Committee Submits Report

At this assembly, the Constitution Committee, under the chairmanship of Richard Hinck '58, will submit its report. The committee was authorized by SA a month ago to submit a new constitution for State College student government.

Weekend Project

A motion will be presented to allow SA to vote on the new document next Friday by absentee ballot. An Open Hearing is scheduled for Tuesday at 8:30 in the Brubacher gameroom. The members of the committee will explain the fundamental principles of the proposed Constitution following Monday evening supper at all group houses.

The members of the committee spent the first weekend of the Easter recess at South Park House, where they drew up a rough draft to the constitution. Since their return to classes, the group has met to write and clear up minor points of the constitution.

Drastic Revisions

The proposed Constitution calls for a radical revision in both the philosophy and mechanics of student government. These are some of the changes included in the document, which is printed in full on page 3: No Student Association Convocations of a legislative nature; January to January offices; a Student Senate; Myskania in the capacity of a student court; a Presidential cabinet, and the expansion of student government into fields both academic and non-academic.

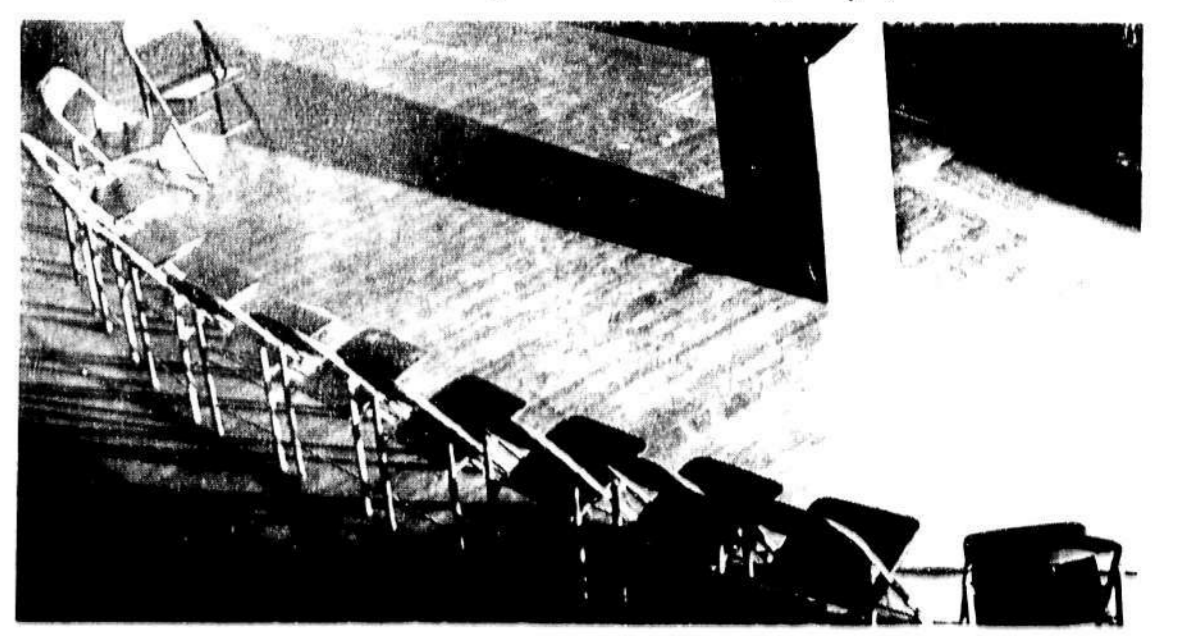
Theatre Players To Present Tragedy

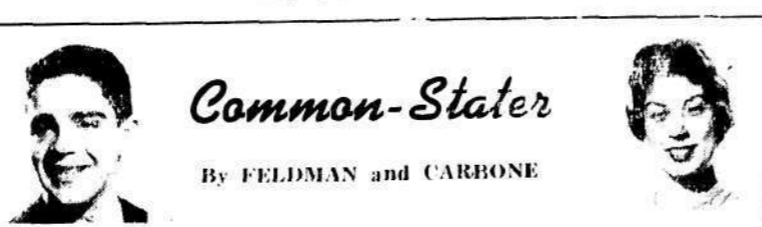

Read It! The Proposed SA Constitution; Abolishes Assemblies, Creates Senate

CONSTITUTION of the Student Association of New York State College for Teachers at Albany

PREAMBLE. We, the students of New York State College for Teachers, in order to establish an organization of self-government, to promote a widespread interest in student affairs, to promote a clear and continuous exchange of ideas between the students and the administration, to develop a greater spirit of progressive citizenship, to further the activities of student life, and to assume the fullest responsibilities and powers of self-government not inconsistent with the policies of the administration of this college, do ordain and establish this Student Association Constitution of New York State College for Teachers at Albany.

ARTICLE I. Name. The name of this organization shall be the Student Association of New York State College for Teachers at Albany.

ARTICLE II. Purposes. The purposes of this organization are to deal effectively with matters of student affairs, to perpetuate the best traditions and ideals of this college, to promote the best of good will and understanding between the faculty, administration and students to the end that the work of this college may be made of lasting value to the students, to work with the administration in all matters affecting the Student Association, to enact and enforce such laws as are deemed necessary for the promotion of the welfare of the students, and to control and direct student activities in order that they may be conducted for the best interests of the Student Association as a whole and to the credit of New York State College for Teachers.

ARTICLE III. Membership. All regularly enrolled undergraduates shall be members of the Student Association.

ARTICLE IV. Executive Department. Section 1. The President of the Student Association. A. Qualifications. 1. The President shall be elected by the members of the Student Association.

B. The duties and powers of the President shall be: 1. To appoint a cabinet with the approval of the Senate. 2. To preside over all meetings of the Cabinet and Senate. 3. To execute all legislation passed by the Senate. 4. To initiate legislation in the Senate at his discretion.

C. The duties and powers of the Vice-President shall be: 1. To assume the duties of the President at his request or in his absence. 2. To coordinate all the committees of the Senate. 3. To serve as a non-voting member of the Senate. 4. To serve as a Cabinet member.

ARTICLE VII. The Term of Office. All elected officers shall assume office at the beginning of second semester and serve until the beginning of the following academic year, with the following exception. Junior Class officers shall hold office until the end of their Senior year.

Moving-Up Procedure

The following procedure has been outlined for tomorrow, Moving-Up Day:

- Professional, 9 a.m. 1. Seniors will form a double line beginning at Minerva and ending in the peristyle leading to the library. 2. Juniors will meet by the Registrar's office and their line will extend into the peristyle of Husted.

- 3. Sophomore lines will start in the Annex area at the foot of the steps to Husted and will end at the Co-op in Lower Draper. 4. The freshmen double lines will start behind the Sophomores at the girls' locker room in Lower Draper and will extend to the lower library.

At 9:30 a.m. the procession will begin with the Senior Class marching down the front steps of Draper, turning right at the walk which leads to Husted, turning left to the walk at Page Hall. The Juniors, Sophomores, and freshmen will follow the Seniors, in order, to Page Hall.

Seating. 1. Seniors in front, center section, main floor. 2. Juniors in the right section of the main floor and in the right section of the balcony.

Recessional. Myskania leads, going on the right aisle, and forming a line on either side of the Page Hall steps. The four classes follow in order: 1. Seniors will go down the walk by Husted Hall. 2. Juniors will follow the Seniors. At the end of the Page walk, they will turn right and proceed down the walk by Albany High. 3. Sophomores follow the Juniors, turning left at the end of Page walk to go through the Senior lines. 4. Freshmen will follow the Juniors, turning right to go through the Junior lines. The classes will walk out of Page in a double file, the couples splitting as they turn either right or left to form a single line on either side of the path. The Sophomores go through the Junior lines. When everyone is out of the auditorium, the Seniors in turn go through the Sophomore lines and the Juniors go through the freshmen lines.

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State Attends Intercollegiate Mock Senate

Emil Polak '57 announces that the seventh annual New York State Inter-collegiate Mock Senate was held last weekend. The Mock Senate was held in the Assembly Chambers of the State Capitol at Albany.

Over twenty colleges in New York State were represented including Albany State. Among other colleges were Rosary Hill, Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute, Siena, New York University, Hofstra and Adelphi.

State Representatives

Representing State were four senators: Marcia Lawrence '57, Grunna Cohen '59 and Frances Greenberg and Jack Trombly, freshmen.

Also from Albany were Polak, who was Sergeant of Arms, and assistant Sergeant of Arms, Michael Sbanl '60. Malcolm Rogers '57 was a member of the Steering Committee, which included representatives of several colleges and made all plans for the Senate.

Colleges Submit Bills

Committee work and debate on bills comprised the greatest part of the meeting.

The bills which were submitted and passed by Albany State included one to have bakers supply uniforms for their employees and to prevent force in the wholesaling of alcoholic beverages.

Other colleges submitted bills to establish a required course in vocational guidance in all New York secondary schools; to prohibit the sale of intoxicating beverages to minors under twenty-one; and, to require safety belts as standard equipment for motor vehicles.

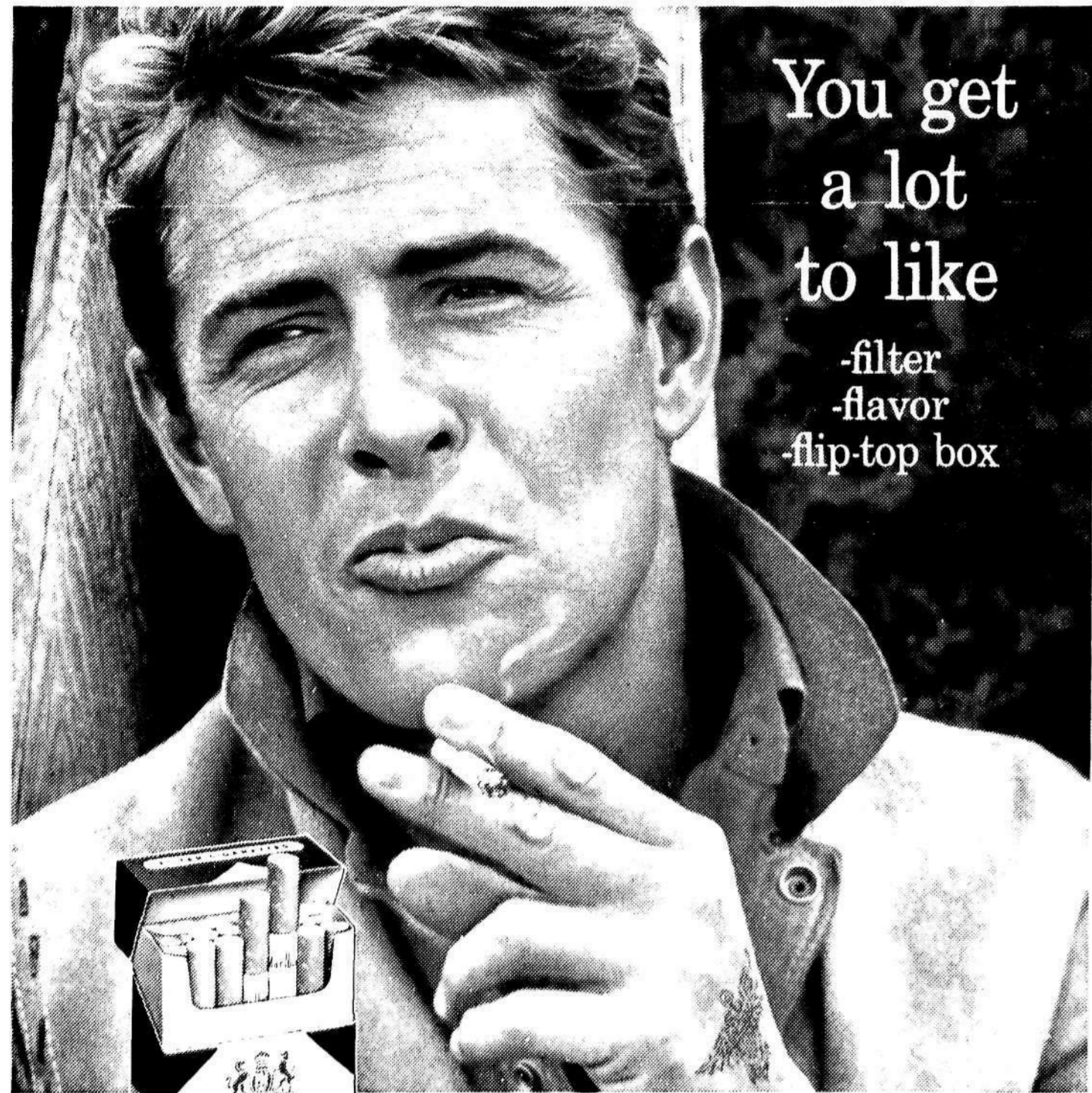
Useless Equipment

Richard Hinck Triumphs As SA President; Defeats Tate By Thirteen Votes; Myskania Numbers Thirteen

Myskania No. 42 Ascends Steps McClain Victorious As SA Vice-President; Including Seven Women, Six Men Elect Cali, Harter SA Secretary, Songleader

With all the members of Myskania reaching the quota, the Senior Honorary Society will have seven women and six men this year. This breaks the two-year tradition of having eight women and five men in the Judicial Society.

After the classes had "moved up" to their new positions and everyone had sung "Arm in Arm," the Tapping ceremonies began. The old Myskania filed to the second row of seats on the stage in preparation for the tapping, and Marilyn Elizabeth DeSanta, Chairman of Myskania second semester, and Sara Jane Duffy, Chairman of Myskania first semester, and Clyde Irving Payne, President of Student Association, came forward to the rostrum.

Payne acted as the speaker and announced the names of the new members of the Honorary Judiciary Society, while Miss DeSanta and Miss Duffy presented them with purple and gold tassels which are the school colors.

Sheila Lister and Robert Burns left the stage next to tap the second person of the honored thirteen. The name of JOSEPH ANTHONY SZAREK boomed out as they stopped next to the row in which he was sitting. Szarek is Co-Editor-in-Chief of the State College News.

Third to be tapped was JOHN EDWARD STEFANO, the retiring president of the Class of 1958. Marcia McKenzie Lawrence and Anderson escorted Stefano to the rostrum where Miss DeSanta pinned on his purple and gold tassel.
