Description: Entire degree requirements were restructured. Some concentrations were removed due to faculty expertise. New foundational core guidelines allow students to have choices in which areas of history they would like to study. A methods course was added to ensure students have more of an understanding of the methods historians use. A capstone course was created to increase rigor and have a significant culmination of their studies within the major.
