✓ The Principal, Prof. Cochran, presented, in a
written communication, his views of the import-
ance of object teaching, or the plan of Petalozzi,
as practiced in the London Queen & Colonial
Painting School, and of the important aid
which a knowledge of the system would afford
to the pupils of the Normal School.

The introduction of instruction on this system
would involve the occupancy of a department
of children between the ages of six and ten years,
and alterations in the building to provide
a suitable room for about forty pupils.

After some time spent in considering the
subject, it was resolved that the Committee
approve of the object proposed, and that Mr.
Austin, Mr. Townsend and Mr. Woolworth
be a committee to examine the building
and ascertain what alterations will be necessary
for carrying out the plan proposed, and
the cost of the same, and to report at a
future meeting of this Committee.

The matter of the provisional ap-
pointment of Mr. Amos P. Kelley made August
8. 1859, as professor of the Natural Sciences
was called up, and after some time spent there
on, the Secretary was directed to inform
Mr. Kelley, that while the committee entertain
a high estimate of his diligence and fidelity
they are of opinion that the interests of the
School will be promoted by making that
appointment absolute, and that his services

will therefore not be required after the present term.
The Committee then adjourned.




