

This is a unique experiment emparked upon by the combined efforts of Albany Law School and State College. Alfred I. Maleson. Professor of Albany Law, and Albert C. Mossin, Associate Professor of Commerce, State, are supervising this

What Is A Moot Court? The Moot Court is a practice court for Senior law students. Each trial is prepared in the form of a problem. The facts are written down and exhibits prepared for use as evidence. Parts for the witnesses are written, each part being assigned to some particular law student. Two student "lawyers" are assigned to the defense and two to the plaintiff in a civil case or to represent the state in a criminal case. These cases are based on actual decisions of the courts. Certain facts are changed, however, and situations set up. Area lawyers and judges contribute their services as presiding justices. The trials are held in the court room of the Albany Law

The trials are arranged in a manner similar to a tennis tournament, with the winning teams (each consisting of two student lawvers) competing against other winning teams down to quarter-finals, semifinals, and finals. The winners of the finals compete against finalists from other law schools in a regional tournament.

Mutually Advantageous Law school students experience the psychological spur which comes from trying their cases before a jury not consisting of their fellow law students as previously done. Experience as a juror also serves as a significant practical supplement to classroom work in business law and for the subsequent teaching of business

This past Tuesday State students acquitted Mr. X (name withheld to protect the anonymous and fictitious man) of a first degree murder charge of Hit and Run. Again justice reigns.
