An employee removed from payroll because of "lack of suitable work" should apply immediately for benefits. These are usually cases where, due to an injury or illness, the employee can no longer continue on his regular job, and must be placed on work that is suitable based on physical limita-

Employees who have depended on the Co. to find them suitable jobs have found after several weeks that they must come to the Union with their case. They then discover, that although they had been entitled to benefits for those weeks, they cannot now collect them since the Law provides that eligibility begins only from the first day the claimant reports to the Unemployment office.

"This has resulted in the involvement of the Detroit Police. We deplore the use of our police department in carrying out unworthy management objectives.


"The Square D workers have legitimate demands and legitimate grievances which demand redress. Their major objectives are wages and conditions already largely in effect in Detroit industry.

"We do not want to see these workers suffer in a squeeze play between an unscrupulous management and a Commie-line leader ship.

"We urge a return to calmness and reason. We urge the company to sit down and negotiate a fair agreement.

"When this is done we would like to see the Square D workers eliminate the possibility that they will be caught in any future squeeze play like this one, by getting back into the main stream of the American labor movement and joining the IUE-CIO.

"We in the UAW-CIO pledge them our full support and cooperation to this end."

## City Council Calls for Laws To Stop Transfer of Jobs

#### UE's Formula to Save Jobs Drives Plant From Brooklyn

The American Saftey Razor Corporation closed down its Brooklyn plant where it had been operating for 50 years, employing approximately 1,200 employees. Local 475 of the UE, an amalgamated local representing the workers in the Safety

from carrying out its plans to move the plant to Staunton, Va., in 1955. The U.E. made a public claim that they had prevented the company from moving South which was denied by the corporation. U.E. then called for a stoppage of work which lasted several days. Following the stoppage, the company announced they would close their plant immediately and have the equipment removed within several weeks.

Local 475 was once the largest Local in District 4 of the U.E., rep. ting over 10,000 members which included many large shops, such as Mergenthaler Linotype Corp., American Machine & Foundry, Schrader Valve, American Safety Razor, etc. The American Safety Razor Corporation was the last of the large shops left that was represented by Local 475.

#### Law Provides Time to Vote

The following information is for the benefit of those members who may be obliged to work Election Day, November 2nd.

The law provides workers time off with pay in order that you can go to the polls and exercise your rights as an American citizen.

To qualify you must go to your foreman at least one day prior to Election Day and secure a form to be filled in in writing stating your request.

#### TIME GRANTED AND CONDITIONS

2 hours while the polls are open without penalty or deduction from usual salary or wages. Employee to make application prior to election day. Employer may specify the hours of absence. If the employer does not specify the hours, employee may choose two consecutive hours.

In the case of 2nd shift members, requesting the time off to vote, according to last year's procedure you will be allowed to report 2 hours later than your usual starting time.

# Legislators Join With Union In Protesting Moving of Work

The Schenectady City Council acted favorably on a request made by the Industrial Control Job Committee of IUE-CIO, Local 301, by adopting, unanimously, two resolutions calling upon the Federal Government for assistance in helping to alleviate the serious unemployment problem, affecting Schenectady, and the surrounding communities. One of the resolutions passed by the City Council affects the plans of GE to transfer the Industrial Control work out of Schenectady, thereby affecting the jobs of some 4000 employees.

The action taken by the Council in this matter, pointed out: "Whereas, that unemployment has been in part caused by transfers out of Schenectady, of Industrial production departments previously located within the City and County of Schenectady, and

"Whereas the Council has noted with concern the extent to which similar removals of Industrial plants from established locations to new communities——have contributed to the unemployment problem in those original locations."

The Resolution pointed out that it is the primary aim of the Federal Manpower Commission to encourage full utilization of existing production facilities, and workers, in preference to creating new plants, or moving workers.

The Resolution called upon the President of the United States and the Federal Government to take immediate and positive steps to stop the transfer of work from existing locations. The action of the Council specifically urged the Federal Government to enact legislation that would reduce and eliminate the incentive for companies to move work to new locations, causing unemployment.

#### Action Called For

The specific requests were for:

1—A nationwide minimum wage law, of at least \$1.50 an hour. 2—Deny benefits of accelerated tax amortization on buildings and equipment, to those firms causing unemployment by transferring work.

3—Withhold government contracts to those manufacturing firms that transfer production facilities out of existing unemployment areas, thereby aggravating the unemployment problem.

#### Pledges Support

Copies of the Council's action were sent to the President, the Senators, and Congressmen, and the Director of Defense Mobilization.

The action of the City Council followed four days after a statement was made by Congressman Bernard W. Kearney, speaking before the Schenectady Council of Veterans Organizations on Thursday, October 21st, wherein he pledged to oppose any moving of work from this Congressional District. The Congressman stated:

#### **Executive Board** Reviews Sectional Representation

Each Executive Board Member is now in the process of reviewing the sectional representation of shop stewards under his jurisdiction to see that an adequate numher of stewards are available to properly represent the member-

There are presently 606 IUE. CIO Local 301 Shop Stewards, making each Executive Board Member responsible for approximately twenty Shop Stewards. Each Shop Steward in turn represents approximately twenty-five Union members.

According to figures received from the Company as of October 1, 1954, there were 15,500 in the Bargaining Unit. This is a drop of 900 since July 1, 1954 when there were 16,400.

Every Board Member has received forms so that the Executive Board may determine the number of stewards that are needed based on the provisions of the Local's Constitution.

After the final report is approved by the Executive Board, it will be given to the Election Committee. This committee will conduct the election of Shop Stewards in accordance with the Board's decision on representation.

#### Air Mat'l Command Exhibit in A&O



An exhibit of project Vulcan for which this division recently developed the firing mechanisms, will be included in the display.



"The attempt of any employer to move any part of its plant, out of this district, will be thoroughly investigated. In the event such a move threatens employment, which could cause additional hardship, I will introduce a Bill which will deny such employer any further opportunity to bid on government contracts.'

Government Work Needed

The second resolution unanimously approved by the City Council pointed out that Schenectady is considered a distress area, by reason of reduced production in its major industrial plants. The Council urgently requested the President to amend the Defense manpower rules, in order that Government contracts could be awarded to firms in our area, even where price differential may be involved in the bids. The Council pointed out that even if a bid was high compared to others, it should not be a primary factor, where there was serious unemployment.

The Council's petition to the President and to the Congress stated that full utilization should be made of existing facilities and particularly in locations like Schenectady where the unemployment problem was critical. The Industrial Control Committee of our Union can be credited for the action taken by the City Council. It has been the result of constant meetings with the Mayor and City legislators along with the committees that were established by the Council to investigate unemployment in Schenectady.

The Union's committee is pledged to follow through until those resolutions that were passed last Monday by the Council are actually carried out by the Congress of the United States and General Electric will be prevented from transferring the jobs of thousands of men and women who depend on these jobs for their livelihood.


