The motor caravan started in Los Angeles as an AFL-CIO demonstration. and rapidly spread throughout the country. A delegation of 25 cars came through Schenectady Monday night from Buffalo, with Steelworkers, Auto Workers and Mine, Mill and Smelter Workers from the Buffalo region, UE members from Rome and Fur and Leather Workers from Gloversville. They were greeted at 201 hall by officers and Board mem-

#### 301 Endorses Caravan

The Tuesday night 301 membership meeting endorsed the caravan and authorized sending 50 people and 13 cars. The local group started out immediately after the meeting.

Another 301 delegation went to Washington Sunday night to call on Congress members Monday and Tuesday. They were Board Members William Stewart, Dewey Brashear, Helen Quirini, and Willard Kuschel and a member of the Legislative Committee, William Templeton, Steward and Templeton reported to the membership Tuesday night.

Appeals to Dewey, Ives Local 301's campaign against the Taft-Hartley bill included newspaper advertisements, open letters to Governor Dewey and U. S. Senator Ives.

The Dewey advertisement in the Knickerbocker News Saturday demanded that the Governor speak out against the bill and that as Republican leader, he call on the Republican Senator and Congressmen from this state to support a veto.

A group of 86 business and professional people in Schenectady paid for and signed a large advertisement in the Gazette, against the bill. The GE Conference Board of UE locals will meet in New York City Monday. Even AFL leaders were talking poli-

tical action in view of the National Association of Manufacturers victory. For national UE, Albert J. Fitzgerald,

general president, declared. "We will fight the law through every legitimate means."

On the employer side, General Electric came out Wednesday with big advertisements addressed "To our employees and the public." The lengthy message boiled down to two points: (1) gross misrepresentation of what is in the Taft-Hartley act, and (2) a thinly veiled appeal to the workers to by-pass the union (GE calls it "labor bosses" now) and deal individually with the employer.

## District Votes Aid To Rem-Rand Strike

June 27, 1947

Plans for aiding the Remington Rand strikers were made at a special meeting of the UE District 3 Executive Board Monday at Utica. The Board ear-marked \$5,000 of the district funds for the assistance of the UE strikers.

After the Utica meeting, President Andrew Peterson of 301 went to Ilion for a strike rally that night. He assured the strikers of the solid backing of Local 301. UE workers at Remington Rand plants donated generously to the 1946 GE strike in Schenectady.

The 301 Executive Board Tuesday voted \$100 to the strikers and recommended that an additional \$1,000 be appropriated by the next membership meeting.

UE workers at Syracuse, Ilion and Tonawanda and at Benton Harbor, Mich., are on strike. So are the IAM members at Elmira.

Remington Rand was notorious for originating the Mohawk-Valley formula to prevent union organizing drives and to smash unions.

#### New Benefit Year For Jobless Pay

Since June 1, when the 1947-48 "benefit year" began, unemployment insurance is paid on the basis of earnings in the calendar year 1946.

Job seekers who have exhausted their benefit rights based on earnings in 1945, and who worked in 1946, may file new claims now.


Those whose rights were not exhausted by June 1 should make sure their claims are active by reporting immediately to the nearest unemployment insurance office, if they are not presently claiming benefits. However, they must be unemployed and ready to work.

#### Holiday Pay Cases Involve 30 Workers

Cases of approximately 30 workers who were denied their Memorial Day holiday pay are being taken up as grievances by the union. The company has agreed to give the

pay in 10 out of 15 cases already discussed. A. C. Stevens told the union a national GE policy is being worked out handling such cases. Holiday pay was withheld on the grounds that the workers were absent the day before or the day after the holiday weekend, or reported to work late or left early. The union contends the workers had legitimate ex-

## Emspak Stresses Need for Political Action



Julius Emspak, national UE secretarytreasurer, speaking on the urgent need for PAC at the special membership meeting of Local 301 June 17. The meeting voted unanimously to endorse CIO-PAC as the policy of the local, and also voted to collect one dollar voluntary PAC contributions. Executive Board members this week started distributing PAC receipt books to shop stewards. The action of Congress in passing the Taft-Hartley bill brought home to thousands of UE members in Schenectady the urgency of supporting PAC.

## Union Presses Grievances For Two Retired Workers

The local has filed grievances in behalf of two members who were retired May 1, for extra vacation pay and wage in-

The union claims that since the three weeks vacation provision became effective Apr. 1, the men are entitled to an extra week's vacation pay apiece. And since the addition of the vacation pay would put them on the payroll as of May 6, ratification date of the wage provisions, the union also claims they should get the pay raise back to Apr. 14.

#### Cognetta Takes Part In Union Broadcast

James Cognetta, who headed the Local 301 group joining the CIO-AFL caravan to Washington, spoke on the 301 radio program Monday night, with Milo Lath-

Speaking of the vote on the Taft-Hartley bill, Cognetta said:

"What gets me is how Senator Ives can vote with men like Rankin and still maintain he is a liberal and a friend of labor. Does he think people have no sense at all?"

Workers looking for advancement should remember to tell their foremen what jobs they want to be considered for. Under the union contract, present employes are entitled to consideration in preference to new employees.

For some time the union has been pressing the company to carry out this provision. The company's answer has been that it was going outside the plant only after first trying to find qualified men in the works willing to take the jobs. Last week the company published an invitation to outside workers to apply for such skilled jobs as boring mill operator, lathe operator, milling machine operator, turret lathe operator, and floor assembly, which are generally piece work jobs among the higher earning

If a qualified man asks for a chance at a higher-rated job anywhere in the works and it is filled from the outside, that is a proper subject for a grievance. It should be taken up with your steward.
