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### FIRST COMPUTERIZED CLASSROOM TO TEACH MATH

For years mathematicians and the National Science Foundation (NSF) have been trying to bring the computer into the mathematics classroom in a substantive and interactive way.

With the slice of a ribbon on Monday, Sept. 10, at 11:15 a.m. in the University at Albany's Department of Mathematics, such a classroom becomes a reality. "Earth Science Building Room 146 will be the first computer environment where one of the NSF's principal calculus/computer projects will be tested," said professor of mathematics and department chairman Timothy Lance.

"This will be the laboratory," said Lance of this multi-year NSF-sponsored initiative, which could not have been realized without a grant of \$100,000 worth of Amiga Computers and other equipment to the University from Commodore Business Machines. "Courseware for the project is still being developed, and will be greatly influenced by our experience in this room."

Lance admits that teaching with computers is largely an unknown, but that the NSF, industry and mathematicians in general have felt such a computer classroom test site was long overdue. A publisher of courseware has already asked the Department to help develop written material on teaching via computer, and Earth Science 146 will be used in upcoming Commodore magazine advertisements.

The classroom will also be a tool in an outreach program to the community. In conjunction with the Albany superintendent of schools and the district's mathematics program director, a program will be in place allowing every mathematics teacher in the Albany Public Schools to visit the computer classroom test site, learn about its workings and plans, and offer input.

"This program will be extended to other school districts as well," said Lance,
"and by next summer we hope to have a program in place for middle school and high
school students, getting them excited about the new innovations in math and thereby
helping to refill this nation's mathematics pipeline."

## Chemistry Nobel Laureate Roald Hoffmann To Speak at the University at Albany

Nobel Laureate Roald Hoffmann of Cornell University will deliver the second annual Henry G. Kuivila Lecture at the University at Albany, State University of New York, on Thursday, Sept. 13. The program, which is sponsored by the Department of Chemistry, is free and open to the public.

Hoffmann, who shared the 1981 Nobel Prize in chemistry for his work in the concept of orbital symmetry, will discuss "Making and Breaking Bonds in the Solid State." The program will be in two parts. The first part will provide an introduction and overview of the field, while the second part will describe recent advances. The talk will be at 4:30 p.m. in the Recital Hall of the Performing Arts Center on the uptown campus, 1400 Washington Ave. A reception and banquet will follow at 6:45 p.m. in the Patroon Room.

"Roald Hoffmann is both a world reknowned scientist and an exciting lecturer," said Shelton Bank of the Chemistry Department, co-chair of the event. He noted that Hoffmann, who earned his Ph.D. at Harvard University, has won major awards in both organic and inorganic chemistry, including the prestigious Priestley Medal, the American Chemical Society's highest honor, in 1990. Hoffmann is also a poet, whose first volume of poetry, "The Metamicht State," came out in 1987, as well as a television personality. He will host a TV course called "The World of Chemistry," a series of 26 half-hour programs to air on public television and cable channels in 1991.

The lecture honors Henry G. Kuivila, who became an emeritus professor in 1988 after 24 years with the department. It was established with funds from Kuivila's friends, colleagues and former students.

# IBM Awards Contract to University at Albany's School of Information Science and Policy

The IBM Corp. has awarded the University at Albany's School of Information Science and Policy a contract to manage a network of specialized libraries which IBM maintains for 17,000 employees in the mid-Hudson Valley.

The state-of-the-art corporate libraries are currently staffed and managed directly by IBM. The School of Information Science and Policy, part of the University's Rockefeller College of Public Affairs and Policy, will assume those responsibilities for IBM under the arrangement, providing a wide range of professional services. Those services will include recruitment and training of new personnel, assistance in teaching library users how to use soft-ware and operations research. In exchange, graduate students within the School will be able to take advantage of intern opportunities in the libraries.

Richard S. Halsey, dcan of the School of Information Science and Policy, described the project as a "unique corporate-public sector partnership," and said it would draw upon the expertise of not only the School, but also other schools and departments involved in recently launched interdisciplinary undergraduate and graduate research initiatives on the Albany campus.

"IBM's system is already state-of-the-art," explained Halsey, who will assist Vincent J. Aceto, the School's associate dean, in overseeing implementation of the contract. "But there is more important information outside the system that IBM wants to take advantage of. Our job will be to draw upon the expertise we have to strengthen the libraries and meet the needs of IBM's technical professionals."

Aceto said that the interdisciplinary nature of a number of the School's programs affords a unique opportunity for faculty from business, computer science, communication, linguistics and cognitive science, philosophy, public affairs and psychology to be involved with the IBM project. Many of these same faculty, he said, are also members of the Institute for the Study of Information Science (ISIS), a newly formed center at Albany that is actively engaged in research that is pertinent to the needs of IBM. Institute staff and students enrolled in the School's new interdisciplinary doctoral program in information science will be actively engaged in advanced study and applied research in information theory, organization, management and policy.

G.R. Davidson, IBM's educational manager in the mid-Hudson Valley, said the School's interdisciplinary focus, along with the over-all quality of the faculty and program, were important factors in the firm's decision to aware the contract to Albany.

While the School already has strong relations with government, school and public libraries, the IBM partnership will offer new opportunities for graduate students to gain experience working in a corporate, or specialized library environment, Halsey said.

"Specialized libraries offer some of the best job opportunities and some of the toughest intellectual challenges in the field today," he said.

A strong program of research grants for faculty members was established, the M.B.A. was strengthened, an information systems program and a focus in international business were begun, and the college's enrollments rose 50 percent.

Under Dr. Hughs' administration, the school also reached into the business community to establish a local bureau of business and economic research, and initiated the state's Small Business Development Center.

A 1957 graduate of the University of Rochester (B.S. in physics), Dr. Hughs received both his M.S. and Ph.D. degrees in mathematics from Purdue University. Between 1961 and 1970, he helped start the business school at Southern Illinois University, ran his own consulting organization, and held a senior position with Cresap, McCormick and Paget, Inc., one of the top general management consulting firms in the U.S. at that time.

From 1970-77, Dr. Hughs was associate dean of the Graduate School of Business Administration at New York University. There he established new links to the business

community through a placement service for NYU graduates, increased the quality of the undergraduate program through interdisciplinary initiatives, and became integral in the financial restructuring of the university itself.

Dr. Hughs was chosen after a national search that attracted nearly 100 candidates.
