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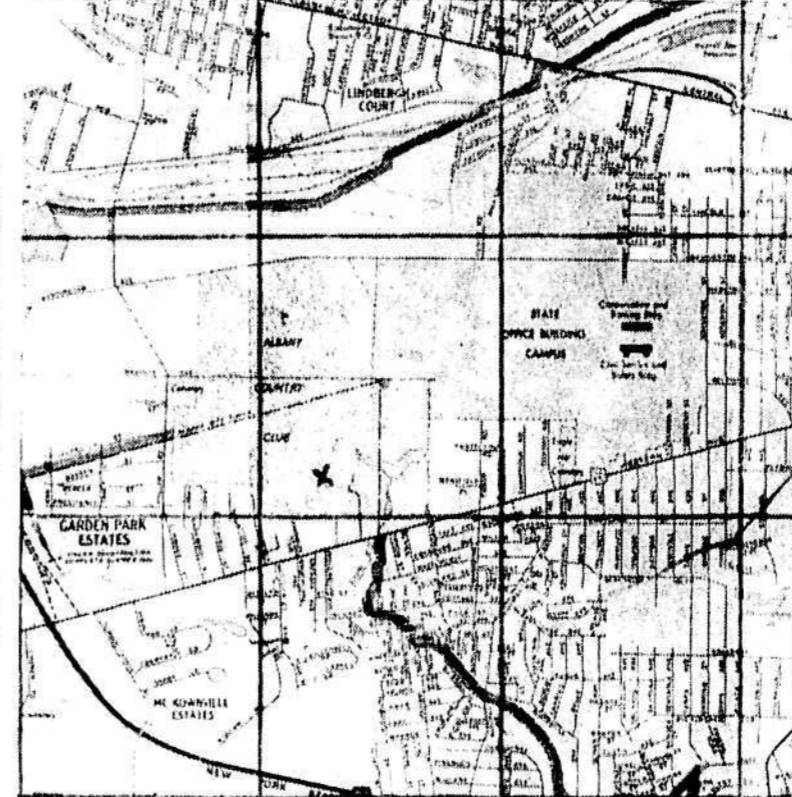

College Move To New Site Out Western Ave. Definite

SCA Features Sing Festival

The Student Christian Association at State College is sponsoring its 9th Annual Christmas Sing Sunday evening at 6:10 p.m. in Page Hall. For this all-college event, each dormitory, group-house, sorority and fraternity prepares two Christmas songs to be judged in competition for a trophy. The trophy will be presented to the winning group by Dr. Evan R. Collins, President of the College, and will be kept by that group until the next Christmas Sing. The current trophy holder is Kappa Beta, the winner of last year's Sing.

New Building to Include Gym and Student Union

The State University College of Education at Albany campus definitely will be relocated on approximately 220 acres of the Albany Country Club property about two and one half miles from the present site on Western Avenue it was learned yesterday. It is expected the main entrance of the College will be on Western Avenue with other entrances to the campus from Fuller Road and Washington Avenue. Additional Country Club property fronting on Washington Avenue probably will be acquired by the State for use in its office building program.

If architectural plans can be progressed rapidly, it is hoped that ground can be broken in the spring of 1962. First occupancy at the new campus is expected in the fall of 1963 or shortly after.

SA President Writes Senate

Development of the new Country Club site would begin with construction of buildings to provide for an enrollment of about 4,400 students. The first group of buildings will include administration, student union, health and physical education, and library buildings. A small theater and lecture hall are also planned for the initial development. Other provisions include structures housing departments for social studies, humanities, science and fine arts.

Students Want S-U System

Much confusion has arisen recently among the student body concerning the faculty recommendation that the student teaching evaluation be converted from an ABCDE system to a satisfactory-unsatisfactory rating. This confusion has resulted in a misunderstanding of the committee's recommendations. Several points should be made clear.

The original impetus for the recommended change came from the students. An open meeting was held last spring for a discussion of the grading system, at which time it was evident, at least among those present, that the existing grading system was inadequate in many respects.

Shortly thereafter, a faculty committee, consisting of student teaching supervisors, was appointed to further investigate this matter. A poll among twenty-nine supervisors indicated that 64% of them favored the S-U system. The committee deliberated for nearly four months, and concluded that an S-U system would better suit the needs of both the students and the supervisors.

Included in their investigation was a questionnaire, answered by 893 graduate students, Seniors, and Juniors. The results indicated that the S-U system was favored by 70% of the graduate students, 69% of the Seniors, and 58% of the Juniors, or 64% of all students questioned.

The faculty committee then presented its recommendations to a meeting of all supervisors. The S-U system was overwhelmingly approved. A recommendation for combining the present student teaching seminar with the student teaching course in one eight hour course was unanimously approved. At present, the Academic Council of the college is considering the recommendations.
