



Party Accuses Walesa

WARSAW, Poland (AP) The Communist Party accused Solidarity leaderLech Walesa Monday of calling for the overthrow of Polish authorities during a closed union meeting last week.

Warsaw Radio broadcast Walesa's tape-recorded remarks, and Walesa confirmed Monday that he made the comments. He told the Associated Press his words were taken out of context but he would not elaborate. A radio spokesman said he could not say where the tapes

Coinciding with the harsh new Polish attack on Solidarity's leadership, the Soviet government newspaper Izvestia charged Monday that extremists in Poland's trade union movement were verging on terrorism in their efforts to undermine the influence of the ruling Communist Party.

1788 Tax Law Erased

ALBANY, N.Y. (AP) New York state's 1788 full value property tax assessment law, widely ignored for almost two centuries, has been officially crased from the books.

The state Legislature voted Thursday to override Gov. Hugh Carey's veto of a bill essentially legalizing the fractional assessment system which had grown up in localities across the state. And in the new law, based on a compromise bill worked out by Senate Majority Leader Warren Anderson and AssemblySpeakerStanley Fink, was designed to end six years of delay and feuding

"What the governor forgot is that we're the ones who make the laws," said a happy Fink (D-Brooklyn) after his house had voted 103-34 to override Carey's veto. "He was worried about the assessments being full-value. Now the law of this state reads 'you don't need fullvalue.' We changed the law so we don't have to do it."

The override vote in the Republican-controlled Senate was 43-14.

Libyan Plane Hijacked

BEIRUT, Lebanon (AP) Three Lebanese Moslems armed with grenades hijacked a Libyan jetliner Monday and forced it to fly to Beirut where they said they were seeking the return of a Shiite Moslem leader who disappeared three years ago. They threatened to order the plane aloft and blow it up, airport officials said.
"We don't care about the crew. We don't care about

ourselves." one of the hijackers who identified himself as Ali Hamdu said over the plane's radio to the Beirut

One airport tower official who declined to be iden tified said the hijackers were negotiating with officials and calling for the return of Imam Moussa Sadr, a Shiite clergyman who disappeared in August 1978 after visiting Libya. His whereabouts remain a mystery.

Hijacked Plane Lands

BARRANQUILLA, Colombia (AP) One of three BARRANQUILLA, Colombia (AP) One of three Venezuelan airliners hijacked in a highly coordinated operation landed Monday night in the Honduran capital of Tegucigalpa, airport officials said.

The control tower officials, quoted by Caracol radio station in Barranquilla, said they believed the two other

planes were en route to El Salvador and Guatemala.

All three planes had been commandeered while on

domestic flights over Venezuela and were forced to land in Barranquilla, a Colombian port city on the Caribbean, where the women and children were freed.

A control tower spokesman at the international air-

port in Tegucgalpa, Gustave Hernandez, told the Caracol radio network that an Aeropostal DC-9 landed and the hijackers immediately asked to see the Venezuelan ambassador and a Roman Catholic church

All three planes were on the ground in Barranquilla for about 10 hours before they departed.

Gas Tax to be Hiked

WASHINGTON, D.C. (AP) The Reagan administration is considering more than doubling the federal taxes motorists pay for gasoline and substantially boosting fees on large trucks to pay for the nation's highways and

Proposals being developed in the Transportation
Department call for a possible increase in the current
cent a gallon federal gasoline tax to 9 cents. Other suggestions would increase taxes paid by the owners of large tractor-trailer trucks by as much as 75 percent.

Transportation Secretary Drew Lewis in recent speeches has suggested that the additional tax be used to complete the interstate system and highway repairs with I cent going to mass transit to make the plan more palatable to congressmen from urban areas.

Panel Affirms Air Safety

WASHINGTON, D.C. (AP) Independent federal investigators have concluded that the safety of the nation's air traffic control system has not been jeopardized by the firing of 11,500 strikers last August, it was

The findings are in a report to be presented by the staff of the National Transportation Safety Board for final approval today. A 16-member task force interviewed working controllers and toured a number of control towers and centers during a two-month investigation. The aim was to determine whether the reduced air con-troller force and other post-strike factors posed any

reduction in safety.

The board is an independent agency that investigates airline and other transportation accidents.

Warning System Tested

MONTPELIER, Vt.(AP) Residents of communities in Vermont, Massachusetts and New Hampshire will be hearing the blares of high-pitched sirens during the next

The Vermont Yankee nuclear power plant in Vernon is testing a warning system that would be used in the case of an actual emergency to alert people within a 10-mile radius, spokesman Stephen Stoll said.

Testing began last week in Northfield, Mass., and will this week and next in Corrain, Mass., Hinsdale, N.H., Winchester, N.H., and Brattleboro and

Three sitens each are in Northfield, Hinsdale, Winchester and Vernon, with one in Colrain and four in Brattleboro, Stoll said.

Leaders Agree On Cuts

WASHINGTON, D.C. (AP) Republican congressional leaders and Reagan administration officials are in ten-tative agreement on an additional \$4 billion in domestic iding cuts to meet "the major challenges of the president" and avert another budget crisis.

President Reagan's "final signoff" on the plan, to be included in a new emergency money bill to replace one that expires Dec. 15, was expected today, said a congressional source who asked to remain anonymous.

The source quoted White House budget director David A. Stockman as telling participants in a private Capitol Hill meeting Thursday night that the proposal "meets the major challenges of the president."

On Sept. 24, Reagan asked Congress for an additional \$8.4 billion in domestic spending cuts — 12 percent across the board. He later indicated he was willing to accept half that amount, and White House spokesman David Gergen repeated Thursday that "what the president has asked for is something that meets him approximately halfway.'

Sources said the new proposal generally calls for across-the-board cuts of 4 percent in most domestic programs, including those singled out in Reagan's September request.

Deeper Deficit Predicted

WASHINGTON, D.C. (AP) A deepening recession is pushing the federal budget toward a record \$109 billion deficit for 1982 and even greater red ink in subsequent years unless there are drastic new spending cuts, according to a revised administration forecast.

istration sources said the forecast projects a \$162 billion deficit by 1984, climbing interest rates by next summer and unemployment persisting at its current rate of 8.4 percent or higher for all of 1982,

On the brighter side, it predicts strong economic growth in excess of 5 percent a year for 1983 and 1984, nd a continued easing of inflation to below 5 percent by

The sources who revealed details of the updated forecast did so on the condition their names not be us-

The new deficit estimates are the largest yet projected by the administration, which came into office saying it would get the deficit down to \$45 billion in 1982 and balance the budget by 1984.

"It's a mammoth problem, a monstrous problem," one source said Monday.

The new forecast - prepared by economists at the office of Management and Budget, Treasury Department and Council of Economic Advisers — was presented to the president last Friday as he conferred with his advisors on a new round of budget cuts for fiscal 1983, which begins next Oct. 1.

Reagan is expected to propose severe reductions in social programs beyond those he obtained from Congress for the current fiscal year.

Unhappy Anniversary the mirror? Chances are that its face reflects a country old, worn and tired — sick of all the tragedy it has had to deal with. The eyes are bloodshot and the

Old and tired. But still mean. How far have we come and, more importantly, where are we going? We're traveling on a road but we seem to be passing the same exact scenery again and again,

skin is wrinkled. But deep within those reddened eyes lie pupils that burn with

Along this road, this time of year seems to be related with the rather horrible landmark of violence. For instance, we entered this year without the presence of John Lennon. So very many things have been written about the events which put the Dakota on the mental maps of several generations. The sweet life of the tired poet is in such contrast to the brutality which made him a mere statistic that it still defies reason.

What more can one say except 'Tis the season. Actually, violence is always in season. But when one reflects upon the coming of Christmas one must also take into consideration our past losses. It seems as if a year can't end without a flurry of bullets, or without a bang, so to speak.

Eighteen years, two weeks ago, this country's fiery eyes saw the firing upon its leader. After 18 years we still grieve. Too much has been said; not enough has been done. The brainwash of information does nothing to end the problem,

If further historical example is needed, one need only check the historical explanation of the event which occured 40 years ago yesterday. What happened on that day in 1941 served to escalate the power of violence to heights once thought unattainable. In a Hawaiian port called Pearl Harbor, America again came to that point in its full circle of violence, further realizing that the road goes on

America should not be like a game of roulette. For this country and its mode of thought the saying might well be, "round and round it goes and where we stop nobody knows." If that's the case, the problem lies in where to stop. As much as one may think to the contrary, that point is nowhere in sight and is in danger of becoming the point of no return,

Presently, this country is involved in new violence — as much in words as in weapons. Libya and the United States are presently discussing whether or not the leader of the former country is trying to have the leaders of this country eliminated. Is this a prelude of a hoax? No matter, because we're sure that it's an indication. It's a timely reminder of our heritage and a fairly good predicter of the road that lies ahead.

The eyes still burn. Maybe the fire will be quelled when tears lead to the right

Bannister, according to associate, not only received CIA funding but "acted as a key liason man for all U.S. governmentsponsored anti-communist activities in Latin American."

Hinkle and Turner theorize that Oswald's pro-communist activities at this time were nothing more than a charade. Bannister, who was fanatically anti-communist was kidded by one of his agents about sharing a building with leftists. Bannister's reply was "Cool it - one of them is mine."

Roberts, testified in 1978 before the House Select Committee on Assassinations that Oswald had come to the detective agency several times, sometimes filling out an Bannister privately. After this Roberts was upset to one day see Oswald passing communist literature on a street corner. "It's okay," Bannister reassured her, 'He's with the office.'

New Records Prove Swimmers Are Not a Fluke


