Support Castro For Model UN

The Cuban delegation denouncing "Yankee imperialism" at the UN is worthy of news. It is when Albany State is crying these words and assuming the guise of Fidel Castro's revolutionary government. This was the scene March 24-26,

at the 1961 Mid-Atlantic Model General Assembly in New York City.

This conference is an annual activity of the Collegiate Council for the United Nations. It is attended by delegates from more than fifty colleges and universities in the mid-Atlantic area. Each school assumes the role of one member nation. The purpose of the conference is to create a model of the UN General Assembly and its six committees, with each college representing a particular country.

Many delegations received briefings on Friday afternoon from a representative of their assigned nation's mission to the UN. Due to the sudden death of the Cuban ambassador to the UN, however, the Albany State delegation was unable to meet with a representative.
