SCHAEFER TO GIVE LECTURE AT SUNYA

The third in a series of free public lectures sponsored by the Atmospheric Sciences Research Center, State University of New York at Albany, and the New York State Department of Environmental Conservation, is scheduled for Tuesday evening, Apr. 10, when Vincent J. Schaefer, director of ASRC, will be the guest speaker. The lecture will take place in Lecture Center 18, beginning at 8 p.m.

Dr. Schaefer's subject will be "What Is Its?", illustrated with the use of more than 100 slides of common natural objects but uncommon views of them. A few, very unusual objects will be included. As each slide of strange, bizarre, and beautiful things is shown, the audience will be given two or three seconds to decide what is depicted. After that the speaker will describe the subject photographed. The presentation is described as a challenge to the perception of the viewer.

Dr. Schaefer is known internationally for his work in the field of cloud physics and weather modification since his important discovery while with the General Electric Research Laboratory that dry ice could be used to modify clouds to produce precipitation. In recent years he has been concerned with atmospheric aerosols and air pollution and has been a leader in helping to make the public aware of the air pollution problem.

Just prior to the beginning of the lecture Raymond Falconer, of ASRC, will give an illustrated weather briefing.



SUNYA PROFESSOR ASSESSES NEW LOOK IN TEACHER PREPARATION

The latest scheme in teacher preparation may appear great, but a host of practical problems have to be overcome if the plan is to succeed.

That's the gist of an article by John A. Ether of State University of New York at Albany which appears in the current issue of <u>PBTE Newsletter</u>, a teacher education publication.

In his article Dr. Ether, director of Teacher Corps activities at SUNYA's School of Education, discusses the problems involved in the latest proposal to upgrade the preparation of teachers. Known as Performance Based Teacher Education (PBTE), the approach would have teachers licensed not on the basis of college courses they have taken but on performance and accomplishment in the classroom. An internship is a vital part of the program.

The State University educator tells how the SUNYA School of Education is compiling a body of guide information by cataloging the various problems that must be faced by teacher preparation institutions which plan to use the new PBTE method.

Based on interviews with teacher interns, university personnel, team leaders, school district personnel, and community people, author Ether has pin-pointed 21 problems. Each involves what Dr. Ether terms "Start-up Problems" -- those related to instituting a PBTE training program.

In one of them Dr. Ether indicates that the colleges in question will need to change a number of their procedures -- grades, timing and scheduling of classes,

faculty assignments, and so on. Related to this is the need to bring together four concerned groups: the teacher preparatory institution, the cooperating local school system where the interns work, the local teachers bargaining unit, and the State Department of Education.

Author Ether reports that many operational points must be settled, too, such as the extra work involved when a regular teacher monitors the work of the trainee and the extent to which they should be paid for the monitoring service.

Another problem reviewed by Professor Ether has to do with the inadequancies of PBTE developers and writers. States the Albany professor: "An extensive training or retraining effort, designed for colleges and for local educational agency personnel, is needed. Securing people to do this training, providing funding, and getting people to agree to be trained, are massive problems."

SUNYA GRADUATE STUDENTS REPORT EXPERIMENTS AT NATIONAL MEETING

At recent national meetings of the Biophysical Society in Columbus, O., three graduate students in biology under the supervision of Robert D. Allen, professor of biology at State University of New York at Albany, reported successful experiments on the isolation of naked cytoplasm from amoebae.

Douglass L. Taylor, John Condeelis, and Patrick Moore had succeeded in controlling the physical state and motility of amoeba cytoplasm in chemically defined media and they were able to demonstrate contraction, relaxation, and a state analogous to rigor in muscle. They also had designed a chemical medium in which the naked cytoplasm would not only stream actively and form pseudopodia, but even undergo limited locomotion.

A decade ago Dr. Allen proposed the frontal contraction theory of amoeboid movement. The SUNYA graduate students succeeded in demonstrating the presence of the contractile protein myosin in the same form that it appears in vertebrate striated muscle, and the result has demonstrated the long-suspected similarity in the mechanisms of muscle contraction and amoeboid movement and provided confirmation of Dr. Allen's theory.

EDUCATION DEANS MEET AT SUNYA; PREVIEW NEW TEACHER TRAINING

The New York State Council of Deans of Education previewed 1973-1980 plans for licensing teachers during its semi-annual meeting held at State University of New York at Albany. Taking part were deans of schools of education at the universities of Syracuse, Rochester and Buffalo, New York University, Fordham and Hofstra universities, City University of New York, and SUNYA.

Randolph S. Gardner, dean of SUNYA's School of Education, said the group focused attention on the Regents' Master Plan for Teacher Education, particularly as it will involve competency-based teacher education.

"The approach, through CBTE, is a proposal to license teachers, not on the college courses they have taken, but on their performance in the classroom," Dean Gardner reported. He said the plan calls for internships in local school districts where the future teachers will be "totally immersed in an extensive program of working on the job with full-time licensed teachers and classes."

Observed Dr. Gardner: "Although we at SUNYA and at other schools of education throughout the state have worked closely with neighboring school districts for a number of years, the CBTE approach will open up new avenues of further cooperation. For example, we hope to enlist the thinking and the cooperation of area school districts and their professional staffs in reviewing and -continued-

re-registering the 22 certificate teacher training programs here at the School of Education."

Active in international affairs, he has been in recent years a member of the Ceylon Delegation to annual meetings of the World Bank and the International Monetary Fund, of the Ceylon Delegation to the Third Session of the United States Conference on Trade and Development, and of the Ceylon Delegation to the Conference of Foreign Ministers of Non-Aligned Countries.

On the evening of May 4, starting at 8 p.m. in Humanities 354, David Wilson, of the University of London, will speak on "The Vikings in England" in a talk sponsored by the Archaeological Institute of America and the SUNYA's department of comparative literature.

On the preceding day, Thursday, May 3, at 3 p.m., also in Humanities 354, H. William Batt, graduate student in the Graduate School of Public Affairs, will present a paper on "Self, Society,

and Existence in Thailand: A Phenomenological Approach". Mr. Batt, a former Peace Corps volunteer in Thailand, has conducted extensive research in Thailand on the structure and dynamics of the Thai personality and its import for bureaucratic performance within Thai government.

The paper will constitute the third of the Asian Studies Research
Seminars sponsored during the semester by the Asian Studies
Committee of SUNYA.

SUNYA'S PROFESSOR SHAW HONORED BY FRENCH GOVERNMENT

Edward P. Shaw, professor of French at State University of

New York at Albany, has been honored a second time by the French

Government for his contribution to French culture in the United

States through his teaching and publications. He has been notified

by the French Embassy in Washington of his raise in rank from

"chevalier" to "officier" in the scholarly Order of Academic Palms.

Dr. Shaw, who has served as chairman of the university's department of Romance languages and formerly headed its Division of Humanities, first was recognized in 1962 for his distinguished career by the French Government. He has been a member of the faculty since 1947 and was instrumental in initiating the university's Fulbright program, foreign student programs, and faculty lectureships.

State University of New York Press recently published Dr.

Shaw's new work, "Selected Literary References in the Manuscript

Journal (1750-1769) of Joseph d'Hemery". Collaborator in the

project was Adrienne Rogers, chairman of the department of

French at Russell Sage College and one of the first recipients of

SUNYA's doctoral degree in French.

Professor Shaw has spent several periods of research in

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France, including one under a traveling scholarship of the French Government and one as a Harvard Traveling Fellow, After receiving his academic degrees at Harvard, he taught at the University of Illinois and at the University of Miami. He is the author of "Problems and Policies of Malesherbes As Directeur de la Librairie in France (1750-1763)", "Jacques Cazotte (1719-1792)", "The Case of the Abbe de Moncrif (1687-1770)", and "Francois-Augustin Paradie de Moncrif (1687-1770)", as well as of three books of readings in French and numerous articles in professional journals.
