 per annum to begin on the second  
 Wednesday of September, and that he  
 had received from her a letter of ac-  
 ceptance.

✓ The Secretary also reported that in  
 pursuance of the directions of the Com-  
 mittee he had closed the purchase of  
 the premises No. 82 Willett Street adjoin-  
 ing the grounds of the School on the 10th,  
 and the deed and the abstract of title  
 having been approved by the Attorney  
 General, he had drawn upon the  
 Comptroller and paid Julia Steele

the sum of \$5000 in full payment.
