MISS LAUT UNFOLDS WESTERN EPIC; SARASIN WRITES ITALIAN ROMANCE

The Conquest of Our Western Empire. By Agnes C. Laut 363 pages. New York: Robert M. Mckride and Company
Miss Laut, who has won considerable attention with lie popular epics of the wimming of the West, has writte amother stirring accomt of the carving of an etmpire. Mis Laut has the faculty of writing history so that even reader: of Western Storics would read it avidly. By this we dio ot mean to say that our more literary readers would no be interested; in fact, they too will be thrilled with the historie incidents she narrates.
Beginning with the eruise of the Lodestar of the Westorn Sea, Miss Laut unfolds in a graphic manner the de elopment of the Pacific Northwest. What her Blazed Trail of the Old lironticr did for the plains, her new volume does for the empire of salmon and tall timbers.
