

The Best, the Rest, the Snubs a

In several centuries, when civilization as we know it has collapsed, archaeologists may stumble across the little metal statues we call Oscar and presume them to be artifacts of some twisted cult. They might be right at that.

The Academy Award voting receives about as much attention from the media and the public as the presidential election, and if we had to choose between one or the other, I suspect a lot of people would take the Oscars. I can't blame them myself. At least there are some Oscar nominees you can vote for and still sleep well at night. Bill Clinton may be the Best Candidate Who Doesn't Employ an Illegal Alien or Inhale, but he doesn't have the charisma of a Jack Nicholson chewing up soldiers and spitting them out in *A Few Good Men*.

As good a place as any to start the discussion is with the movie so famous people who haven't seen it are doing critical analyses of it. Personally, if I hear any more talk about *The Crying Game*, my lunch is going to defy gravity as it is rerouted through my esophagus, so I am going to address it now and move on. It is a wonderful film, certainly one of the best offerings of the year. America may be the movie capital of the world, but leave it to the Irish to show us a thing or two about our own craft. Laws were recently enacted in several states prohibiting against the revelation of *The Crying Game*'s legendary surprise, with penalties ranging from a \$1000 fine to six months in jail and subjection to repeated viewing of *Honeymoon in Vegas*.

The performances, recognized in both the best actor and supporting actor categories, are exceptional and deserve the recognition. Miranda Richardson was also superb, though she picked up her nomination for Damage instead. The greatest irony of The Crying Game's phenomenal success is that the Academy, which goes to great pains to maintain the secrecy of the final ballots, has inadvertently let the cat out of writer-director Neil Jordan's bag.

Perhaps the biggest surprise for me was discovering that the absolute most wonderful film of 1992 had at

least been nominated for best director and best screenplay. And it opened before X-mas. Robert Altman's *The Player*, a deliriously funny sendup of movieland and everything it stands for, is witty, incisive, and original, everything you don't look for in a nominee. Let's all thank the Academy for overlooking Altman's fantastic imagination—making movies only for money, how absurd—and throwing him a biscuit anyhow.

In my mind, one of the biggest oversights comes in the Best Adapted Screenplay category, not the award which everyone will madly spend the next four weeks trying to predict, but an important one nevertheless. Consider this: David Mamet, who has rebounded from last year's insomnia aid Homicide, was awarded the Pulitzer Prize for his play Glengarry Glen Ross, but is not deserving of an Oscar for his adaptation of the same. That's the big P, folks. PEW-litz-er. As compensation, let's give Dave the Spike Lee Award for Biggest Goof by the Almighty Academy. Also, although I regrettably have not seen Malcolm X, whose running time is longer than the period it lasted in local theaters, I'm certain that his film's snubbing was an oversight in Lee's mind if no one else's. For what it's worth, yes, Do the Right Thing should have received a nomination way back in 1987.

But back to Glengarry Glen Ross, a fine movie which has been utterly ignored. Since the film was a bomb and Al Pacino received its only acting recognition, Jack Lemmon's gutsy performance as a down-on-his-luck salesman who resorts to desperate measures has been for naught. Perhaps voters didn't want to put Lemmon up against the likes of Clint Eastwood, forcing a quandary over whom to give the sympathy vote to. ("I don't know Eastwood looks healthier, maybe Lemmon will die first...") As for the list of shoulda-been-nominees, let's jot down the name of Nick Nolte. Those who complained about his Italian accent in Lorenzo's Oil probably think spaghetti grows on trees; I was raised in a colony of Italy (in Queens), and he sounded authentic to me. More importantly, he evolved from movie star into distraught father in totally convincing fashion.

Most overrated movie of the year honors go to Scent of a Woman, a high concept comedy which has more reels than ideas. Al Pacino's performance is brilliant, but then Al Pacino was brilliant last year when he was ignored

I have little to say about the Best Actress category simply because most of the nominated films opened in the Capital District around the time the noms were made public. If nothing else, the dearth of potential competitors says something about the quality and abundance of roles for women. Susan Sarandon whined her way through Lorenzo's Oil, overshadowed by a superior Nolte, but they had to find a nominee somewhere, I guess. Soon they'll be exhuming the bodies of Ingrid Bergman and Lauren Bacall.

No discussion of Oscar snubs would be complete without mention of A River Runs Through It, a fine example of the short-term memories in Hollywood if ever there was one. Maybe it's the smog. They missed a couple of potential Best Actors, a fine candidate for supporting (Tom Skeritt), and even that rare commodity, a Best Supporting Actress. Richard Friedenberg picked up a Best Adapted Screenplay crumb, but the exclusion of director Robert Redford is a conspicuous one. Besides, this story of two brothers in rural America has Best Picture nominee written all over it, which if it had been released in December it assuredly would have been.

There seemed to be an abundance of talent in the independent ranks this year, and while I was not holding my breath for nominations to Bob Roberts or Reservoir Dogs, certainly these were among the most memorable films of 1992. That is precisely why The Crying Game's nomination is so crucial to those who create and/or appreciate innovative cinema. It is the quintessential Hollywood story, despite its foreign origins: independent film by respected but obscure director having no recognizable stars is picked up for release by a major studio, featured on the cover of national magazines and in newspapers everywhere, and ultimately nominated for several Oscars. A story so beautiful it brings tears to my eyes, pun absolutely intended.

And so the clock ticks, ever so slowly, until the night of March 29, when the envelopes are opened and the awards awarded, and then it will be over. For awhile. Until about, oh, April 1 when everyone begins thinking of the '93 Oscars.


For thirty years, Presidents didn't have sex. In fact, there was practically an amendment forbidding sex in the White

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Suffer in Silence

To the Editor:

Recently, ASUBA has come under attack for inviting Kwame Ture on campus to speak, against the "better judgement/discretion" of the Administration. Several members of the exec. board are on disciplinary probation, with the demand of the Administration, that ASUBA send an official letter of apology for its actions.

ASUBA is to be congratulated for its efforts to flaunt the Administrative efforts to define who is "appropriate" leadership for the Black students on this campus. Under President Swygert's "Just Community," racism has flourished on this campus. Students still put up with racist remarks by professors, continued harassment, both through the well-armed UPD and through Administrative intimidation, plus the usual result of encouragement of thinly-veiled racist backlash such as the Tuesday, February 16th ASP letter by Craig Hunter Thompson.

"Discrimination against white students" and "Black racism" are the rallying cries of racists who would prefer students of color on this campus to suffer silently and eschew the type of confrontation necessary to fight racism. Thompson sounds like he quoted directly from the N.Y. Times tirade against Malcolm X in the 60's.

Furthermore, the Administration has in the past been able to exploit this backlash on campus, excusing it as a provocation caused by ASUBA instead of condemning



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it. At the same time it asserts itself as "appropriate" leadership in charge of ASUBA's free speech.

The attack on ASUBA must be fought by all antiracists on this campus. The International Socialist Organization is gathering signatures on a petition at our table, each Wednesday, as a preliminary step towards challenging the attack on ASUBA and any attacks on free speech by the Administration.

6. Build a mass, integrated, democratic organization to fight racism.

Integral to C.A.A.R.V.'s understanding of this case is that this event is not an isolated incident. That the cops cover-up attacks on black youth can come as no surprise—it is standard procedure for cops to themselves initiate such attacks in black and working class neighborhoods. The beating of Rodney King attracted the media's eye because it had been video-taped, likewise the actions of young militants and anti-racist fighters in Detroit are drawing more and more attention to the bludgeoning death of Malice Green, an unemployed black steelworker who was beaten to death with a flashlight by seven highly decorated cops.

Albany is not isolated from such incidents. In 1984, Jesse Davis of Arbor Hill was gunned down by Albany police who claimed he attacked them with a knife and fork. But pictures taken moments after his death show him clutching a toy truck in one hand and a key-case in the other. In what hand was he holding the knife and the fork? The cops have no answer. In January of 1991, a black man — Corey Sheldon — died in his Albany jail cell, hanging from his coat. The police again called it a "suicide". Precisely because these are not isolated events C.A.A.R.V. appeals for unity with all those who are committed to fight against future attacks. A rally will be held on the two year anniversary of the Rodney King beating at the Leo O'Brian Federal Building on Clinton Ave. This demonstration will begin at 5:00pm on March 30. It is important that all groups and individuals concerned with fighting racist violence come out and show their support.

On April 29, 1992 the racist cops who beat down Rodney King were acquitted — L.A. went up in flames — the verdict initiated a mass, integrated and angry rebellion. The fire of this rebellion soon spread through many cities from coast to coast as angry youth lashed out against their blatant and systematic exploitation and the devastation of the ghetto.

The next morning Joseph Cohen's limp body was found hanging from a tree in a patch of woods behind Colonie Center Mall. He was most probably the victim of a racist or even a fascist lynching. But the cops ruled his death a suicide and closed the case within a mere four hours.

The case was all but ignored by the press until the R.W.L. (Revolutionary Worker's League, a Trotskyest party dedicated to the regeneration of the 4th International), N.W.R.O.C. (the National Women's Rights Organizing Coalition — an anti-capitalist, antiracist, pro-gay, pro-youth women's rights movement), and a group of independent individuals not affiliated with either organization began to build a campaign to win justice for Joseph Cohen.

These groups held a successful demonstration on November 24, 1992 that attracted a great deal of publicity and put pressure on the community at large to re-examine this racist cop cover-up.

And out of this initial alliance emerged C.A.A.R.V. (the Coalition for Action Against Racist Violence). It is by taking action and not just spewing empty rhetoric that C.A.A.R.V. has won the support and trust of Joseph Cohen's parents. The Cohen's recognize that C.A.A.R.V. is sincerely committed to this campaign to win justice for their son and expose the racist cops. C.A.A.R.V. raises the following demands:

- 1. Expose all racist police cover-ups. Fight racist attacks.
- 2. Reopen the Cohen case. Release all records. Fire the cops responsible.
- 3. No reliance on the cops, courts, Democrats or Republicans.
- 4. Form independent worker/black community committees to investigate and get justice.

5. For integrated anti-racist worker/black community

"So far there has been no negative reaction from the students at all." Maniccia said they seem to be interacting well with the students at Hudson Valley, as well as the teachers.

However, not everything has been ironed out in this system. The uniqueness between college scheduling systems has caused a little grief for some students.

"Because of the way classes are set up, by scheduling this class with Hudson Valley time, it limits the students with the number of classes they (students) can take," Maniccia said.

Other problems with the scheduling of this class and others like it will be the cooperative setting of office hours where students can seek additional help.

However, even with these minor problems, the student response is one of great enthusiasm and high expectations.

"It's the wave of the future," Gary Guy, a SUNYA freshman was quoted as saying, "It's more interesting now."

Maria Swarez, also a SUNYA freshman, said, "The project is a nice one to be involved in. ... It's modern technology at work."

Hudson Valley's own, Hal Warner added, "Now kids are more apt to come to class because it's different."

This "classroom of the future" was designed and built in Canada and to Jerry Jones knowledge the first one in the United States. Jones ended by saying, "Maybe we are trend setters in information technology."

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

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

What was expected to be an exciting season turned out to be one of disappointments for the Albany junior varsity basketball team.

Albany coach James Jones had projected a strong season if the team gelled. However it never happened, as a 9-10 season was the result of an up and down year.

"We needed a team effort and what we really had was

a team of individuals," Jones said.

Lethargic performances outnumbered the aggressive showing that was expected of the team.

The junior varsity squad is not a large team, height wise, with Scott Fuchs being the only big man on the team. Albany therefore had to compensate for its smallness with ball handling, half-court defense, and strong outside shooting.

When Albany had all three elements running, they were good, very good. But when they didn't, they were

One game in which Albany got their act together was against Hudson Valley Community College, the number two community college in the country.

In what was probably the highlight of the season, Albany matched Hudson Valley point for point in a game that was action packed from the very beginning. With a playoff atmosphere at University Gym, the Vikings hung on by the skin of their teeth to come out on

Albany's Josh Graber and Fuchs were on top of their game. Both were aggressive on defense but not on offense. Graber was especially sharp from the outside but it was a team effort that kept Albany in the game.

Against the Chiefs of Schenectady Community College, the only team to defeat Hudson Valley, Albany again played up to their potential. In both games, Albany held on until the end only to come up short. Playing at Schenectady, Albany had a chance to win in the closing seconds. However a crucial turnover left the team on the losing end.

For all the good games that Albany played, there was a disappointing one to match it.

No better example exists than the last game of the season against Williams College. Albany came out flat from the outset and was behind the whole game.

Jones described the performance as "flat and unmotivated." Motivation has in fact been a major problem for the team.

With no playoffs to shoot for, motivation is limited to team and individual pride. In many games this year, Albany has looked flat, which caused lectures from

Another problem was teamwork. Several times it was were in every game," Jones summed up.

evident that the team just wasn't working as a unit.

"We worked as a team sometimes, but definitely not enough, and I take full responsibility for that," Jones summarized.

Though the team was laden with talent, there were some players that stood above the rest.

Graber, following the footsteps of his brother Jason, lethal from the outside, consistently kept Albany in the game with clutch three-point shots. His performances became so impressive that he, on numerous occasions, found himself playing for the Great Danes varsity.

Mike Remhild was chosen as the captain of the squad from the outset of the season. He led the team by example rather than being the more vocal leader that Jones wanted.

"I would like to see him being more vocal on the court, seeing he is the captain," Jones said.

Remhild did handle his job as captain efficiently. His shooting touch, along with his ball handling skill, kept other defenses honest. His passing also created open shots for teammates both in the paint and from the

Scott Fuchs, a 6-11 center, was a formidable player in the paint when he was aggressive. His blocking abilities were second to none on the team, and he also provided offensive rebounding to give the team second chance

Jamie Ferrier and George Yund were the aggressive players of the bench that on numerous occasions sparked

"Jamie was the guy I could rely on to come out prepared when I needed him," Jones stated.

Both players were tenacious on defense and created turnovers leading to easy Albany scores. They provided hustle that the team desperately needed.

Eric Drimmer, along with Fuchs, provided the inside scoring touch to counteract with the outside shooters. Though not a big man in the strict sense of the word, he did pull down many rebounds on both offense and

Individually the team looked good on paper, but as is so often the case, the team didn't play to its ability.

Down 58-57 with two and a half minutes to go in the game, Albany sophomore Ted Hotaling hit a lay-up to give the Danes a 59-58 lead.

After R.P.I.'s George Foley missed the front end of a one and one, junior cocaptain Jason Graber drained an eightfooter from the right corner to extend the lead to 61-58.

At 1:21, Erik Whalen brought the Engineers to within one with a pair of free throws.

Albany's Paul Fitzpatrick then hit the biggest shot of the game when he buried an 18-foot jumper from the top of the key, giving the Danes a 63-60 advantage at :38. Fitzpatrick, not known for his long range shooting talent, came through in the clutch to give the Danes the victory.

After R.P.I. missed a shot, junior cocaptain Garry Murray put the finishing touches on Albany's 65-60 victory with two free throws.

"Fitzpatrick's shot was a big shot," Sauers said.

Graber, who was selected to the ECAC Honor Roll for the eighth straight week, paced the Danes with 24 points. Hotaling had 13 points.

Murray did not shoot well (2-12 FG) but made up for it on the boards, where he pulled down 11 rebounds to lead Albany. He totaled seven points and also had five assists.

Junior Dan Keegan had four points,

four assists, and five rebounds in 26 minutes at the point guard position and freshman Craig Calderon had five points off the bench.

Finding themselves down by one and shooting poorly at the half way point, the Danes turned it around and shot 59 percent in the second half while only committing one turnover.

For the game, they committed only five turnovers in a near flawless

Mike Comerford had 23 points and ten rebounds to pace the Engineers while Foley had 12 points, five rebounds and

Whalen scored 11 points and pulled downed 11 boards for the Engineers.

Albany did not play seventh seed Utica College, but lost 90-77 to eighth seed Plattsburgh State on January 4th.

Great Danes are snubbed by ECAC Tournament

Albany head basketball coach Richard "Doc" Sauers didn't know it at the time, but his Great Danes had just ended their season with a 65-60 win over Rensselear Polytechnic Institute (14-10) Saturday night.

Thirty-seven years of coaching experience at Albany told Sauers that his team would receive a berth in the Eastern Collegiate Athletic Conference (ECAC) Tournament, provided they beat the Engineers.

In the lockerroom after the win over R.P.I., Sauers told his players that they would receive a bid to the ECAC tourney, which starts this week.

Then came the bad news over the telephone at 10:15 yesterday morning. An ECAC committee member told Sauers that Albany had not received a bid on the basis of "head to head competition, overall strength of schedule, and overall record."

"That's a lot of bull," Sauers said, referring to the ECAC's criteria for selection. "They made up the brackets to serve their needs, to cater to their own matchups."

"Even the Hartwick coach (Nick Lambros) thought his team wouldn't get a bid," Sauers continued. "He had his team's stuff packed away."

Hartwick College, with a record of 14-11, received the sixth seed in the eightteam tournament, while Albany, with a 15-10 record, was snubbed for a berth.

"We did everything we needed to do to go," Sauers said. "I'm very disappointed for the team."

Seeded first in the tournament is Hamilton College, which pulled out a one-point overtime win over the Danes back on December 10th in Clinton, New York.

Albany did not play second-seeded Rochester Institute of Technology or third seed Saint John Fisher College this year, but dropped a 61-55 decision to fourth seed Binghamton State at West Gym on November 24th.

The Danes had a home at home series with fifth-seeded Elmira College, with each team winning a game. Albany invaded Elmira's Murray Center on February 13th only to be repelled by a fired up Soaring Eagles squad, 87-68.

The Soaring Eagles came to Albany's Recreation and Convocation Center on Febraury 24th with hope for an NCAA Tournament bid on their minds. Albany dealt Elmira a serious blow to their NCAA chances when they beat them 77-69 that night, however.

Sixth seeded Hartwick disposed of the Danes, 65-56, when Albany visited the

Lady Danes falter at States

Rochester sends Albany home early

Poor shooting was the main culprit as the Lady Danes basketball team lost to the University of Rochester, 61-51, in the first round of the New York State Tournament at Ithaca College's Ben Light Gymnasium Friday night.

Albany's 28 percent shooting from the field in the first half and 33 percent in the second spelled doom as the Lady Danes received an early exit from the NYS Tournament for the second year in a row.

The Lady Danes were horrid from three-point range, hitting only one of 18 attempts from beyond the arc.

Expectations were high last year as the team entered the tournament as the top seed. In the first round, Hartwick College, the eighth seed, almost beat the Lady Danes in front of its home crowd in Oneonta. Poor free-throw shooting down the stretch hurt the Warriors and the Lady Danes prevailed, 65-61.

In the semi-final game, Hamilton College, for the second time that season, dismantled Albany, 60-50, to advance to the NYS Championship game which they eventually lost to William Smith College.

From the outset of Albany's matchup versus Rochester it was a battle between the Yellowjackets' 6'2" senior Tracy Buettgens and Lady Dane junior Lynda Nealis.

A Buettgens post move for two started the game's scoring. Albany's Ikeuchi Franklin, a senior, connected on a left hook before Buettgens hit a lay-up.

Nealis scored on a layin which was followed by another Buettgens move for two.

A Nealis drive to the hole yielded her two points and a trip to the foul line for a possible three-point play. She missed the free throw and Buettgens came down on the other end for another bucket.

Nealis kept the see-saw battle going when she nailed two straight jumpers, one from ten feet and another from 15 feet, to make it a 10-8 Albany lead.

The Lady Danes saw their early lead evaporate when the Yellowjackets embarked on a mammoth 19-4 run that lasted

Kristi Pittman scored two and Buettgens followed with an offensive rebound and layin and two free throws. Libbie Tobin hit a baseline jumper, and the score was 19-14, Yellowjackets.

Senior Ikeuchi Franklin scored in the lane for Albany, but Rochester brought out its three-point shooting arsenal and the Lady Danes found themselves down, 30-18, with 1:47 to go in the half

Trish Kokoszka unloaded her first of two trifectas of the day. Buettgens continued to be a terror, scoring two more of her 14 first half points.

Tobin drained two more three-pointers on the Yellowjackets' next two trips down the floor to make it a 12-point Rochester lead.

The score at the half was 30-20.

"We didn't come out and put our game plan together,"
Albany coach Mari Warner said. "We just didn't come out

There is something about Albany-R.P.I. matchups that goes beyond the fact that the two are heated Capital District rivals.

Flashback to November 23, 1991: After a 72-57 victory over Union College in the opening round, the Danes face R.P.I. in the championship game of the Capital District Tournament at Robison Gym in Troy.

A sorry performance by the Danes and a three-point shooting bonanza by the Engineers are the causes of an 80-60 win by R.P.I. over Albany.

February 29, 1992: An NCAA Tournament bid is on the line as the two teams square off in the final game of the regular season. The winner rejoices, the loser thinks of what could have been. The Danes play inspired basketball and short-circuit the Engineers on their home court, 90-76, to take the NCAA bid and their pride back.

November 21, 1992: The two teams meet in another Capital District Championship game. Albany takes back the championship it lost the year before,

pummeling R.P.I. in a convincing early season performance, 84-70.

The stakes were lowered when the Danes (15-10) again met the Engineers (14-10) at Robison Gym this past Saturday, A possible Eastern Collegiate Athletic Conference Tournament bid was up for grabs this time around.

Albany and R.P.I. produced one of their closest games in a while, with the Danes pulling away down the stretch with some clutch shots to win, 65-60.

"We played a gutsy game," Albany head coach Richard "Doc" Sauers said. "We were very intelligent."

After the game, Sauers told all the Great Danes that they would make the ECAC Tournament because of this win. Sauer's premonition proved wrong, however.

Officials from the ECAC called Monday morning to inform Sauers that the Great Danes had not received a bid to this week's tournament.

"We did everything we needed to do to go," Sauers said on Monday. "I told the players after the game that 'we're in'."
