## Association Wins Award for Alumni Giving

SUNYA's Alumni Association has become one of 253 winners in the 1972 U.S. Steel Alumni Giving Incentive Award program. More than 1,500 alumni programs were included in the total judging administered by the American Alumni Council.

The association won the award for "distinguished achievement in alumni support" based on a 95% increase in alumni giving from 1969-70 to 1970-71. The dollar amount of the giving rose from \$11,190 to \$21,720 and paralleled an increase in the association's dues-paying membership from 1,664 to 2,433.

## United Fund/Joint Appeal Campaign Begins Wednesday

The annual United Fund/Joint Appeal campaign on campus will kick off on Wednesday. All personnel of the SUNYA community again will be asked to join together in giving generously. Coordinator of the drive and faculty chairman is Roy Klages, professor of marketing in the School of Business.

Representing an increase of 14.1% over the 1972 goal, \$43,200 is the SUNYA community's share of the Albany area target amount of \$2,409,000. The latter is considered to be the amount needed to meet the ever-increasing needs of the total community.

Specified amounts can be withheld each pay period through payroll deduction. Such an arrangement will aid university personnel in contributing because the first deduction will be made in January 1973.

Commented Dr. Klages, "How much an employee contributes to the campaign this year must be determined by each employee's own conscience, heart, and ability to give." Last year \$37,848 was raised, an amount which was 10% over the quota; however, only 38% of the university community gave.

"We need at least 80% participating to meet the goal this year," added Dr. Klages. Each person will be seen individually and each contribution will be sealed. Working again this year in support of the drive will be 130 volunteers who already have begun their work.

## Drug Program

Middle Earth, the drug education program on campus, is being funded again this year by the Narcotics Addiction Control Commission. Sponsoring the program, with the aid of \$39,992, is the Council on Health and Drug Education, representing the Student Affairs Council and the Student Association.

Richard D. Tryon, assisted by part-time student staff and a large number of student volunteers, is coordinator for the student-run program. Also, Dr. David Serone, pharmacologist, and Dr. Susan Roy, counseling psychologist, are part of a training team which assists in the several aspects of the project.

The campaign slogan this year is "It All Depends on You." Dr. Klages points out, "Remember, the Joint Appeal works for you — for all of us — not just for the handicapped, aged, and the destitute. When you help others you help yourself, and at the same time, you strengthen the fabric of our society and the community in which you live."

The 33 voluntary agencies supported by the Joint Appeal reach many people with a wide range of health, education, character building, family, and community services.

## Music, Theatre Offerings Slated

Musical and theatrical offerings on campus are getting into full swing.

Tomorrow night the Dorian Woodwind Quintet will play works by Mozart, Bach, Vivaldi, and Milhaud beginning at 8:30 in the Main Theatre. Tickets for the concert, sponsored by Music Council, are available at the box office at \$3, \$2, and \$1. This evening, also beginning at 8:30, there will be a faculty concert at no charge in the Recital Hall. Rene Prins, Ruth McKee, and Sue Morton will play music for oboe and bassoon from 1577 to 1968.

Experimental Theatre's first production of the fall season is "They Told Me You Came This Way," a play by David Epstein, on Sept. 29 through Oct. 1 in the Arena Theatre. Performances are Friday at 4 p.m. (a preview), 7:30 p.m. and 9 p.m.; Saturday at 7:30 p.m. and 9 p.m.; and Sunday at 7:30 p.m. and 9 p.m.

Admission is free to Experimental Theatre productions; however, those planning to attend must obtain a ticket at the Performing Arts Center box office beginning a half hour before the performance.

Directing the two-man cast is James Leonard. Joe Ritter and Jerry Faber alternate playing "Alex," and Larry Brown and Keith Smith do the same for "Peter."

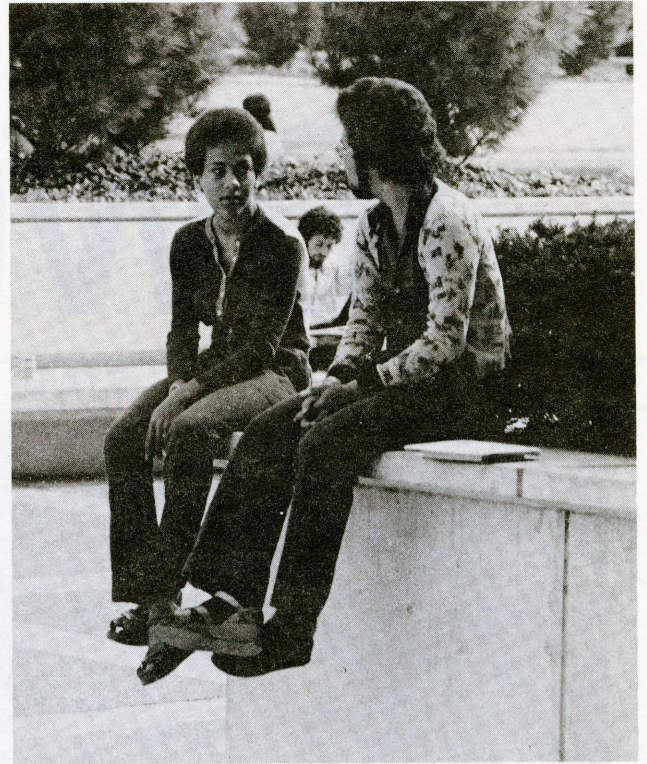

prove the general alumni program and to provide support for university projects which are not able to obtain state funding.

Alumni giving at Albany dates back to a fund to build a memorial window at the Normal School on Willett Street in 1892. In the late 1920's and '30's, alumni raised well over \$300,000 to build Pierce and Sayles halls. Funds gained from their sale in 1965 now provide more than \$30,000 yearly for scholarships.

The most recent major alumni fund effort raised the money to purchase the carillon bells housed in the central tower on campus.





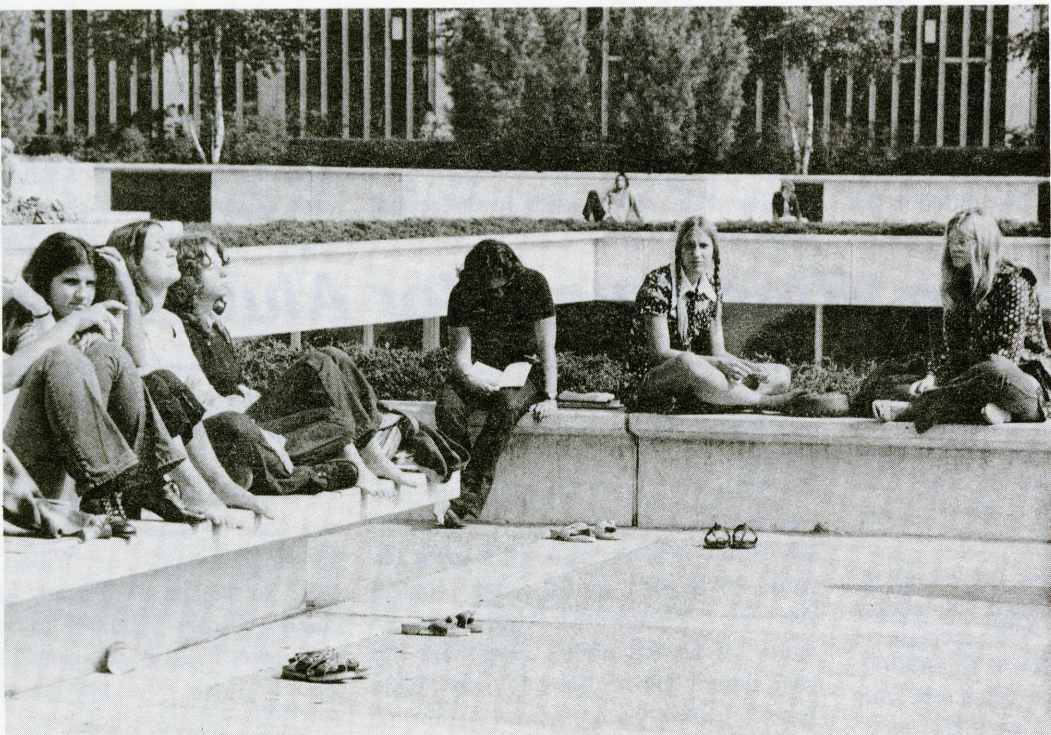

# Amendments Referendum To Go Before SA Voters

Impeachment and recall procedures for Student Association officers and Central Council representatives will be the subject of a referendum which is scheduled to go before the SUNYA student body this week. If the three constitutional amendments are favorably received, the process by which unsatisfactory officers are removed will be simplified.

The proposed amendments make it easier for a representative's constituency to initiate action against him. A new addition would also allow two thirds of Central Council to dismiss a member due to excessive absences. The referendum will be held this Tuesday, Wednesday, and Thursday from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. in the Campus Center Main Lounge.

## Alumni To Begin Drive for Funds

Plans for the first alumni fund drive in several years were approved at the recent Alumni Association Board of Directors meeting. The board approved the concepts of the drive, scheduled to be the first Annual Fund Drive, as proposed by a steering committee which has been working in consultation with students, administration, and faculty.

The development of an Alumni House-Conference Center has been tentatively selected as the project around which the efforts will center. Details will be developed by special committees of the board over the next month with further announcement slated by early November.

Contributions from alumni built Sayles and Pierce Halls in the 1930's and provided the carillon in the tower more recently.

Teams of students and staff have already begun the process of contacting alumni personally to define the need and the project. Efforts will continue through the fall and spring.

## GSPA Interns

## Recipient of Merriam Award Elected Co-Captain of Harriers

Junior cross-country runner Bill Sorel received a double dose of recognition last week, as he was elected co-captain of the 1972 harriers and was named this year's recipient of the Howard Steele Merriam Award. Senior Scott Abercombie was chosen co-captain with Sorel.

The Merriam Award is a cash prize given to a returning squad member in memory of Merrim, who graduated from Albany in 1965 and died in an automobile accident in 1968. He was a member of the first two cross-country teams at Albany and also competed in varsity wrestling. The award is given on the basis of need, attitude, character, and ability.

Sorel, one of eight children, is an Albany native and a product of Cardinal McCloskey High School, where he lettered cross-country and track. He is in his second season on the Albany varsity after a year on the freshman squad.

## August Grants Total \$227,780

Vice President for Research Louis R. Salkever has reported that during August \$227,780 was received in grants for research and programs. Of the total, \$139,885 was received for sponsored research and \$87,895, for sponsored programs.

Recipients include Nelson Cue, physics, \$6,500 for "X-Ray Excitations with Heavy Charged Particles", from Research Corporation; James Jiusto, Atmospheric Science Research Center, \$4,650 for "Study of Snow Flake Characteristics" and "Testing and Evaluation of the Electrodynamical Fog Dispersion", from National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration and Federal Aviation Administration.

## Talent Sought

The university has adopted a "talented student admissions program" (TSAP) that will set aside a maximum of 5% of each incoming freshman class for students displaying excellence in a particular field. The program, which was approved by the Undergraduate Academic Council, will take effect for the freshman class entering in the fall of 1973.

Eligible for admission under the new program will be an applicant who is participating in a college preparatory program in his high school and who has at least an 80% average or is in the upper 50% of his class. Comparatively, the average student admitted as a freshman at the university last fall carried an approximate 90% high school grade.
