First Elected Marshal; To Head Campus Group

Marjorie Breunig, '44, defeated Georgia Hardesty Bombard, '44, by five votes, to become the Grand Marshal for this year. Of the 662 ballots cast in last Friday's election, 334 votes went to Miss Breunig and 328, to Mrs. Bombard. The election was precedent-breaking in that it marked the first time the entire student body elected the Grand Marshal, a major office under the Major-Minor office plan. When the Grand Marshal's sole duty was to supervise Moving-Up Day procedure, the office was filled by a Student Council appointment The Myskania resolution revising Campus Commission added another responsibility to the office, that of heading the Commission.

With this revision of Campus Commission, for the remainder of the year, the present members and the class marshals will comprise the committee.
