



UAlbany Athletics

The University at Albany athletics program continued its success in the 2005-06 athletic year. With momentum from the 2004-05 Stuart P. Haskell, Jr. Commissioner's Cup, which recognizes the strongest athletic program in the America East Conference, the Great Danes captured five conference championships, two regular-season championships, and saw numerous student-athletes garner individual accolades, including five All-America honorees.

UAlbany won America East championships in men's basketball, men's indoor and outdoor track & field, women's outdoor track & field, and softball. In addition, the Great Danes were runners-up in women's indoor track & field and men's lacrosse. Volleyball and men's basketball also won conference regular-season titles, led by America East Conference Player of the Years and All-Americans Blair Buchanan and Jamar Wilson, respectively.

In addition, men's basketball made its first-ever NCAA Tournament appearance, becoming the first Division I program in the State University of New York system to accomplish the feat. Building on the mantra "Why not us?" the Great Danes nearly became the first 16-seed to topple a one-seed when they faced the University of Connecticut. Softball became the first women's program to make back-to-back trips to NCAA post-season play, while Gered Burns, Joe Greene and Marc Palozzi became the first Division I track & field All-Americans for the Great Danes.

UAlbany sponsors 19 NCAA Division I intercollegiate athletic programs, with 18 teams competing in the America East Conference. Football, a Division I-AA program, has been an associate member of the Northeast Conference since 1999.

Press Credentials ...

All requests for press credentials should be directed to Brianna LaBrecque, Assistant Director of Media Relations, as far in advance of the game as possible. Credentials will be held at the will call window in the lobby of the Recreation & Convocation Center and can be picked up prior to the game. All credential requests will be handled on a space-available basis.

Photographers and Television ...

Photo passes can be obtained in the same manner as regular press credentials. Photographers are permitted to shoot from the baseline only, provided they do not interfere with the flow of the game. Camera crews are asked to call in advance of the game, but will be admitted upon arrival.

Radio Policy ...

All stations planning on broadcasting University at Albany women's basketball games at the Recreation & Convocation Center must obtain permission from the Athletic Media Relations Office. Written requests should be sent at least two weeks prior to the date of the game. Broadcast locations are at courtside. Crews are limited to three people.

Press Facilities ...

Press row is located courtside. Phone lines for radio broadcasts and print media are available along press row. Parking is readily available at the adjacent Recreation & Convocation Center parking lot. The main press row phone number is (518) 442-2566. University at Albany respectfully reminds each person on press row that it is a working area and cheering for either team is prohibited. Your cooperation is appreciated.

All members of the working media will be provided with pre-game notes, statistics and rosters, which will be available at courtside. Live in-game statistics can be viewed on monitors. Computerized halftime and final statistics and detailed final play-by-play summary will also be provided.

All player and/or coach interview requests must be directed to Brianna LaBrecque or Brian DePasquale. Please do not contact a student-athlete directly by phone or in their dormitories.

Any special requests should be brought to the attention of the Athletic Media Relations staff, and we will do our best to assist you. PROGRAM HISTORY: The University at Albany women's basketball program began varsity play in 1965 and competed at the NCAA College Division, NCAA Division II and III levels prior to 1999. Entering their 42nd season, the Great Danes have a 418-435 (.490) record. UAlbany has made five ECAC playoff and two NCAA tournament appearances since 1985. The UAlbany program moved to Division II in 1995-96 and to Division I in 1999-00.

THE HOME COURT: The Great Danes play their home games at the 5,000-seat Recreation and Convocation Center, located on campus. Entering the 2006-07 season, UAlbany holds a 95-74 (.562) record in 14 seasons at the RACC.

THE COACHING STAFF: Head coach Trina Patterson, in her fifth year at the helm of the Great Danes, brought in an entirely new coaching staff for the 2006-07 season. Melissa Patterson comes to UAlbany after eight seasons as head coach of Division III Mount St. Joseph. Glenn Senecal joins the Great Dane staff after a three-year stint at Division III Mitchell College. Senecal was previously an assistant at Boston University and helped coach the Terriers to an NCAA Tournament appearance in 2002-03. Jolene Johnston was a four-year letterwinner at Siena before playing professionally in Puerto Rico and Luxembourg. Christine Roth, a two-year student-athlete at Saint Joseph's, also joins the staff as the director of basketball operations.

THE CONFERENCE: UAlbany will be playing its sixth season as a member of the nine-team America East Conference. The Great Danes made their third straight tournament appearance last season. The program earned its first America East tournament victory in 2003-04 with a first-round defeat of Hartford.

THE CAPTAINS: Senior guard Tanya James, junior guard Sherri Mikus and junior center Kristin Higy have been selected by the players and the coaching staff as the 2006-07 captains. James is leading the team for the second consecutive season after appearing in 27 games for the Great Danes last season. Mikus is the team's leading returning scorer, after starting 23 of 28 games a year ago and averaging 8.6 points. Higy will have a chance to show her leadership on the court this season after sitting out the 2005-06 schedule after transferring into the UAlbany program from George Mason.

THE TEAM: The Great Danes lost just two seniors from last season's squad, including guard Jen Schumacher, who was the only player to start all 28 games. Schumacher also became the school's all-time leader in three-point field goals and led the team with 11.0 points per game. UAlbany returns five players who started 14 or more games last season and three others who had some starting experience. The Great Danes brought in three freshmen for the 2006-07 season.

THE SCHEDULE: The Great Danes' regular-season schedule features 29 games, including 16 America East Conference contests. UAlbany will travel to the Golden Knights Tournament at Central Florida on Nov. 17-18 and will visit Virginia Commonwealth on Nov. 21. The Great Danes will face their first-ever Big 10 opponent on Dec. 10 as they travel to Wisconsin and will also take a trip to Texas to take on Sam Houston State on Dec. 28 and Lamar on Dec. 30. UAlbany will continue the annual crosstown-rivalry with Siena on Nov. 15 at the Pepsi Arena. The Great Danes will kick off America East play on Jan. 4 at Binghamton and will host their first conference game on Jan. 7 against Maine.

AMERICA EAST CHAMPIONSHIP: Binghamton University and the Events Center will be the site of the 2006-07 America East Conference Women's Basketball Tournament. The tournament will feature all nine conference members. The winner of the America East Tournament will receive an automatic bid to the NCAA Tournament.



SEASON PREVIEW

Versatility. Depth. Athleticism. The three main words that head coach **Trina Patterson** is using to describe the 2006-07 University at Albany women's basketball team.

Coming off of the toughest season in her four-year tenure, Patterson is hoping a combination of talent and team chemistry along with a mix of experience and youth will bring the Great Danes to the forefront of the America East Conference.

"We have a start over attitude this season," said Patterson, whose squad posted a 7-21 record last season. "We aren't dwelling on the past. What's done is done. We are focused on practicing and playing like champions."

Patterson has jump-started the re-focusing period by lining up arguably the toughest non-conference schedule in the program's history.

The first half of the Great Danes' schedule features three NCAA participants from last season and another that was in the tournament field two years ago. UAlbany will face off against the 2005-06 Patriot League champion Army, Northeast Conference champion Sacred Heart and Mid-American Conference champion Bowling Green, all in the first month of the season. Holy Cross, winners of the 2004-05 Patriot League title, also grace the Great Danes' schedule in November.

"We have to gain respect," said Patterson, whose team faced off against perennial powerhouse Connecticut last season. "We don't have a 'big' name like UConn this year, but overall we have a bigger schedule because of the history."

Part of that history will include playing the first Big 10 team in UAlbany annals with a trip to Wisconsin in December. The Great Danes have the potential to face Central Florida of Conference USA at the Golden Knights Tournament and will also face off against Virginia Commonwealth and Buffalo in the early going.

The annual crosstown-rivalry game against Siena will take place in the Pepsi Arena on November 15, after the Great Danes open up the season at home in the RACC against La Salle on November 10.

UAlbany lost just two seniors from last year's squad in guard Jen Schumacher and forward Sharon Majors. Schumacher, who finished her career ranked first in UAlbany history with 197, was the only player to start all 28 games for the Great Danes in 2005-06. Majors saw action in 27 contests, contributing 1.1 points and 1.6 rebounds.

Patterson returns nine players, including 5-11 junior guard **Sherri Mikus**, who is the team's top returning scorer. Mikus, who started 23 of 28 games last season, averaged 8.6 points, 3.1 rebounds, a team-high 3.1 assists and a team-best 2.0 steals.

"Sherri is a point-forward," said Patterson.

"She is a player that can play every position on the floor and we celebrate that."

Mikus, who was voted as a captain by her teammates for the 2006-07 season, was UAlbany's team MVP as a sophomore.

Mikus will share time at the point with senior captain **Tanya James** and sophomore **Sarah Hayes**. The 5-6 James, who is in a captaincy position for the second straight season, averaged 2.7 points, 1.4 assists and 1.3 boards last year. Hayes, a 5-6 defensive specialist who made the team as a walk-on as a freshman, played in 19 contests in her rookie season, contributing 1.2 points per game.

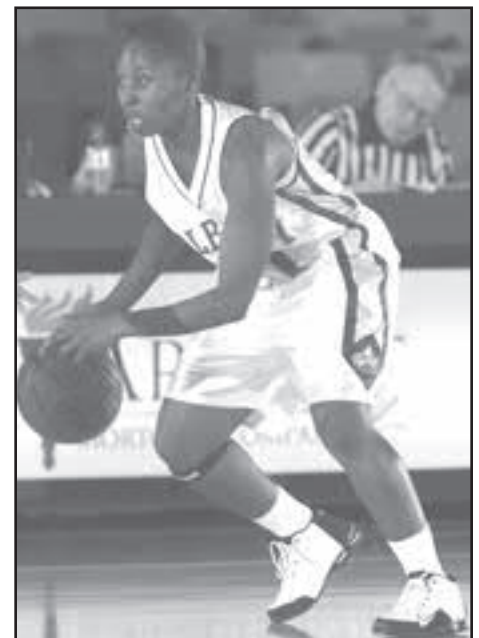
Senior **Amanda Ward** played in her first season with the Great Danes last year after transferring from the Community College of Rhode Island. Ward made an immediate contribution, playing in all 28 contests, and is the second-highest returning scorer after posting 8.3 points per game in 2005-06.

Junior **Gia Sanders** scored at a 7.0 clip last season to go along with 6.0 rebounds per game. She also led the conference with 52 blocks, setting the UAlbany single-season record.

Sophomore **Joy Sterling** will play a swing role between the wing and small forward position. Sterling led the Great Danes off the boards a year ago, averaging 6.3 rebounds per contest, while chipping in with 4.3 points.

Guard **Tanya James** is one of only two seniors on the 2006-07 team and is a captain for the second straight season.

"With Amanda at 5-9, Joy at 5-11 and Gia at 6-0, we have some great size and rebounding ability at the wing and small forward position," said Patterson.

Junior **Kelly Martinson**, also at 5-11, will play on the wing and post as well. Martinson, a long-range shooter at the guard position, has been transitioned to the small forward spot to give the Great Danes more depth.

Inside, Patterson has two true centers in 6-4 sophomore **Devran Tanacan** and 6-4 sophomore **Kirstin Peterson**. Tanacan played in 25 games last season, making six starts, and averaged 3.0 points and 2.6 rebounds. With international playing experience and a year of collegiate ball under her belt, Patterson expects Tanacan to have more of an impact under the basket. Peterson, who started 14 of 28 games at center last season, posted 4.3 points and 5.2 rebounds per contest and was second on the team with 33 blocks.

Patterson will also get the addition of 6-1 forward **Kristin Higy**, who will play this season after sitting out 2005-06 after transferring from George Mason. Higy has already made an impact on the UAlbany program, earning the respect of her teammates off the floor and being named a captain for this season.

"Kristin will make an immediate impact on the court for us," said Patterson. "She has the potential to be an all-conference player this season."

Patterson explained how team chemistry will make a difference for the Great Danes this year. Higy and Mikus played on the same Empire State Games team this summer and Patterson believes that the bond formed there will carry over into the season.

"The chemistry has improved with playing together," said Patterson, who had a third player, Peterson, play in the Empire State Games as well.

Patterson will welcome three freshmen into the fold this season, all of whom come from winning backgrounds and will look to contribute almost instantly.

Both standing at 5-8, **Charity Iromuanya** and **Britney McGee** will help the Great Danes out at the combo guard position. Iromuanya was a three-year starter at Lincoln Northeast and was named to the Associated Press Class A All-Nebraska Second Team as a junior. She averaged 10.6 points and 3.7 rebounds to lead the Rockets to a perfect 24-0 season and the Class A state championship. With her decision to attend UAlbany,

Iromuanya became just the seventh girls basketball player in the state of Nebraska to earn a Division I scholarship.

McGee averaged 16.2 points and 8.0 rebounds at West High in Bakersfield, Calif. She led her team to the Central Section Division III semifinals after posting a triple-double with 19 points, 11 assists and 10 boards in a first-round playoff game. The All-Area Player of the Year by the Bakersfield Californian, McGee will compete for playing time at the guard position.

Also joining the Great Danes from California is the 6-1 **Ashley Lindsay**. Lindsay averaged 10.6 points and 6.7 rebounds while leading her team with 21 blocked shots as a senior. An All-Ivy League selection and scholar-athlete, Lindsay was also nominated for McDonald's All-American honors. Lindsay will see time at the power forward position for the Great Danes.

Patterson is confident her freshmen will adjust well to the collegiate game and help build the team's depth and versatility.

"These three will make immediate contributions," said Patterson. "The transition is always tough, but they are working hard and making strides in their skill development and their work ethic."

Patterson believes that the 2006-07 squad is the most versatile and the most athletic team she has coached in her tenure at UAlbany.

"We have the ability to play 'small ball' with three forwards and two guards or we can play a transition with a center, forward and three guards," said Patterson. "We can press because of the depth off the bench. The returners all have some sort of starting experience."

With the depth, the team is able to build up a mental toughness that is making them hungry for the success they missed last season. Patterson's addition of an all-new coaching staff will also add to the mindset of the team.

Melissia Patterson and Glenn Senecal bring head coaching experience from the Division II and Division III level to UAlbany. Patterson was at the helm of Division III Mount St. Joseph for eight seasons, while Senecal joins the Great Danes' staff after a three-year stint at the helm of Division III Mitchell College. Senecal was also an assistant at Boston University in 2002-03 when the Terriers won the America East championship.

Assistant **Jolene Johnston** brings Division I and international playing experience to the staff, as she was a four-year letterwinner at Siena. After graduation, Johnston played professionally in Puerto Rico and Luxembourg. Director of basketball operations **Christine Roth** was a two-year letterwinner at Saint Joseph's, where she finished fourth in the Atlantic 10 in three-point field goals per game and in field goal percentage as a senior.

The entire UAlbany program is ready to make its mark on the America East Conference and show that they are a changed program from a year ago.

"We are prepared to do what it takes to become champions," said Patterson, whose team will kick off conference play on January 4 at Binghamton. "The team knows it has to work harder. We want to finish in the top half of this tough conference. We believe in this team."

Trina Patterson begins her fifth season as head coach of the women's basketball program at the University at Albany and her 14th overall at the collegiate level. During Patterson's four years at the helm, the UAlbany program has made significant strides and become more prominent in America East play.

A new era began in Great Danes women's basketball when Director of Athletics and Recreation Dr. Lee McElroy announced the hiring of Trina Patterson as the women's head basketball coach on May 6, 2002. Patterson became the ninth head coach in the UAlbany women's basketball program's history.

"Trina has a vision for the program on all levels, and her previous teams have demonstrated success on the playing court, in the classroom and in the community," McElroy said.

UAlbany established a program record with 14 victories at the Division I level during the 2004-05 season and finished 14-14 overall. The Great Danes increased their win total in each of Patterson's first three seasons.

Patterson guided the Great Danes to two straight America East Conference postseason tournaments, including the program's first-ever in 2003-04. UAlbany defeated Hartford in the first round that season before losing to eventual champion Maine in the semifinals.

Known for her ability to develop post players, Patterson guided former center Danielle Hutcheson to consecutive America East All-Conference First-Team honors. Hutcheson, who finished her career as the program's leading rebounder, became the first UAlbany women's basketball player to receive that award.

During her first season at UAlbany, Patterson helped the Great Danes increase their win total from four games to nine. UAlbany also went from a winless conference season to registering three victories in 2002-03. Under Patterson's guidance, two Great Dane players were named to the America East All-Conference Second Team for the first time in women's basketball history.

Prior to her arrival in Albany, Patterson served as the head basketball coach at the College of William & Mary in Williamsburg, Va. for eight seasons, from 1991-99. She took over a program that fought to establish an identity in the Colonial Athletic Association and had not experienced a winning season at the Division I level. By her third year, Patterson guided the team to a 20-8 record and a third-place finish in the conference standings. She was voted the 1993-94 CAA Coach of the Year, and the squad established single-season records in scoring average and assists. During the previous campaign, the Tribe advanced to the championship game of the 1992 CAA Tournament. Patterson, who mentored five all-conference players, remains the school's all-time winningest coach.

In 1999-2000, Patterson spent one year as the head coach at the University of Maryland Eastern Shore, a member of the Mid-Eastern Athletic Conference. Patterson, who began her career as a William & Mary assistant coach in 1988, has also served on the USA Women's Basketball Team coaching staff as an assistant

for the R. William Jones Cup in Taipei, Taiwan, and Beijing, China, in 1998. The gold-medal-winning squad's roster included current WNBA players Tamika Catchings, a four-time WBCA/Kodak All-American, Becky Hammon and Tamika Whitmore. Patterson again joined the Team USA sidelines for the 2003 Pan American Games, helping guide the squad to the gold medal game. Some of the members of the team included Nicole Powell, Barbara Turner, Rebekka Brunson and Janel McCarville. Patterson coached Brunson, a post player, who went on to lead the team in scoring and rebounding during the international competition.

As a collegiate player at the University of Virginia, Patterson earned four varsity letters and was a member of four consecutive NCAA Tournament teams. The Cavaliers captured three Atlantic Coast Conference regular-season titles and won 20 or more games in each season of her career. In her senior season as team captain, Virginia posted a 26-5 record and reached the NCAA's regional semifinals. The Cavaliers, coached by Debbie Ryan, a seven-time ACC Coach of the Year, ended the season ranked 10th by USA Today and 11th in the Associated Press polls.

Patterson was appointed by the NCAA to serve as an NCAA representative on the USA Basketball Women's Collegiate Committee for the 2005-08 term. The committee is charged with reviewing and making recommendations concerning USA Basketball's Women's Collegiate events, including the selection of players and coaches.

Additionally, Patterson was one of five women's basketball coaches chosen by the U.S. Olympic Committee to participate in a coaches' conference. The forum was held in Colorado Springs in October 2003.

Patterson was also selected to serve as the America East Conference women's basketball coaches' chair. Patterson, who is in her second year of the position, will be responsible for creating an agenda for the annual conference meeting, as well as making recommendations for improvements.

A native of Newport News, Va., Patterson earned a B.A. in rhetoric and communication studies from the University of Virginia in 1987. She completed a M.A. in human resource management from National University in La Jolla, Calif., in 2002.

Patterson, who enjoys playing the acoustic guitar, is a member of Delta Sigma Theta Sorority, Inc. Patterson sits on the Capital Region Urban Advisory Board for the YMCA and was recognized as an adult achiever last spring. Patterson resides in North Greenbush with her husband Carl, a retired U.S. Marine Corps Master Sergeant, and their two sons Carl, Jr., 10 and Matthew, 5.

She shared the HCAC coach of the year honors as her squad posted a 19-10 record, the most wins since 1996. During her tenure, she served on the NCAA Division III Ranking Committee as the Great Lakes Regional Representative.

Patterson was previously the head coach at Cheyney University, a NCAA Division II school in Pennsylvania, for two seasons. She began her collegiate coaching career as an assistant on the Cheyney staff. In addition, Patterson was a four-year letterwinner at the University of Louisville from 1985-89.

A member of the Women's Basketball Coaches Association (WBCA) and Black Coaches Association (BCA), Patterson earned a B.S. in urban studies from Louisville. She received a master's degree in education administration and supervision from Cheyney.

Prior to his position at Mitchell, Senecal was an assistant coach at Boston University for the 2002-03 season. That season the Terriers won the America East Conference Championship and made an NCAA Tournament appearance for the first time.

Senecal, 49, is a member of the Women's Basketball Coaches Association, and has also held coaching positions at Bryant, Holy Cross, Assumption and Nichols. He graduated from Nichols with a B.S. in business administration in 1980.

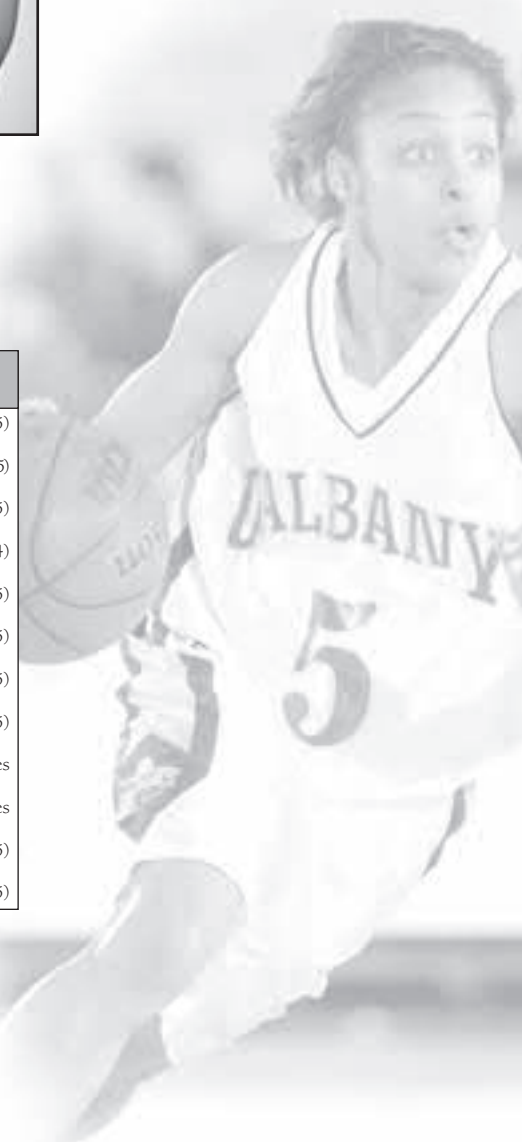

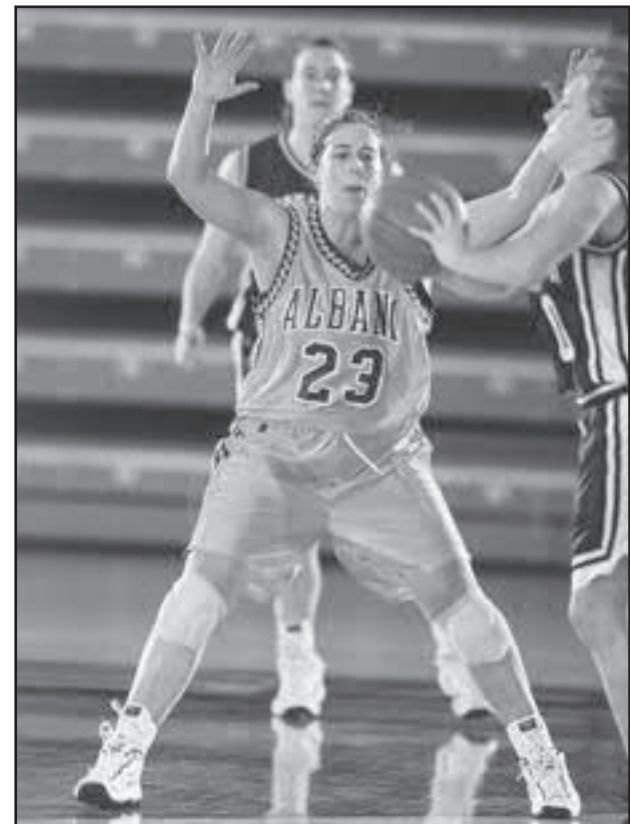

What is a Great Dane?



The University at Albany adopted the nickname "Great Danes" in the spring of 1965. UAlbany's mascot was founded in a contest on campus for a \$25 savings bond. The judging committee made the choice noting, "The Great Dane is noted for its grandeur, its alertness, and its intelligence. It is an animal whose prowess and strength are easily recognizable and readily admired." Contest winner Kathy

Earle explained the Great Dane was renowned for its "size, weight, strength, character, courage, speed, and stamina."

In the 1960s, UAlbany grew from a college for teachers to a top research university. The old school mascot, "Pierre the Pedguin," representing the Pedagogues, seemed inappropriate as the University's mascot and nickname.

America East ...

Since its modest beginning as a men's basketball-only conference in 1979, America East has evolved into one of the most comprehensive NCAA Division I conferences with a commitment to broad-based, competitive athletics programs, complementing the academic integrity and missions of the member institutions.

Each of the nine institutions - University at Albany, Binghamton University, Boston University, University of Hartford, University of Maine, University of Maryland Baltimore County (UMBC), University of New Hampshire, Stony Brook University, and University of Vermont - offers a unique blend of academic and athletic tradition.

Progressive in its approach to its more than 3,500 student-athletes, America East recognizes champions in each of its 22 sports: men's and women's basketball, baseball, men's and women's cross country, field hockey, men's and women's golf, men's and women's indoor track and field, men's and women's lacrosse, men's and women's outdoor track and field, men's and women's soccer, softball, men's and women's swimming and diving, men's and women's tennis, and volleyball.

America East also conducts the nation's most comprehensive academic recognition program for student-athletes. More than 1,800 student-athletes with grade-point averages of 3.0 or better were honored in 2005-06 alone.

With a geographic footprint covering the Mid-Atlantic to Northeast regions of the United States, America East has a population base of more than 50 million people and nearly 30 million television homes. America East member institutions include more than 106,000 students on the nine campuses and boast nearly one million living alumni.

Athletic Success...

America East enters its 19th year of all-sports championship competition on the heels of one of the most successful seasons in history as four of its 10 team sport champions won at least one game in the NCAA Championship.

Hartford advanced in the NCAA Women's Basketball Championship with a 64-58 upset win over Temple in the first round. In addition, America East sent Stony Brook to the National Invitation Tournament in women's basketball.

Albany's men's basketball team earned its first-ever trip to the NCAA Championship by capturing the league's regular season and tournament championships. The Great Danes held a double-digit second-half lead, but could not upset top-seeded Connecticut.

Stony Brook's Leonora Joy and the Maine's Kirby Davis, the 2005 America East Women's and Men's Individual cross country champions, respectively, were also the top league finishers at the NCAA Northeast Regionals. Joy finished 12th, while Davis was 29th.



The 17th-ranked Boston University field hockey team captured a 5-3 victory over Central Michigan in an NCAA Play-In Game. With the win, the Terriers advanced to the NCAA tournament for the first time since 2000. They were narrowly defeated in a 4-3 overtime decision by Michigan in the first round.

The Stony Brook men's soccer team won its first-ever NCAA Division I Tournament game with a 2-1 overtime victory over Yale. The victory marks the fifth-straight season the America East Champion has won a first round game in the NCAA Tournament. The Seawolves advanced to the second round where they were defeated by No. 8 Connecticut, 2-0.

The Boston University women's soccer team earned a 1-0 win over the University of Connecticut in the first round of the NCAA Tournament. The Terriers season came to an end as they lost 1-0 to Boston College in the second round.

New Hampshire's Shannon Daly and Kary Goodman both competed at the 2006 NCAA Division I Women's Swimming and Diving Championships.

Albany's Marc Palozzi and Joe Greene, Binghamton's Rory Quiller and Boston University's Andrea Walkonen all competed at the 2006 NCAA Outdoor Track & Field Championships. Palozzi and Greene earned Division I track and field All-America honors, as announced by the U.S. Track & Field and Cross Country Coaches Association.

Academic Success...

America East institutions boasted eight Academic All-Americans in 2005-06 while another 30 were named All-District.

The conference also honored a top-scholar athlete in each of its 22 championship sports. 2006 America East Scholar-Athletes were Kirby Davis (Maine men's cross country), Marisa Ryan (Boston University women's cross country), Merrie-Beth Maynard (Vermont field hockey), Stephan Hall (Albany men's soccer), Debbie Newman (New Hampshire women's soccer), Ashlee Reed (Albany volleyball), Brendon Hitchcock (Binghamton baseball), Martin Klimes (Vermont men's basketball), Jessica Smith (Stony Brook women's basketball), Jeff Wolniewicz (Binghamton men's golf), Juliana Carrillo (Hartford women's golf), Kevin McKeown (Binghamton men's lacrosse), Marisa Trachtenberg (Stony Brook women's lacrosse), Brittany Cheney (Maine softball), Brian Koizim (Binghamton men's swimming & diving), Lidija Breznikar (Boston U. women's swimming & diving), Tal Meir (Stony Brook men's tennis), Lya Kushnirovich (Binghamton women's tennis), Andy Allstadt (Albany men's indoor track & field),

Marisa Ryan (Boston U. women's indoor track & field), Adam Grossman (UMBC men's outdoor track & field) and Alyssa Lotmore (Albany women's outdoor track & field).

More than 1,800 of America East's 3,500 student-athletes were named to the Academic Honor Roll after receiving grade-point averages of 3.0 or better. Included in that total were 757 student-athletes who earned a 3.5 or better.

Vermont, whose student-athletes maintained a 3.14 grade-point average, has been awarded the America East Academic Cup for the second-consecutive season and becomes the first institution in conference history to win the award three times. It ties the highest grade-point average in the 11-year history of the award, which the Catamounts set last season.

Commissioner's Cup...

Seven league titles, three runner-up finishes and one third-place showing by its women's programs led Boston University to the 2005-06 Stuart P. Haskell, Jr. Commissioner's Cup. For the fourth time in five years, the Terriers earn the conference award that annually recognizes the highest scoring athletic program in America East as determined by a points system, which rewards a school for success both during the regular season and at championship competition in the league's 22 sports. Boston U. took home the conference crown in women's cross country, women's soccer, field hockey, women's indoor track & field, women's tennis, women's golf and women's lacrosse. The Terriers were also runners up in women's basketball, women's outdoor track & field and softball, while winning regular-season titles in women's soccer, field hockey and women's lacrosse.

America East in the Pros...

Several America East athletes have extended their playing careers beyond the collegiate level. Former two-time America East Players of the Year Craig Claxton of the Atlanta Hawks, and Malik Rose of the New York Knicks, helped lead the San Antonio Spurs to a World Championship in 2003. Former Hartford star Vin Baker of Los Angeles Clippers, continued the legacy of the late Reggie Lewis, when he was selected as an NBA All-Star. In addition, three-time America East Player of the Year Taylor Copenrath has been invited to preseason camp with the Indiana Pacers.

America East has also been well-represented in the WNBA as current Hartford head coach Jennifer Rizzotti and former America East Players of the Year Cindy Blodgett (Maine), Jamie Cassidy (Maine) and Katasha Artis have played in the top women's professional league.

Former Hartford star Jeff Bagwell of the Houston Astros became the 35th player in Major League history to hit 400 home runs when he homered in a game on July 20, 2003. More recently, he also helped the Astros reach the World Series for the first time in franchise history in 2005. Joe Nathan, who played at Stony Brook and is now a top reliever for the Minnesota Twins, was selected to the Major League All-Star game in both 2004 and 2005. Former America East Players of the Year Mark Sweeney (Maine) of the San Francisco Giants and Kevin Mench of the Texas Rangers are on 2006 Major League rosters. Jay Witasick of the Oakland A's, who played at UMBC, is in his 10th season in the majors. Several other former America East players, including 11 draft choices from 2004-05, are presently in the minor leagues.

Hartford's Jerry Kelly, who recently finished second at the U.S. Bank Championship in Milwaukee, joined the tour in 1996 after turning professional in 1989. Kelly has earned more than \$2 million in each of the last three seasons. He's joined by former Hawk golfers Tim Petrovic and Patrick Sheehan on the PGA Tour.

America East also has a number of former men's and women's soccer and men's lacrosse players in various professional leagues, including former Boston University standout Andrew Dorman, who is in his third season with the New England Revolution of the MLS.

UMBC's men's lacrosse player Brendan Mundorf, the 2006 America East Player of the Year, was recently concluded his first season with the Denver Outlaws of the Major Lacrosse League. He is one of the top rookie scorers in the league with 17 goals and 21 points for the Western Division leaders.

History...

To see how far America East has progressed, consider the conference was established in 1979 as the ECAC North. The conference at that time consisted of 10 institutions and sponsored league competition only in men's basketball, with the champion receiving an automatic bid to the NCAA Championship.

Men's basketball remained the lone league sport until the 1988-89 academic year. At that time, the conference's Board of Directors made a new commitment to an all-sports association, creating the North Atlantic Conference by establishing an office, hiring a full-time commissioner, and embarking on a building program.

The North Atlantic Conference merged with the Seaboard Conference (the league in which Boston University, Hartford, Maine, New Hampshire, and Vermont, among others, competed in women's basketball) in 1989 and the NAC looked to establish conference championships in several men's and women's sports.

The conference changed its name to America East prior to the 1996-97 academic year and moved the conference headquarters to its present location in downtown Boston in 1997.

In 2005, America East hired Patrick Nero, most recently the Director of Athletics at Maine, as the conference's third commissioner.

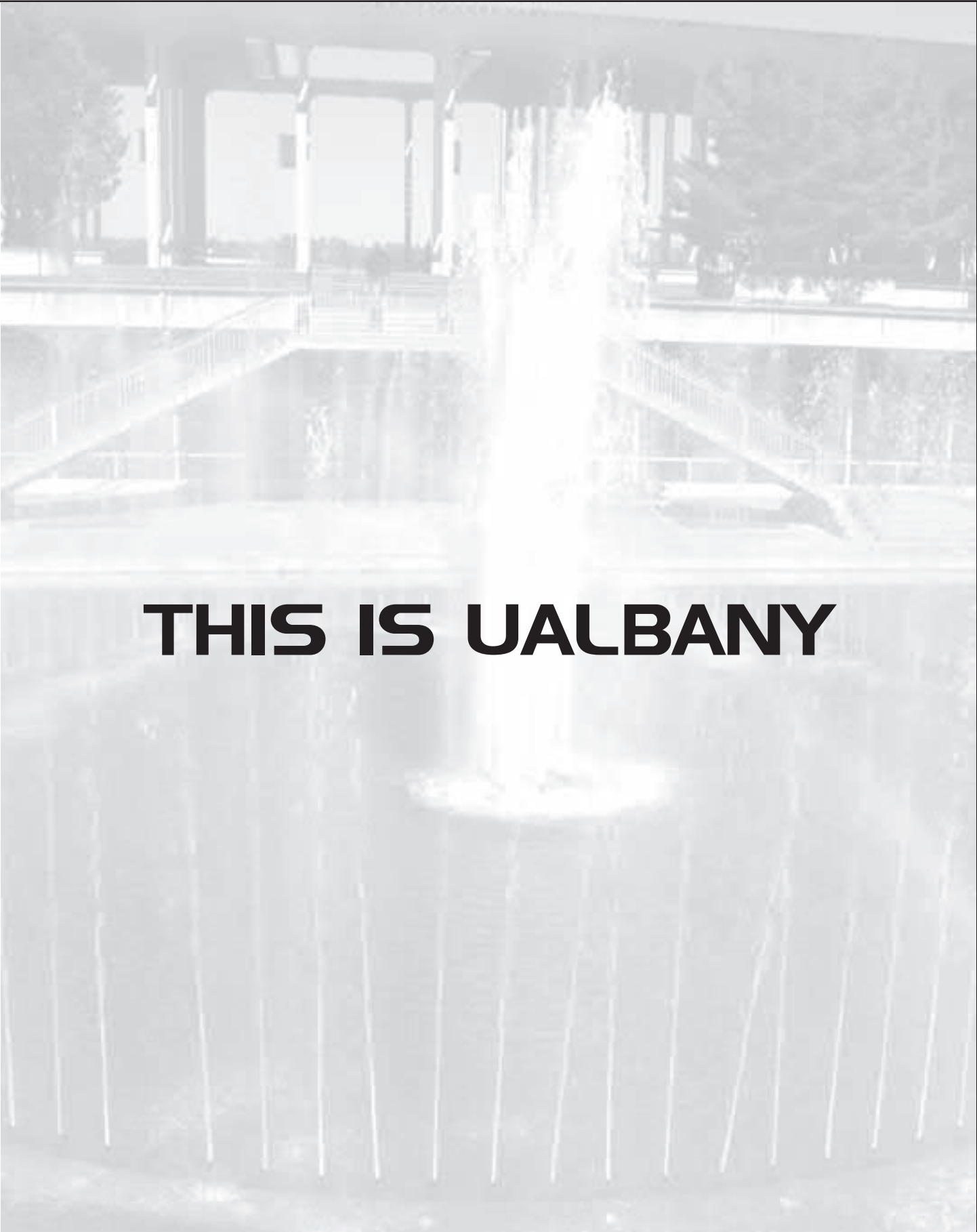

ALBANY NEW YORK'S CAPITAL

Albany, the state capital of New York, offers something for everyone, and is the center of a region remarkable for its natural and cultural resources.

The Capital District area represents the cities of Albany, Schenectady and Troy, and has a population of approximately 875,000. Within a short distance are the Berkshires, the Catskills and the Adirondacks, the largest wilderness area east of the Mississippi River.

Major ski areas such as Killington, Gore, Hunter, Bromley, Stratton and Mt. Snow are within easy commuting distance. Saratoga Springs, 25 miles to the north, is internationally known as a sports, concert, and cultural center, and features outstanding thoroughbred and harness racing at Saratoga Race Track.

Geographically, the city of Albany is only 150 miles from New York City, 175 miles from Boston, and 225 miles from Montreal in Canada. The New York State Thruway and two major interstate highways intersect one mile from the main campus. Bus, rail, and air terminals are all within ten minutes of the University.

Designated an All-America City by the National Civic League in 1991, Albany is dominated by the Nelson A. Rockefeller Empire State Plaza, a billion-dollar complex. It includes government buildings, a convention center, the state museum, and the state library.

Directly across from the Plaza stands the State Capitol Building. This majestic five-story structure, in existence since 1879, houses the governor's offices and the chambers of the State Senate and Assembly.

The Plaza has spurred the renovation of a large portion of historic downtown Albany. You will enjoy exploring the cosmopolitan area of old townhouses, boutiques and restaurants, or attending major sports, entertainment or cultural events at the Pepsi Arena, the host site for the 2001 NCAA Division I Ice Hockey Frozen Four, 2002 NCAA Division I Wrestling Championships, and 2003 NCAA Division I Men's Basketball East Regional.

This \$65.4 million arena seats approximately 17,500 with a 1,700-car parking facility. Pepsi Arena hosts nearly 200 events a year including professional basketball and hockey games, arena football, rock concerts, trade shows, and conventions. The arena previously hosted UAlbany's spring commencement.

The City of Albany has experienced unprecedented progress and development during the past fifteen years. Over \$1 billion in economic development projects have been implemented. The historic link between downtown Albany and the Hudson River was restored with the opening of the Hudson River Way Pedestrian Bridge and the construction of a multi-purpose amphitheatre at the Corning Park. The restoration of the historic Palace Theatre now provides a venue that complements the Pepsi Arena as a host to world class entertainers and cultural events.

Four major malls and shopping centers, including Crossgates, Stuyvesant Plaza and Colonie Center, fall within one mile of campus. Nightlife in Albany is lively with concerts, movies, theatre, dancing, and just about every kind of restaurant or eatery you can imagine. Most attractions or activities are a short walk or accessible through the local bus system.

Susan Herbst

Executive Vice President for Academic Affairs



Susan Herbst is Provost and Executive Vice President for Academic Affairs, a position she has held since September 2005. Provost Herbst came to the University at Albany, State University of New York having had a distinguished academic career, both as an administrator and scholar. As a provost and executive vice president, Herbst is the second highest administrator for the University, and fills the role of chief academic, budget and planning officer for the University.

Previously, Herbst was dean of the College of Liberal Arts at Temple University and professor of political science. Named to this role in 2003, she was responsible for strategic planning, finances, recruitment, fundraising, and alumni affairs for the college, which had more than 4,400 students, 25 departments, programs and centers, and an operating budget of more than \$35 million. At Temple, Herbst also participated in university governance, including serving on the Council of Deans and creating the university's first Board of Visitors for the College of Liberal Arts.

From 1989 until 2003, Herbst was at Northwestern University, where she held a variety of academic and administrative appointments, including associate dean for faculty affairs, chair of the political science department, program director for American studies, and professor of political science and communication studies. She was appointed by the President to chair both the Northwestern University Commission on Women and the University Program Review Council after having served as a member of each.

Herbst has authored numerous academic works, including *Reading Public Opinion: Political Actors View the Democratic Process* (University of Chicago Press, 1998), *Politics at the Margin: Historical Studies of Public Expression Outside the Mainstream* (Cambridge University Press, 1994), and *Numbered Voices: How Opinion Polling Has Shaped American Politics* (University of Chicago Press, 1993) for which she won the 1994 SCA Diamond Anniversary Book Award. Since 1996, Herbst has been co-editor of the University of Chicago Press series, *Studies in Political Communication, Media and Public Opinion*.

Herbst received her doctorate in communication theory and research from the University of Southern California, Annenberg School for Communications, in Los Angeles, and earned a bachelor of arts degree with honors from Duke University. She has also completed advanced research and study at the University of Michigan in Ann Arbor.

Dr. Lee A. McElroy Jr. is in his seventh year as the University at Albany's Vice President and Director of Athletics. McElroy, who provides leadership for UAlbany's NCAA Division I 19-sport intercollegiate athletics program for men and women and is a member of the University's Executive Committee, spearheaded a successful search for a broad-based athletic conference when the University accepted an invitation to join the America East Conference in the 2001-02 academic year.

During his tenure, UAlbany has won 17 conference championships and made NCAA appearances in men's basketball, men's lacrosse, softball, women's volleyball, and men's and women's

track and field. In 2004-05, the Great Danes were awarded the Commissioner's Cup as the America East Conference's top athletic program. McElroy has also worked to renew the men's and women's basketball crosstown rivalry with Siena College, led the development of a master plan to upgrade the school's athletic and recreational complex, plus has energized athletic development efforts.

McElroy, who serves as president of the National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics (NACDA) in 2006-07, was also a key figure as the University successfully completed the NCAA's second cycle of Division I athletics certification. He was honored with the 2004 General Robert R. Neyland Outstanding Athletic Director Award by the All-American Football Foundation.

McElroy, who played football at UCLA in the late 1960s, was previously American University's director of athletics for four years. American, a Division I school in Washington, D.C., competed in the Colonial Athletic Association. In that period, the AU athletic department upgraded to 19 sports, expanded corporate partners by 400 percent, and planned capital projects for a fitness facility, intramural field and soccer stadium. McElroy founded the Eagle Club, the department's fundraising arm, and developed a program rated as one of the top ten in the nation in its compliance with NCAA gender equity requirements.

Dr. McElroy served as president of the America East Conference Executive Committee in the 2003-04 academic year, and has gained national prominence for his roles with numerous professional organizations and NCAA committees. He served a three-year term on the NCAA Division I Management Council as one of four at-large representatives from I-AA or I-AAA conferences. McElroy previously worked on four prestigious NCAA Committees: Athletics Certification, Financial Aid, Degree Completion Program, and the NCAA Special Committee on Agents and Amateurism.

In 1998, McElroy was named to the NACDA Executive Committee for the University Division, and chair of the Sears Directors Cup Committee. The Sears Directors Cup is the only national award and academic scholarship program to recognize all NCAA and NAIA championship sports for women and men.

From 1989-96, McElroy was the director of athletics at California State University-Sacramento. He led the program's transition from Division II to Division I and engineered a move to the Big Sky and Big West conferences. He also implemented a strategic plan that developed a corporate partners plan, created an effective fundraising and marketing program, redesigned academic support services, improved the athletic facilities complex, and provided for campus and community outreach programs.

McElroy also worked at the University of Houston from 1981 to 1988 as an assistant director of men's and women's sports and as an associate director of athletics, and for one year as the director of athletics at The University of the District of Columbia. Before joining the Houston staff, he taught in the public school systems of Santa Monica, California and Beaumont, Texas, and was a high school principal in Beaumont.

Along with his duties for the NCAA, McElroy has testified before congressional committees on issues in college athletics, such as gender equity, the welfare of the minority student-athlete, and the academic/athletic balance. McElroy serves on the boards of the National Consortium of Academics and Sports, Athletic Business magazine, and the National Minority Golf Association. He is also a fellow at the Institute of Ethics and Sportsmanship at the University of Rhode Island.

McElroy, who resides with his wife, Karen, in Slingerlands, earned his B.S. in political science and history from UCLA in 1970. He later received a M.Ed. from the University of Southern California, and an Ed.D. from the University of Houston.

UALBANY ATHLETICS

The University at Albany and its intercollegiate athletics program continue to move forward in the 21st century. UAlbany's athletic teams are beginning their eighth year of competition at the National Collegiate Athletic Association's Division I level. The upgrade began in September 1999 and elevated all men's and women's programs, and placed football in the NCAA's Division I-AA classification.

In 2001, UAlbany accepted an invitation to become a member of the America East Conference. Eighteen of the school's nineteen varsity teams are eligible through America East play for conference championships and NCAA post-season competition. Football, as a Division I-AA program, has been a Northeast Conference associate member since 1999.

UAlbany has won 17 conference championships since moving to Division I. In 2005-06, the Great Danes captured America East titles in men's basketball, men's and women's outdoor track & field, men's indoor track and softball. The basketball team produced one of the most significant achievements in the school's intercollegiate history. The program's turnaround from two years ago resulted in a strong showing against No. 2 Connecticut in the NCAA Tournament.

In 2004-05, UAlbany was awarded the Stuart P. Haskell, Jr. Commissioner's Cup, which annually recognizes the strongest athletic program in the America East Conference based on success both during the regular season and at championship competition. UAlbany's point total was bolstered by America East titles in volleyball, men's lacrosse, men's outdoor track and field and softball. The Great Danes were also runners-up in men's indoor track and field and women's golf.

In addition, the UAlbany men's lacrosse program secured its third consecutive NCAA berth. Volleyball and softball became the first women's sports to qualify for NCAA Division I post-season play. Meanwhile, Kurt Campbell became the first UAlbany football player to be selected in the NFL Draft when he went in the seventh round to the Green Bay Packers.

UAlbany has an athletic history that dates back to the late 1890s when the first known intercollegiate teams arrived on campus. Albany competed at the college division level prior to the NCAA's restructuring in 1972. The athletic program moved from Division III to Division II in 1995-96.

UAlbany's intercollegiate program has a new direction, but continues to excel in the athletic realm, producing competitive teams, successful coaches, and outstanding student-athletes recognized for their accomplishments both on the field and in the classroom. The University sponsors 19 varsity sports for men and women. Club sports, an intramural program and recreational opportunities are also offered.

The quality of UAlbany's athletic program is evidenced by some of the finest facilities in the nation. The indoor and outdoor physical education design is among the most comprehensive in the Northeast.

In the spring of 1992, the University opened the Recreation and Convocation Center (RACC), an \$11 million state-of-the-art facility. The RACC is the home for UAlbany's men's and women's basketball teams, and has an .11 mile indoor track. The 5,000-seat arena also

serves as a major venue for community events such as rock and pop concerts, sporting events and University activities. The playing surface on the arena's three basketball courts and the surrounding track was completely renovated in December 2004.

In addition, the RACC contains a fitness center with Nautilus and Universal machines, rowing ergometers and exercise bikes; four racquetball/handball courts and four squash courts; athletic training and rehabilitation facilities with three whirlpool baths, a musculoskeletal evaluation device and other therapeutic machines.

Adjacent to the RACC is the Physical Education Building which houses University Gym; three full-size playing surfaces which can be used for basketball, volleyball, and tennis; four racquetball/handball courts; four squash courts; a swimming pool; a fitness and weight training center with Olympic weights; an aerobic exercise room, and a dance studio.

The RACC and Physical Education Building were air-conditioned in March 1996, as the state appropriated funds for renovations and permanent improvements to the University's facilities. The \$2.3 million in funding was prompted by the New York Giants' decision to hold their football training camp on campus. The project brought together the region's community in what has proven to be a successful partnership.

In addition, UAlbany's air-supported structure, fitted with a brand-new covering with minor interior renovations in the spring of 2003, is located to the east of the Physical Education Building, and may be utilized for tennis, basketball, volleyball, and indoor football practice.

The indoor complex is complemented by fine outdoor facilities, including University Field, which has football seating for 5,000, plus an all-weather, 400-meter track surrounding a natural grass surface. There are 12 lighted tennis courts and numerous fields for football, soccer, softball, baseball, lacrosse, field hockey, and other events.

The practice fields on the Western Avenue side of campus were renovated in June 1996 with 263,000 square feet of two-inch-thick athletic sod. The irrigation system was refurbished, and the area was surrounded with a 3,100-foot chain-link fence.

UAlbany broke ground on the site of what has become two all-weather athletic fields in May 2005. "John Fallon Field" is the home to the men's and women's lacrosse teams, and features a sand and rubber infill turf field that stretches 99,450 square feet. An adjacent surface known as "Alumni Turf Field" is used for women's field hockey in addition to serving as a multi-use recreational field for UAlbany students. The first phase of the complex's construction, which included lighting, landscaping and fencing, was recently completed.

JAY GEIGER HEAD ATHLETIC TRAINER

Jay Geiger was named head athletic trainer in October 2006. He is responsible for aspects of the sports medicine program, including preventive training, injury rehabilitation and nutrition counseling. Geiger supervises a staff of four full-time assistants and several volunteer trainers.

Previous to his present appointment, Geiger served as assistant athletics director and head trainer at the College of Saint Rose since 1996. He supervised an assistant, three graduate assistants and 20 student interns who provided a sports medicine service for the school's 220 student-athletes. Geiger began his career as an intern on the athletics training staff at Siena College. He later came to Saint Rose as a graduate assistant in the fall of 1994.

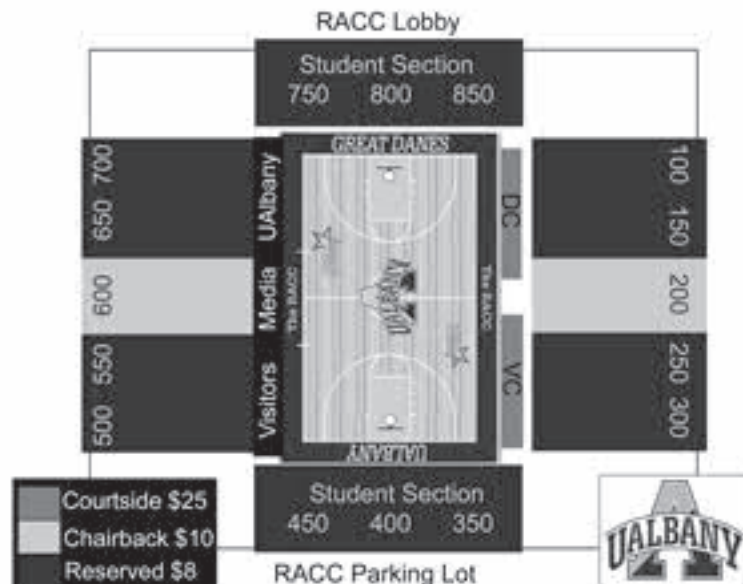

Compliance Guidelines for Boosters

For the benefit of the many alumni, fans and booster club members who are so active in supporting and assisting the the Great Danes throughout the year, UAlbany Athletic Compliance would like to remind everyone of a few definitions and rules that apply to all athletic representatives and boosters.

UAlbany is committed to observing the NCAA guidelines concerning representatives of athletic interests (aka boosters) and institutional control. Our institutional responsibility to rules compliance includes responsibility for actions of all individuals and organizations engaged in activities promoting UAlbany's athletics interests.

Institutional Control -- It is the responsibility of UAlbany to control its intercollegiate athletics program in compliance with the rules and regulations of the NCAA.

Responsibility -- UAlbany's responsibility for the conduct of its program includes the responsibility for the actions of its staff members and for the actions of any other individual, booster or organization engaged in activities promoting the athletic interests of the institution.

Serve As A Resource -- Help support UAlbany Athletics by serving as a resource for community service, career development or other programming activity.

Student-Athlete Advisory Committee -- The purpose of the Student-Athlete Advisory Committee (SAAC) is to serve as liaisons between the athletic administration and student-athletes. The members of SAAC act as the "voice" of the student-athletes and disseminate information given to them, by administrators, to their respective teams. SAAC is a vehicle for student-athletes to improve upon student-athlete welfare, as well as help coordinate community service, life skills and various other activities for the athletic department.

Compliance -- UAlbany must monitor its program to assure compliance and to identify and report to the NCAA such instances in which compliance has not been achieved. An institution found to have violated NCAA rules is subject to disciplinary and corrective actions as determined by the NCAA.

Athletic Representative/Booster -- You are considered to be a UAlbany athletic representative if you are a present or past member of a UAlbany booster club or agency that promotes the intercollegiate athletics program; have made financial contributions to the athletic department or to an athletic booster organization; are, or have been providing benefits (e.g., summer jobs, meals, etc.) to enrolled student-athletes, their family members or friends; are, or have been involved in any manner of promoting the UAlbany intercollegiate athletics program.

Prospective Student-Athlete -- A prospective student-athlete is a student who has started classes for the ninth grade or above, including students in prep schools and junior colleges as well as students who have officially withdrawn from a four-year institution and plan to transfer to another institution. In addition, a student who has not started classes for the ninth grade becomes a prospective student-athlete if the institution or a booster provides the individual or the individual's relatives or friends with any financial assistance or benefits that the institution does not provide to prospective students in general.

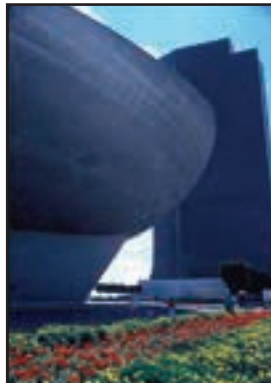

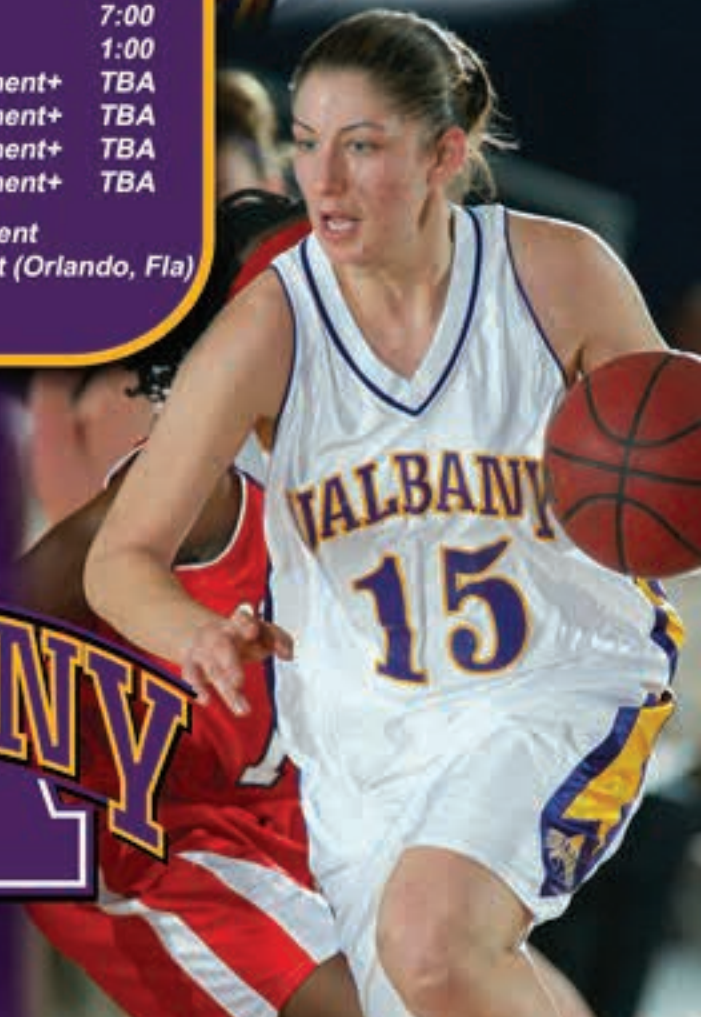

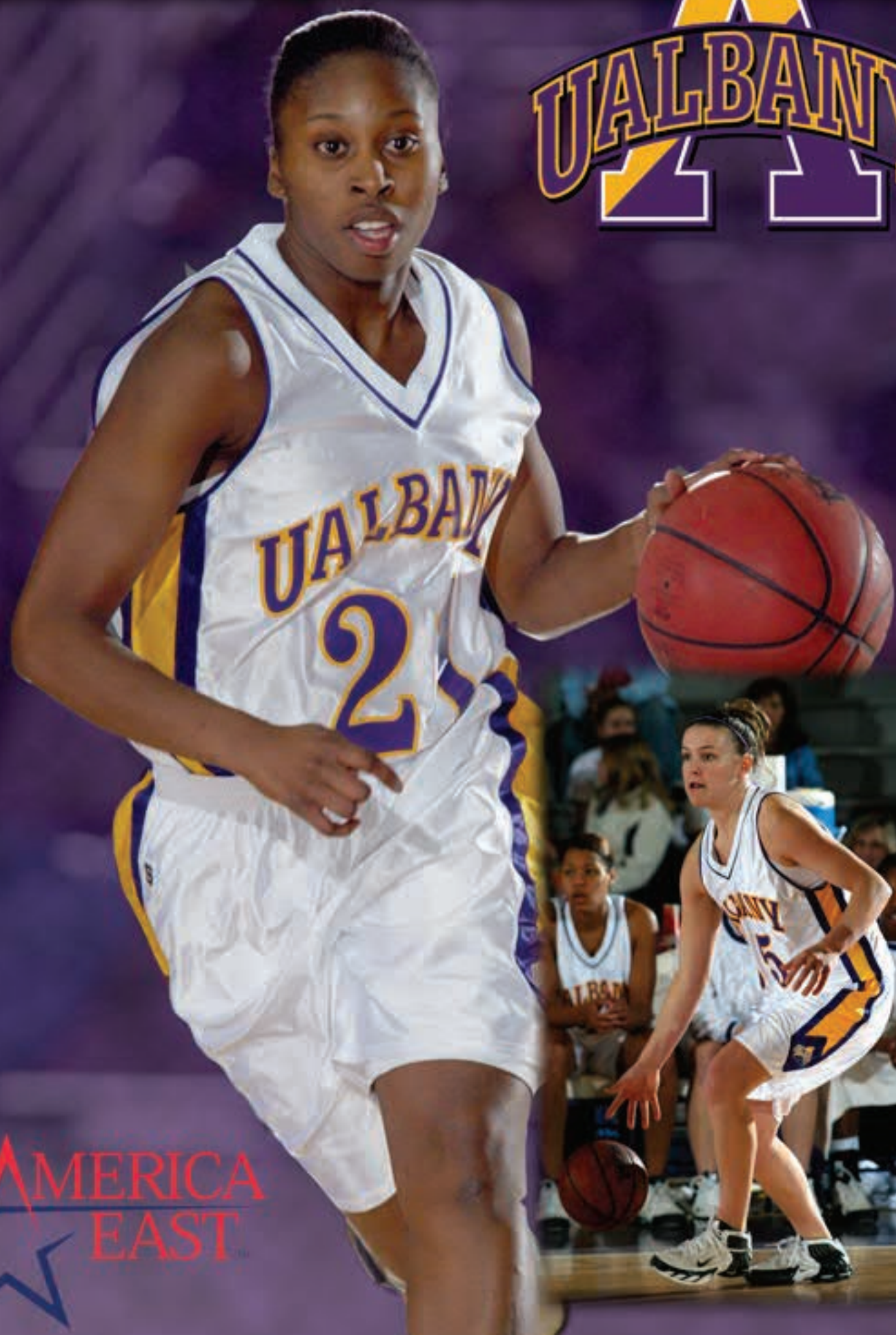

UAlbany Athletics

The University at Albany athletics program continued its success in the 2005-06 athletic year. With momentum from the 2004-05 Stuart P. Haskell, Jr. Commissioner's Cup, which recognizes the strongest athletic program in the America East Conference, the Great Danes captured five conference championships, two regular-season championships, and saw numerous student-athletes garner individual accolades, including five All-America honorees.

UAlbany won America East championships in men's basketball, men's indoor and outdoor track & field, women's outdoor track & field, and softball. In addition, the Great Danes were runners-up in women's indoor track & field and men's lacrosse. Volleyball and men's basketball also won conference regular-season titles, led by America East Conference Player of the Years and All-Americans Blair Buchanan and Jamar Wilson, respectively.

In addition, men's basketball made its first-ever NCAA Tournament appearance, becoming the first Division I program in the State University of New York system to accomplish the feat. Building on the mantra "Why not us?" the Great Danes nearly became the first 16-seed to topple a one-seed when they faced the University of Connecticut. Softball became the first women's program to make back-to-back trips to NCAA post-season play, while Gered Burns, Joe Greene and Marc Palozzi became the first Division I track & field All-Americans for the Great Danes.

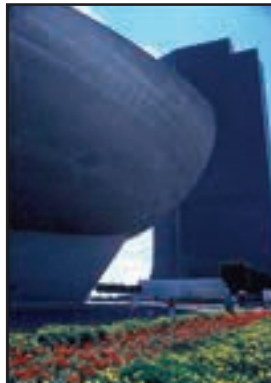
