The making of "Quiet", "Milne

MISS HALTER OUTLINES RELATIONS OF FACULTY WITH STUDENT BODY

Miss Helen Halter, member of the Milne faculty, addressed the Senier Class at a meeting of that body yesterday. Miss Halter offered to support "the faculty side of school questions," illustrating the faculty viewpoint by their attitude toward chaperening.

Chaperoning, she said, is always a duty on the part of the faculty, but there numerous ways by which the students can make that duty a pleasure. Faculty members could be made to feel more welcome, merely by receiving acknowledgement of their presence at dances. Dance committees could do more to promote the comfort of the chaperons, Miss Halter asserted, and at the same time students could express their pleasure at their presence.

It was intimated that the faculty was more than desirous to make friends with the student body, but thus far the students have not sh when any desire to meet them half-way.

It was announced that Room 130 would be set aside for Seniors only after 2 P.M. This was granted in response for more Senior privileges.

Team won its fourth consecutive game

The team displayed wonderful scoring

the visitors. After several minutes
of play the Milne Cagers sank four
field baskets in quick succession to

The score at half time was 24 to 12.

Only once did Milne slacken its scoring power and that was during the third quarter.

Throughout the game Milne used very good form and a fast passing attack which completely cutplayed Jefferson in all respects.

Thomas Watkins lead Milne's scoring with a total of 17 points.

According to President Franklin D. Roosevelt, there are always a certain few who are dubious as to the advisability of adopting new measures, and whose opposition a nnot be destroyed except by furnishing figures to prove their success. Strangely enough, this same thing holds true concerning what we have previously dubbed the 'Milne N. R. A."

There are still those of us who insist that this new system is but a childish way of enforcing "military discipline" upon innocent students, and although as yet we have no definite figures to convince those who would already do away with this system, we find that we might be able to sooth their enger by a few hitherto unmentioned remarks.

It seems queer that, at just the # time that this new arrangement was being first tried, Milne students should make such a riotous showing at the basketball game. A parently, they don't feel that they have had enough suppervision, for undoubtedly, if there is anything else that could bring about

more supervision by the faculty, it would be just such conduct. This is not meant to be a scolding, but the fact remains, that such behavior might be taken as a sign of the desire of the student body for more and closer proctorship.

Now, perhaps a few words of consolution might be in order. Milnites should not think that this is the only school where this plan has been put into practice, for they would be sadly mistaken. One of the chief reasons why this system was considered practicable in Milne is because of its marvelous success in other institutions. It has been found that such an arrange ment is beneficial to the majority, while only a small minority is seriously affected.

Therefore, in accordance with who has been mentioned above, we believe that before any students begin a movement to protest this new system, they stop and see if already they haven't gone too far in the other direction, especially by showing that this plan is almost indispensable, and that even more surveillance is needed.
