

On motion of Dr. Ward the report was received, adopted and ordered to be entered in full on the Minutes.

Mr. Morrison called attention to the advisability of settling the contractor's bills for work on the New Building — and on motion of Mr. Draper it was

Resolved, that on the certificate of the architect the sum of eight thousand dollars be paid to ✓ Mr. Skattuck on his contract for mason work.

On motion of Mr. Draper it was further  
Resolved, that, in as much as Dr. David Munay has been put to much additional labor and care as treasurer in connection with the erection of the New Building and has received no compensation therefor, that he be paid the sum of one fourth ( $\frac{1}{4}$ ) of one per cent of the money disbursed by him for the purposes of said New Building —  
The Committee then adjourned.

On motion of Mr. Fryer it was resolved that the building committee be instructed to let the contract for the iron fence and railings at the new building to the lowest bidder.

After discussion it was ordered that the architect be requested to prepare a sketch and procure bids thereupon for the erection of a suitable tablet of Tennessee marble for the new building — said tablet to be inscribed with the names of the Executive Committee during the erection of the building and the names of the building committee.

Various devices were suggested for filling the space above the door of the new building and also for designating the name on said building and after due consideration the matter was referred to Dr. Ward for further inquiry.

It was ordered that the sitters now standing at the new building be sold to any person or persons desiring the same at a sum not less than 50\$ per running foot.

No further business appearing the committee then adjourned.
