basketball Association's Trenton Flames to the 1997 league championship and a 21-2 record, and was also with the Atlantic City Seagulls and New Jersey Shorecats, of the United States Basketball League and the Eastern Basketball Association's Mercer Marauders.

Gatley was the head coach at Kean College in New Jersey from 1992-95, where he led the program to a 50-19 overall record and the '95 ECAC Metro New York/New Jersey Division III championship. Previous to that appointment, Gatley was an assistant coach at the College of New Jersey for three years. The Lions went 49-28 during that period, and earned a NCAA Tournament berth in 1990. In addition, he was an assistant at Elizabethtown (Pa.) College for one year.

In the 1980s, Gatley coached on the New Jersey high school scene. He was an associate coach at Bishop Eustace High and an assistant at Atlantic City High. The two programs combined for a 56-8 record during his three seasons. He has also served as director of Sharp Shooters Basketball Camp since 1992.

Gatley, 38, was a co-captain and three-year lettermen at Franklin & Marshall College, where he received an undergraduate degree in history. He earned a master's degree in school counseling from the College of New Jersey.

Owens, the Atlantic 10 Conference's top scorer in 1988, was an assistant coach at St. Peter's College last year. He handled recruiting, scouting and individual skills practice. For three years in the mid-1990s, Owens was an assistant on Tom Penders' staff at the University of Texas. The Longhorns reached the NCAA Tournament twice, and went 18-12 with a national regional semifinal appearance in 1996-97. Texas posted a 21-10 record and advanced to the NCAA's second round the previous season.

A native of Brooklyn, N.Y., Owens was a two-time first-team All-Atlantic 10 point guard at the University of Rhode Island, where he earned a B.S. in human development and family studies. He led the Rams to the NCAA regional semifinals, an Atlantic 10 championship and a 28-7 record in 1988, when he was chosen the New England Player of the Year. Owens, the second-leading scorer and career assists leader in URI history, was inducted into the school's Athletic Hall of Fame in 1998. Owens, 35, played professionally with the Continental Basketball Association's Pensacola Tornadoes.

Rashee Durant Will Play Basketball for Great Danes in 2000-2001

Albany, N.Y. – University at Albany head basketball coach Scott Beeten announced today that Rashee Durant has signed an enrollment certificate to play men's basketball in 2000-2001. Durant, a 6-foot, 180-pound point guard from Wilmington, N.C., was a scholastic player at Blue Ridge School in St. George, Virginia.

Durant averaged 8.0 points, 5.0 assists, 5.0 rebounds and 3.5 assists as a senior, when he was chosen to the Virginia Independent Schools (VIS) Division I all-state team and rated as one of North Carolina's top-50 players by FoxSports.com. He led Blue Ridge to the VIS Division I state championship, as he scored 12 points and made the winning free throws with 16 seconds left in the state title game. The Barons, who finished with a 21-5 record, also captured the Virginia Prep League crown.

Durant was selected to the All-Virginia Prep League squad three consecutive years, and is the school's all-time leader in assists and steals and fourth on the career scoring list. A four-year starter, he averaged 17.0 points per game from his two-guard position as a sophomore before moving to point guard for the final two seasons. His teammate, Tom Timmermans, will be a freshman center at Notre Dame this year.

"Rashee fits the profile we are trying to attract," Albany coach Scott Beeten said. "He is a great person and student, and is extremely dedicated to becoming a good player. We were fortunate that he was still available. He is grateful to be at Albany, and hungry to be on a winning team."

Albany has added four newcomers to the roster since January. **E.J. Gallup**, a 6'4" guard from Gloversville, N.Y., and **Kiki Picard**, a 6-foot guard from Kissimmee, Fla., are also in the freshman class. **Alex Barnhill**, a 6'4" forward, transferred from Canisius, and will be eligible to play at the completion of the 2000 fall semester.

UNIVERSITY AT ALBANY ANNOUNCES 2000 FOOTBALL CAPTAINS

Albany, N.Y. – **J.T. Herfurth**, **Ben Kelcey**, **Jason Martin** and **Chris Phillis** have been selected as the University at Albany's 2000 football captains, as head coach Bob Ford announced today.

Herfurth, a 6-foot-6, 300-pound senior, was chosen to the preseason All-Northeast Conference squad, and was a *Football Gazette* honorable mention All-American last year. From his left tackle position, he blocked for an offense that averaged 37.0 points and more than 420 total yards per game in 1999.

Kelcey, a three-year lettermen, is the team's top returning rusher and the '99 special teams MVP. The senior running back rushed for 278 yards and two touchdowns, and caught 10 passes for 124 more and two scores. In addition, he had 10 tackles and one blocked punt.

A senior defensive tackle, Martin (6-1, 285) made 26 tackles, including 14 solo hits, in his first season with the Albany program. He also recorded three sacks and five tackles for losses.


Phillis (Saratoga Springs H.S.) is the first junior since 1995 to be voted as a UAlbany captain. A first-team All-NEC split end last fall, Phillis (6-1, 196) hauled in 33 passes for 635 yards and six TDs, and averaged 100.2 all-purpose yards per game. Like Herfurth, he was named to the preseason all-conference unit.





UNIVERSITY AT ALBANY NAMES SCOTT MARR HEAD MEN'S LACROSSE COACH

ALBANY, N.Y. – Scott Marr, who previously was an assistant coach at the University of Maryland, has been named head men's lacrosse coach at the University at Albany, as Director of Athletics and Recreation Dr. Lee McElroy announced today. Marr, the tenth head coach in the UAlbany program's history, takes over a position that was recently upgraded to full-time status.

Marr served on Dick Edell's Maryland staff for six years as both assistant coach and offensive coordinator. Maryland made five NCAA Tournament appearances during that period, and was the Division I national runner-up in 1995, 1997 and 1998. The Terps shattered the school's single-season scoring record with 236 goals, when the program captured the '98 Atlantic Coast Conference regular-season and tournament titles. Maryland's attack has averaged 12.5 goals under Marr's direction from 1995-2000, while All-Americans Matt Hahn and Andrew Whipple became two of the most storied scorers in school history.

Marr, 32, began his coaching career as the University of Delaware's offensive coordinator, where he worked with the school's all-time scorer Anthony DiMarzo. From 1992-94, the Blue Hens captured three consecutive North Atlantic Conference championships, and earned a top-20 national ranking in each season. Marr was also an assistant on the United States team that won the 1999 World Cup.

A collegiate player at Johns Hopkins University, Marr was an attackman on the 1987 national championship squad and the '89 national runner-up team. The Blue Jays garnered four straight NCAA berths during his career. He received an undergraduate degree in social and behavioral sciences in 1991.

A native of Yorktown, N.Y., Marr was a high school All-American who twice led his teams to the state's semifinal round. He and his wife, Traci, a special education teacher, have two children, Kyle and Jordyn.

In its inaugural NCAA Division I campaign, Albany posted its tenth consecutive winning season with a 6-5 record, including victories over Providence and Boston College.

GREAT DANES OPEN PRESEASON FOOTBALL CAMP ON MONDAY

Albany, N.Y. – Football preseason practice begins at the University at Albany on Monday, August 21. The Great Danes, who compete at the NCAA Division I-AA level, and play in the Northeast Conference, will conduct two practices on the opening day from 9:00 – 11:00 a.m. and 2:30 – 4:30 p.m.

Head coach Bob Ford welcomes back 32 lettermen, including four starters on both offense and defense. "We have a fairly decent nucleus returning considering the losses to graduation," says Ford, who has a 165-102 record in 27 varsity seasons as Albany's coach. "Some of our personnel will need to play at a higher level if we are going to win the conference championship. Early on, we need to establish the make-up of the defense, and develop depth at all positions."

Albany posted a 7-2 record in its inaugural Division I-AA campaign and finished second in the NEC standings. The Great Danes, who were picked second in the conference's 2000 preseason poll, were ranked nationally in scoring offense (37.0 ppg) and total yards (424.1/game) last season. The UAlbany defense forced 26 miscues by the opposition, which for the fourth straight year led to a plus-10 or better team turnover differential.

Preseason All-NEC selections Chris Phillis (Saratoga Springs) and J.T. Herfurth are the top returnees on offense. Phillis caught 33 passes for 635 yards and six touchdowns as a sophomore, while Herfurth, a senior, is a 6-foot-6, 290pound left tackle. Marcus Rotondi (Shenendehowa) and Ryan Roeder came out of spring practice in a virtual tie for the starting quarterback position.

Free safety Samson Brown and cornerback Jelani Dandles (Bishop Maginn) were the lone freshmen to be chosen to last year's All-NEC team. Brown, a first-team selection, is the top-returning tackler with 62. Dandles totaled 32 tackles, four pass break-ups and two interceptions.
