



National GIO War Relief Committee

On November 11th, 1942, Red Cross Girl Sally Elting of Boston went out into the foggy streets of London town and rounded up 10

They solemnly witnessed the ceremony of opening American Red Cross Rainbow Corner in Piccadilly-the Times Square of London. Sally unlocked the door, dropped the key into the nearest gutter -and for all anybody cares it may be there yet!

Two years later, at the anniversary celebration, 74,419 soldiers were checked through that same door during the 24 hours from midnight to midnight. For since that key was thrown away the door has never been closed—except for an hour and a half last June when a "doodlebug" came too close for comfort.

SERVED A MILLION MEALS

Ten million soldiers have passed through the club during the two years of operation—and during the first year alone over a million main meals and the same number of snacks were served. Soft drinks at the soda fountain sell at the rate of 10,000 per week, while the steps down to Dunkers' Den, the all-night stop-off for coffee and doughnuts, have become so worn by the ten million pairs of GI boots that they have recently been remodeled.

Under the directorship of Verbon Gay, formerly of New Orleans, the American staff numbers 11. British volunteers-182 of themdo everything from serving in the cafeteria to sewing on buttons, and put in 5.016 hours per month.

In the big ball room more than 700 men are accommodated every Tuesday night to witness GI boxing matches, and on other night from 500 to 1,000 couples jitterbug to GI bands. HOSPITALITY BUREAU

It's not for nothing that Rainbow Corner lobby is known as Penn. Station. Piccadilly. But what cannot be counted are the numerous reunions of old friends, the new friendships, the thrills and the heartaches of the staff who have come to love their thousands of guests as comrades and brothers: the awful quietness of the lobby during the invasion period—the strange, half-fearful joy when some of them returned, wearing Purple Hearts and telling many a story, some tragic, some reassuring; the Air Corps gunners they've "sweated" out through their missions—the men they've said goodbye to, adding "Give my love to the Statue of Liberty."

Rainbow Corner is more than the biggest service club in the world—more than a collection of astronomical figures and food re-

It's a place to go to for more than just physical refreshment— War Labor it's the GI's home away from home.


