

New Building to Include Gym and Student Union

The State University College of Education at Albany campus definitely will be relocated on approximately 220 acres of the Albany Country Club property about two and one half miles from the present site on Western Avenue it was learned vesterday. It is expected the main entrance of the College will be on Western Avenue with other entrances to the campus from Fuller Road and Washington Avenue. Additional Country Club property fronting on Washington Avenue probably will be acquired by the State for use in its office building program.

If architectural plans can be progressed rapidly, it is hoped that ground can be broken in the spring of 1962. First occupancy at the new campus is expected in the fall of 1963 or shortly after.



I feel Miss Stickney is a fine actress but not a very good dramatist. She created a definite personality -on the stage. I enjoyed her interpretation of Miss Millay's poetry and letters. (Her reading of the letters was especially outstanding. She was not melodramatic; her delivery - which showed excellent taste - varied according to the period of the poet's life from which the selection was taken. Naturally Miss Stickney guessed at individual moments, but here again, she usually used very good judgement. There was a personal warmtn in her acting that added to the characterization

The one criticism I have of the production deals with the dramatization itself, and not with the actress. I felt that Miss Stickney, the writer, overemphasized Edna St Vincent Millay's idiosyncracies. The poet seemed too scatter-brained, too-flippant. Also, many of the sudden transitions from letter to poem poem to letter, were either awkward or trite.

In general, the portrait did not seem like an accurate or a complete view of a many-sided woman who had a vigoruos intellectual curiosity and a desire for knowledge. I felt the only other side of Miss Millay examined sufficiently was her relationship with her family and husband, Eugene Jan Boissevain.

The play did have a sense of reality, especially in the chronological order of events; but, scenes, like the one showing the creation of a poem m a minute, were unrealistic and did not give a true impression of the craftsmanship that went into Miss
