This week, I dropped in at meetings of the Constitutional Review Committee and the Student Board of Finance. The former was set up by Student Council to serve as the constitutional advisory board for Student Council. As such, they have the unenviable task of looking over and approving, or disapproving, as the case may be, the Constitutions of all organizations at the school. It is to be expected that such a new group would hardly be a success its first year, however the committee seems to be in fine working form, and is run efficiently, with capable inquisitive members who seem to know what is going on. Any group which is having constitutional difficulties should look to this new group for help. They are a good addition to Student Association.

Student Board of Finance, on the other hand seems to be plodding along in its usual fashion, with both too much work and too little power or interested members. Members evidently find it difficult to attend meetings, not on Thursday or Monday night, but anytime. With three of its members teaching off campus next semester, an end to the problem is not in sight. They might schedule their meetings on Tuesday

at 10, when presumably no classes are held (under the present agreement), and the only foreseeable conflicts would be class meetings. Student Council might be authorized, on the other hand, to have the power to add additional members to the group to replace those off campus, and to enable the group to meet its quorum.

There are some bright sides to the picture. The Board possesses a more than capable faculty advisor who has no stated power to cope with the emergencies, which arise too often. Many of its members are concerned about finding a new approach to our budgetary system. Perhaps the joint meeting Sunday night will solve the situation. In any event, students who will be quick to complain if any revolutionary revision is proposed had better attend a few Board meetings. They would then realize that our present system for handling budgets is outdated and ineffective, and the main reason that Student Board of Finance serves practically no purpose is because it has practically no power.

Anita F. Duzin, Supervisor in the Milne School, has been the faculty advisor to All State Night. The following committees have been announced: Entertainment, Marie Canbane; Publicity, Robert Barker; Refreshments, Margaret Kinsler; Decorations, Barbara Strack, Juniors; Invitations, Jean Hollenbeck '56.

This year at the Square Dance the music will be provided by Les Yemas and the Harmony Ranch Boys. For those people who wish to rest between sets, tables will be set up for cocktails and bridge. A feature of the Dance will be entertainment by students and some of the faculty.

The purpose of All State Night is to promote better relations between students and faculty. The admission is free and at the dance there will be free refreshments.

All State Day last year surprised such events as Chinese Auctions, on- and off-campus games between faculty and students and track and field events. The proceeds from this event were to go to the Campus Chest. Student-Faculty Meeting Discusses Student Board Of Finance, Budget

Student Council and Student Board of Finance met jointly Sunday evening in a meeting presided over by Robert Betsch '56, President of Student Association. Present at the meeting were Dr. Josiah Phinney, Professor of Social Studies and Faculty Chairman of Student Board of Finance; Dr. Evan R. Collins, President of the College and Dr. David Barthley Dean of Men. The agenda consisted of discussion of internal problems of Student Board of Finance, Budget procedure and the proposed purchase of a college campus.

As a result of a discussion and motions made and defeated were that in the present three step system whereby budgets go from the Board to Council and then to S.A., the Council step be dropped; the S.A. step be dropped leaving Council with the final authority on the passage of the budgets. These were all defeated.

Moving on to a discussion of the proposed college camp it was decided that the policies concerning the use of the camp should be decided before-hand by a committee or Student Council or both and presented to the Student Association for approval.

Little U. N.

The conference of the Inter-Collegiate Association, held here this past weekend, saw the convocation of all but two of the New York State Teachers' Colleges. In an attempt to achieve a unity between them, they discussed problems common to all of them and searched for solutions. By exchanging ideas and suggestions and working together, each college can benefit one another and the group as a whole.

Previous to this conference, ICA was not a very active organization, but this meeting went a long way to strengthen the Association. Delegates who attended this conference left with a feeling of pride and confidence in the new Inter-Collegiate Association. The future looks bright for this growing organization and we hope Albany will continue to play an important part in it.

Another Season . . .

Wednesday of this week saw the commencing of the 1955-1956 sorority rushing season. From now until the middle of February the seven social organizations will be tearing at each other's throats, competing with each other for the "cream of the crop" in the Class of 1959. Armed with a set of rushing rules, a memory for names and faces and their brightest smiles, they will descend upon you freshmen and do their best to convince you of their many attributes and of the advantages which will be unfolded to you in your affiliation with their group. These attributes and advantages are sometimes exaggerated in pushing their desirability and it has been known that frosh have been enrolled under false pretenses.

As the enrollment in the college increases, the number of freshman girls increases also, while the quotas for each of the sororities remains the same. Theoretically, out of approximately 300 freshman girls, only 175 would be admitted to the seven sororities, if each pledged its quota. This, however, never happens and some of the 175 are disappointed, to say nothing of the other 125 who didn't even have a chance.

As each year goes by, sororities seem, to us, to lose a bit of their purpose, spirit, usefulness—call it what you will. They do not serve any purpose or fill any need of students save providing Junior and Senior members with a place to live. In weighing the advantages against the obligations, both financial and social, the scales do not balance, but rather tip in favor of the latter. State, unlike larger colleges which maintain a great number of sororities, is a very friendly school in which the students are very close to one another. While there is a need, on other campuses, to affiliate yourself with a select group in order to establish close friendships or to rise to popularity among the students, this need is definitely not present on this campus.

With the need for them swiftly disappearing, we predict that another ten years will see the State College campus empty of sororities.

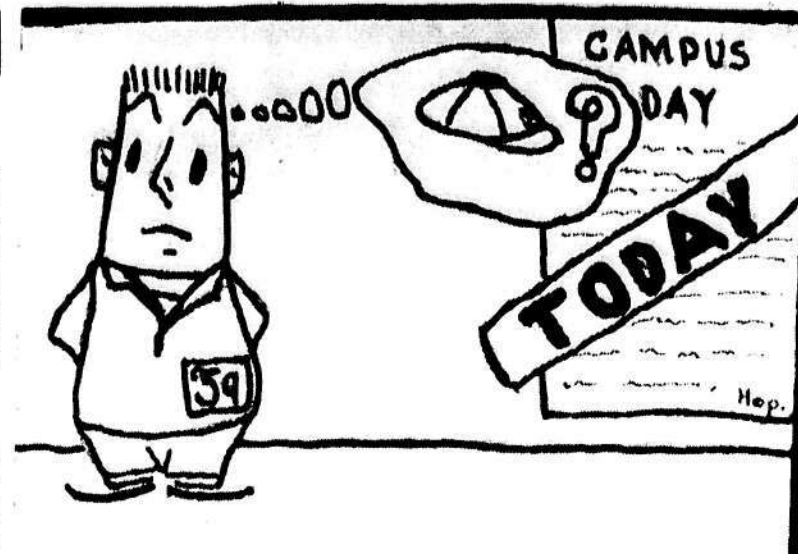

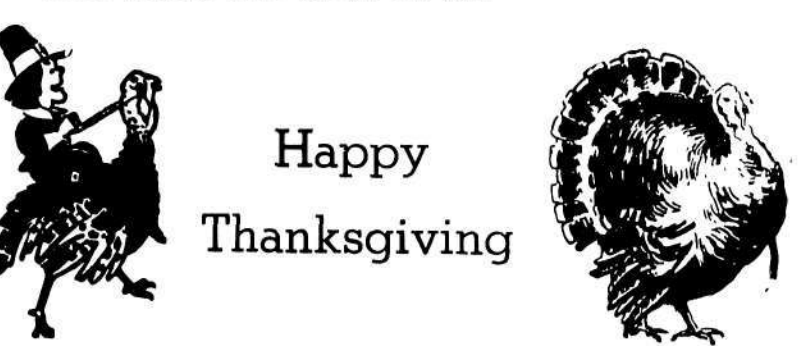

The first basketball weekend of the season at State College opens today when the Peds take on their first two foes—Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute and New Paltz State College. Tonight the men of Coach Richard Sauer take to the road as they encounter the Engineers at the newly constructed Field House of Union College. Tomorrow the Peds will open their home version of the '55-'56 season as they play host to the Hawks of New Paltz. The game is scheduled to get under way at 8:30 p.m. after a 7 p.m. preliminary by the Junior Peds.

State has not beaten RPI since World War II, and tonight they will be out to avenge last year's 67-59 defeat. The locals, used to Page's small gym will have their backs to the wall on the large hardwood of Union. State's new mentor, Richard Sauer, is looking to Captain Sigmund Smith to repeat last year's performance against the Tri-City area foes. Sauer is expected to start this year's captain along with Donald Mayer, Denny Dempster, John Rookwood, and Jack Minon. The only new face to appear on the starting lineup will be that of Gary Holway, a six-foot-two-inch prospect who is expected to see much action this year.

Being the first game of the season for both squads, prognostications of the outcome are few and far between. On Saturday night, the Peds will be opposing the New Paltz State College on the small Page gym. The starting lineup is expected to be the same unless Friday night's outcome proves influential in any way. Last year the Albanians ousted out the Hawks by a count of 84-76. Once again Sigmund Smith proved to be the big man for the Teachers as he found the range for twenty points.

The bench strength Sauer has on hand will be led by speedy Joe Anderson and last year's top man in assists, Denny Dempster. The others expected to see action are Richard Causey and Thomas Hoppy. This year will prove to be a big test for Coach Sauer. The Slippery Rock Teachers and Penn State graduate is undertaking his first assignment as a college basketball coach. He replaces Merlin Hathaway, State's Physical Education Department head who has stepped down to devote his work to the expanding Intramural Program. He also will coach the junior varsity squad.

The Hapsburgs supported the Choir Boys until the fall of the empire. During World War I, the group disbanded, but through the aid of wealthy patrons, they reformed at the close of the war. In 1926 the Choir began concert tours, and since 1932 they have been touring the United States and Canada under the management of the famous impresario, Sol Hurak.

The Choir acquired nationwide acclaim when it appeared on the Ford Foundation Christmas Television program last year. They are also featured in "Cinerama."

Albany State was fortunate in being scheduled as one of the first visits in the current tour. The Vienna Choir Boys will arrive in the United States in early December.
