In his years of teaching here, Dr. Thompson has tried to combine literature with history and music,--"to cut across departmental lines," as he says, "a thing which many of the faculty do." His favorite course is American folk literature, where the students do original research work. He has used a great deal of this student research material in writing his latest book. "In a way,' says Dr. Tommy, "Body, Boots, and Britches is a State college






