# Jerry Finkelstein Law Scholarship Awarded To Court Aide's Daughter

The daughter of an outstanding New York City civil servant has been named the first recipient of the Jerry Finkelstein Foundation law scholarship for study at New York Law School, it was announced last week.

# Meetings To Begin On Clerical Workers Plea For Pay Reallocations

ALBANY-Post election fatigue has temporarily delayed aa meeting between the Rockefeller Administration and the Civil Service Employees Assn. on the growing unrest among State clerical workers because of failure to obtain a salary reclassification.

Agitation on the upgrading plea erupted into a series of protest meetings by chapters of the Employees Association around the State, As a result, Governor Rockefeller wired Joseph F. Feily, CSEA president, that either he or members of his staff would meet the Employees Association on the matter as soon as possible.

The physical strain of the recently concluded gubernatorial campaign, however, caused the Rockefeller Administration to beg off "for a few days" in order to get some much-needed rest. The meeting is expected this week.

The clerical protests came following a wave of reallocations of hundreds of other job titles in State service. Even more such upgradings may be approved in coming weeks but there has never been any indication from the State that it intended to reallocate the salary of its clerks.

Whether or not the Rockefeller Administration now intends to improve clerical wages through a salary reallocation is by no means definite. The Civil Service Employees Assn. plans to push the issue hard, however.

Clerks working in State institutions also feel they have an added grievance in that they have not won the 371/2-hour work week enjoyed by other clerks. This may be settled during the forthcoming meetings.

In the meantime, several CSEA chapters plan further protest meetings should the reallocations for clerical titles not be approved. The chapter at Brooklyn State Hospital set a definite deadline of Nov. 19 for such a march should the issue not be settled by that time. Other meetings were held at Creedmoor, Hudson River Valley and Pilgrim State Hospitals.

# Erie Facing Problems Again On Recruitment

BUFFALO - Erie County is hurting again because the area is falling behind other municipalities in paying competitive salaries.

Erie chapter, Civil Service Employees Assn., noted again that medical, nursing and technological positions have remained vacant for years because Erie County salaries do not attract qualified personnel.

The question was a topic of discussion here October 12, 13, 14 and 15 at the annual meeting in the Buffalo Statler Hilton of the CSEA.

Public Health engineering happens to be critical right now in Erie County. The County Health Department has vital responsibilities in air and water pollution but it can not hire personnel to do the job.

#### Money Is There

The budget contains money for 11 positions in public health enginnering, ranging from a top of \$13,775 to \$17,655 for an associate commissioner for environmental health services, to \$7,085 to \$9,085 for assistant public health

But only four of the 11 jobs are filled. Two, including the top assistant commissioner post, have never been filled and three have been vacant for more than a year.

# A New Responsibility

THIS newspaper was the first to urge civil service employees to take cognizance of their latent potentiality for becoming one of the strongest political blocs in the state and in the country. We called the public employee vote the points? Don't you agree these "Sleeping Giant" of politics and have long urged an awaken-

After the results of last week's balloting, there can no longer be any doubt that civil servants are now fully awake and are a formidable new force in politics.

Civil servants and their families comprise about 20 per cent of the electorate in New York State. Candidates sought their support this year with unprecedented ardor. Governor Rockefeller went to public employees with an outstanding record of accomplishments for civil service. Employees showed their gratitude and it can be said that early, strong endorsements of Rockefeller by public employee organizations-most of whom had never endorsed a Republican office seeker-did much to revive the lagging political fortunes of Personnel, about this, I was told the Governor.

Perhaps the most significant show of civil service votegetting strength was the striking campaign run by the New York City Patrolmen's Benevolent Assn. to eliminate Mayor John Lindsay's Civilian Review Board. Whether the board should have been eliminated or retained is not the issue here. What must be understood is that the PBA spent it's money and time wisely and with the utmost dedication to their cause. The PBA victory is proof positive that public employees can get what they want at the polls when they put their minds to it.

Power brings responsibility, however, and the Patrolmen's Benevolent Assn. must quickly learn to exercise their new-found strength in an intelligent but restrained manner. This applies to the civil service in general, for any show of arrogance or abuse could produce a public reaction against a goal that civil service has so long sought.

# **Parole Pickets**

T was a sad sight in a city whose sights can get suddenly sadder faster than Alexandria in a sandstorm when the parole officers of City's judicial right arm took to bearing signs on Broadway last week. Demonstrating their objections to the absence of any pay raise by the City in the last two years in the face of the magnificent record they have built up in the performance of their duties, the parole officers themselves reverted to that form of protest which the simplistic have begun to equate with lawlessness-the picket

A double-edged paradox, their march pointed out the shallowness of that line of reasoning and hopefully brought to the attention of an Administration which is still reeling from its latest thumping at the hands of aroused civil servants, the reality of their plight.

Resorting to such tactics, men such as these must be heeded. To them, a core of respect for law and order and a concept of the relativity of indignities amount to more than a personal philosophy; it also represents the means by attendant, then no one could holwhich they can best accomplish their task-the rehabilitation of the disorderly, the disfranchised; the alienated.

This is a fine practice and I commend the Department of Personnal for calling in an unbiased panel of experts to review the sergeant's exam. However, has the Department of Personnel forgotten about the senior clerk exam that was held last June? What about all the people who failed the senior clerk exam by one or two candidates deserve the same consideration of an unbiased panel, since many of the judgement questions on this exam were shop clerk questions and the wording on several questions were very ambiguous. I believe if the Department of Personnel is going to adopt a new procedure they should begin with the exam that prompted this decision, and the exam was the senior clerk exam that was held in June.

The wording of any exam is technical and the title of the exam should not make the difference in calling experts to review

# Civil Service Law & You By WILLIAM GOFFEN



#### Accidental Disability

IMPORTANT as a source of clearly reasoned doctrine, Mr. Justice Nathaniel T. Helman's recent opinion in Ostrander v. Board of Trustees Police Pension Fund, City of New York, Article II (New York Law Journal, October 31, 1966) applies such doctrine to a police officer's application for an accidental disability pension.

THE PETITIONER, with 22 years of service in the Police Department, was retired for disability based upon diabetes. This condition dated back to 1946 and was controlled by insulin. Over the years, according to the petitioner, far from disabling him, the diabetic condition had actually improved.

THE PETITIONER argued that his present disability was service incurred and resulted from permanent injuries to his foot and shoulder. He protested his retirement for ordinary disability, claiming a higher pension rate based upon the service incurred disability. However, the Medical Board insisted that his disability was solely the result of diabetes.

IN REACHING a determination adverse to the petitioner. Judge Helman ruled up on the following three issues:

- 1. WAS THE petitioner entitled to a jury trial?
- 2. WAS THE denial of an accidental disability pension arbitrary?
- 3. IS THE difference in treatment of members of the Article II pension fund from members of the Article I fund unconstitutional?
- . AS TO THE right to a jury trial, the Court observed that the only issue was whether the determination by the Board of Trustees was arbitrary and capricious. Stated otherwise, the issue presented for review was whether this determination was based upon substantial evidence. This presents a question of law for the Court. There is no question of fact for a jury.
- · AS TO WHETHER the denial of an accidental disability pension was arbitrary, the Court noted there was a conflict in the medical testimony. It was not for the Court to resolve the conflict so long as the Board's determination was supported by substantial medical evidence.

THE PETITIONER argued that the Police Pension Fund's doctors were prejudiced, but the Court did not believe they disregarded their professional obligations. Over the years, doctors employed by the Police Department had, indeed, concluded that the petitioner's diabetic condition did not warrant his separation from the service. Yet, this did not mean that a present determination that such condition required his retirement was necessarily arbitrary. The passage of time alone might adversely affect a police officer's ability to perform the arduous tasks required of him.

ALSO, THE Police Department might reasonably relax or tighten its standards at different times. Besides medical personnel may change, with differences in appraisal of the disabling effects of the disease. Under such circumstances, one could not conclude that the Board's earlier position that the petitioner was not disabled by his diabetes stopped or precluded it from saying that at the present time the same disease was disabling.

3. FINALLY, the petitioner contended that the Administrative Code was unconstitutional in that Article II pensioners were not treated equally with those coming under the Article I Pension Fund. To come under the Article I Pension Fund, the officer must have been in the Police Department prior to 1940.

UNDER ARTICLE I, examination of the officer is by three physicians appointed by the Police Commissioner. The officer may appeal in thirty days and nominate his own doctor to represent him. The officer's own doctor and a Board doctor constitute a Special Medical Board. If they disagree, the controversy is resolved by a referee who is a recognized medical specialist in the pertinent area of medicine involved.

THE ARTICLE II Fund does not provide for review of the finds of the Medical Board. On the other hand, Medical Board's composition may be fairer to the officer. Instead of three medical men who are all designees of the Police Commissioner, it is composed of three doctors representing the Board of Trustees, the Commissioner of Hospitals and the Department of Personnel, respectively. Under the circumstances, the Court could find no basis for ruling that the procedures under Article II are unconstitutional.

## Municipal Public Relations

..AT LONG LAST, a know!- facet of public relations. edgeable, readable, usable book, concentrating exclusively on the public relations of an increasingly important level of government-"Municipal Publie Relations," published by the International City Managers' Association (1313 East 60th Street, Chicago, III. 60637: 273 pages.

WHAT MAKES this book so valuable is the strong emphasis placed on the indivisible relationship of public relations with the public. daily business of running a municipal government.

ALTHOUGH IT has been an accepted function of management in private industry, public relations-for some reason difficult to fathom-has been relegated to printing and publications. "left field" in municipal government. In its lonely isolation, out yonder near the bleachers, public relations seemed to be sidetracked completely outside the normal onerations of government. There, public relations was supposed to function without even an umbilical cord

INSTEAD OF being a tool of government, public relations has been treated much like a human appendix, ready for excision at the slightest whim of both ama-

HAPPILY, "Municipal Public Relations," officially changes all that once and for all, particularly since it is published by ICMA for the Institute For Training in Municipal Administration.

IT IS FURTHER raised to both acceptability and respectability by the editor, Prof. Desmond L. Anderson, Association Dean of the School of Public Administration, University of Southern California

NOW THAT public relations has become an indispensable part of the public administration process, to should be the first order of business for every administrator in municipal government, both in New York State and elsewhere, to implement the book's teachings. Frankly, we cannot see how a municipality can be efficiently operated without a viable public relations program.

WHILE MEMBERS of the civil service corps have long known that employee relations and training are important slices of the public relation's apple, the new book makes that official, too. This alone would make "Municipal Public Relations" extremely valuable. But there are other nuggets to be mined. In fact, there is a rich public relations lode running through the book endlessly.

FOR EXAMPLE, the chapter, "The Multitudinous Publics," is in ttself worth the price of admission. Public administrators, as a rule, have erroneously treated a municipality's citizens as "the general public." This, of course, is a fallacy that frequently leads to troubis in the communications

AS INDICATED by the chapter heading, the publics are broken down by type and structure with an excellent table as a guide.

IT IS IMPORTANT for all public administrators to know precisely who are their publics before they can mobilize public opinion in the public relations process. They cannot ask for help from groups unknown to them. They cannot operate with a "glob" vaguely referred to as "the general

WE ARE PLEASED to see the generous space accorded to the communications area of public relations, with coverage of the handling of municipal reports and events, face-to-face reporting, and

THE BOOK'S emphasis on the relationship of the municipal employee with the citizen he serves, is laudable. We particularly like this paragraph.

In their relationship with citizens, the municipal employee must always remember that he cannot gain public confidence unless he earns that confidence by effective performance.

Please submit your questions to Mr. O'Brien, Blue Cross-Blue Shield Manager. The Statewide Plan, 1215 Western Ave., Albany, N.Y. Please do not submit questions pertaining to specific claims. Only questions of general interest can be answered here.

- Q. I am a widow with one child who will be 19 next month. I now have a family contract under the Statewide Plan. I understand I cannot continue to cover my son under a family contract after he becomes 19. How do I change over to an individual contract?
- A. You should contact the the personnel or payroll officer at the department where you are employed for the necessary forms to accomplish this change. Since you do not say in your letter whether your son will be continuing in school, let me point out that if he is continuing in school as a full time student, you may cover him with a special student contract. If your son is eligible for this special student contract, you may get the necessary forms for this also from your personnel or payroll officer.
- Q. I have been a member of the Statewide Plan for many years. Recently, I wanted to check the policy but can't find it. How can I get another copy?
- A. To secure another copy of the insurance certificate, you should contact the personnel or payroll officer where you are employed.
- Q. What are the benefits now under the Major Medical part of the Statewide Plan? I understand these have been changed recently.
- A. You are correct. Benefits under the Major Medical portion of the Statewide Plan were increased earlier this year. The maximum benefit during a calendar year is increased from \$7,500 to \$10,000. The maximum benefit during a lifetime is increased from \$15,000 to \$20,000. These increases along with the other increased benefits make your Statewide Plan even more valuable than it was before.



# Bureau Of Statistics Study Indicates Greater Pay Gap

Growing, growing, groan. The huge gap between the salaries being paid to workers in private industry and the wages administered to workers doing the same type of work in the Federal government continues to widen at grin-like proportions in mockery of the concept of comparability.

However, it is pointed out by the figures that in the category of white collar jobs which range through grade 3, the Federal government is doing at least as well as private industry with its payroll and in some cases actually pays better.

At grade four though, the gap begins to take shape until at grade five the comparable workpay scale shows a 16.6 per cent difference in favor of private in-

The story remains about the same then through the remainder of the salary range scale. At grade seven (\$6,451-\$8,368) workers dosalaries given to Federal workers. ing somewhere last March salaries ing comparable tasks are receiving These figures are for the year in private industry rose from 2.2 ten per cent more than their peers

This group includes accountants, auditors, chemists and other professionals. Such figures continue to result from studies up through grade fifteen at which point the Bureau has determined that the Federal government is currently paying 21.8 per cent less than private industry for comparable services.

The Bureau of Labor Statistics survey covered more than 1.3 million employees in 82 selected occupations. This year their study was expanded to include many amaller establishments including banking and insurance firms paying salaries to 50 or more em-

The latest figure, of course, are perfectly suited for liberal translation into political grist. The Federal government can use them to point out that in most areas great advances have been made

since a point in the early sixties and so they have, if the adjective "great" is pressing it a bit. Government employees can make a strong case about the dragging of the concept of comparability and the fact that the latest figures do not include the most recent and very substantial wage increases won in private industry.





What happened as far as the LBJ-HHH team goes is that they just haven't kept touch in New York with anybody that counts. Perhaps this is because the Presidential election is two years away and they saw no immediate urgency in dealing with problems here. This thinking could change and probably will. But in the meantime, the "pols" are wondering just what they got from the White House after delivering the biggest Presidential victory here-62 of 62 counties for Johnson-and more money than ever before any where. Frankly, the anguished cry right now is that 'we've been forgotten and insult-

#### Other Observations

A great deal was said about the spending of money, here in New York and elsewhere. While Rockefeller did spend a good deal of money, that was not the only reason he won the campaign. His own polished political campaigning and the lackluster performance of Frank O'Connor made the added combination. winning Shapp spent a fortune in the Pennsylvania gubernatorial fight
