To the Seniors

It is hard to estimate correctly the importance of events when we are in the midst of them. The glowing headlines of the present crowd important matters into the background, and only the perspective which comes with time can bring them into true relief. It is hard to estimate correctly the worthiness of people when you are surrounded by them—minor personal traits count too much on nerves at times a little taut. So it is with you and us. That economic theory, that apt allusion, that ingenious mathematical solution, that charming translation, with which you tickled us into good humor, has no right to screen away from us the modest but enduring values of a human soul, yet it sometimes does. It will take the test of time to bring forward from your midst those who possess the characteristics which humanity has always regarded as of paramount importance.

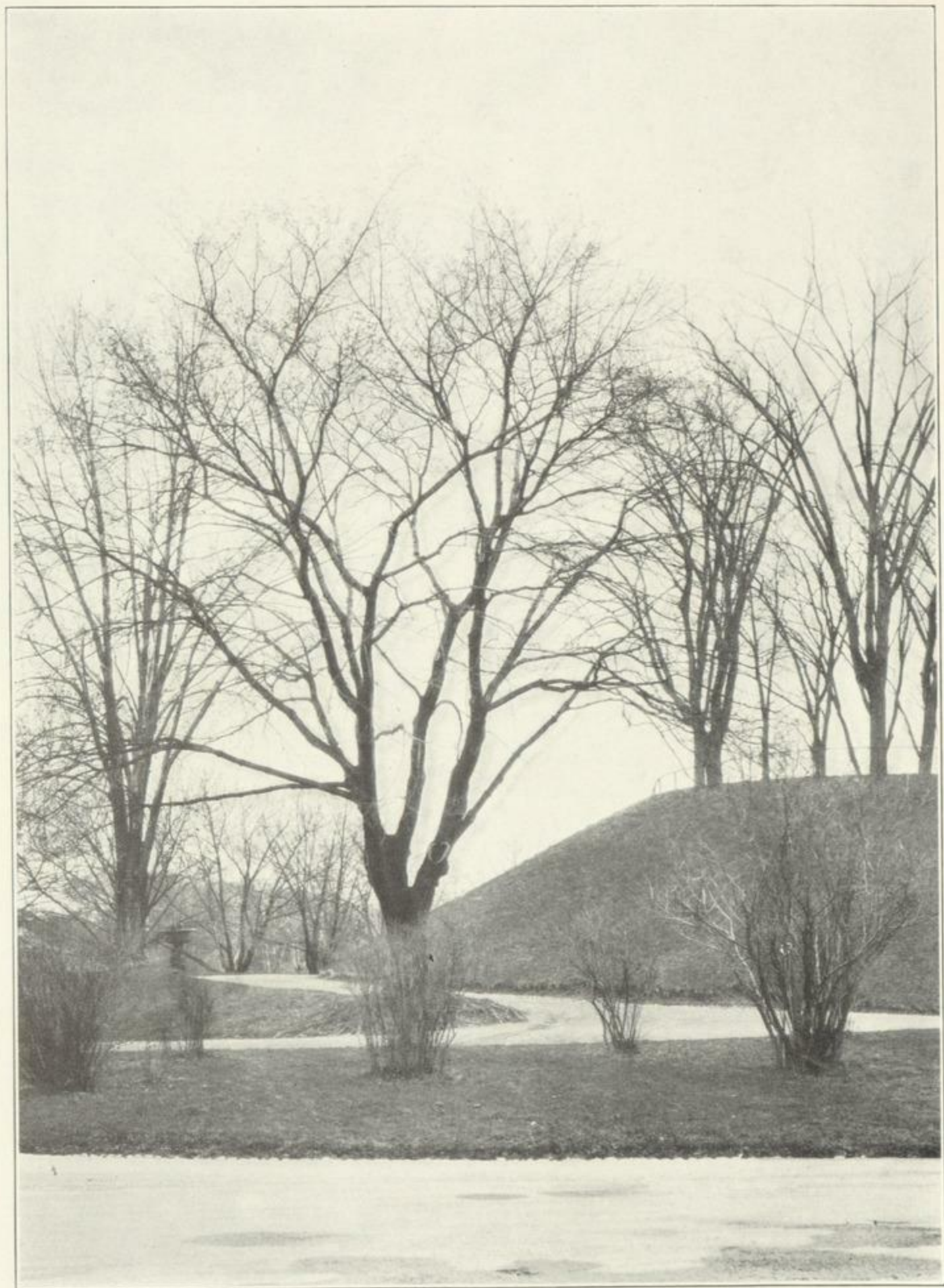

Junior Class History

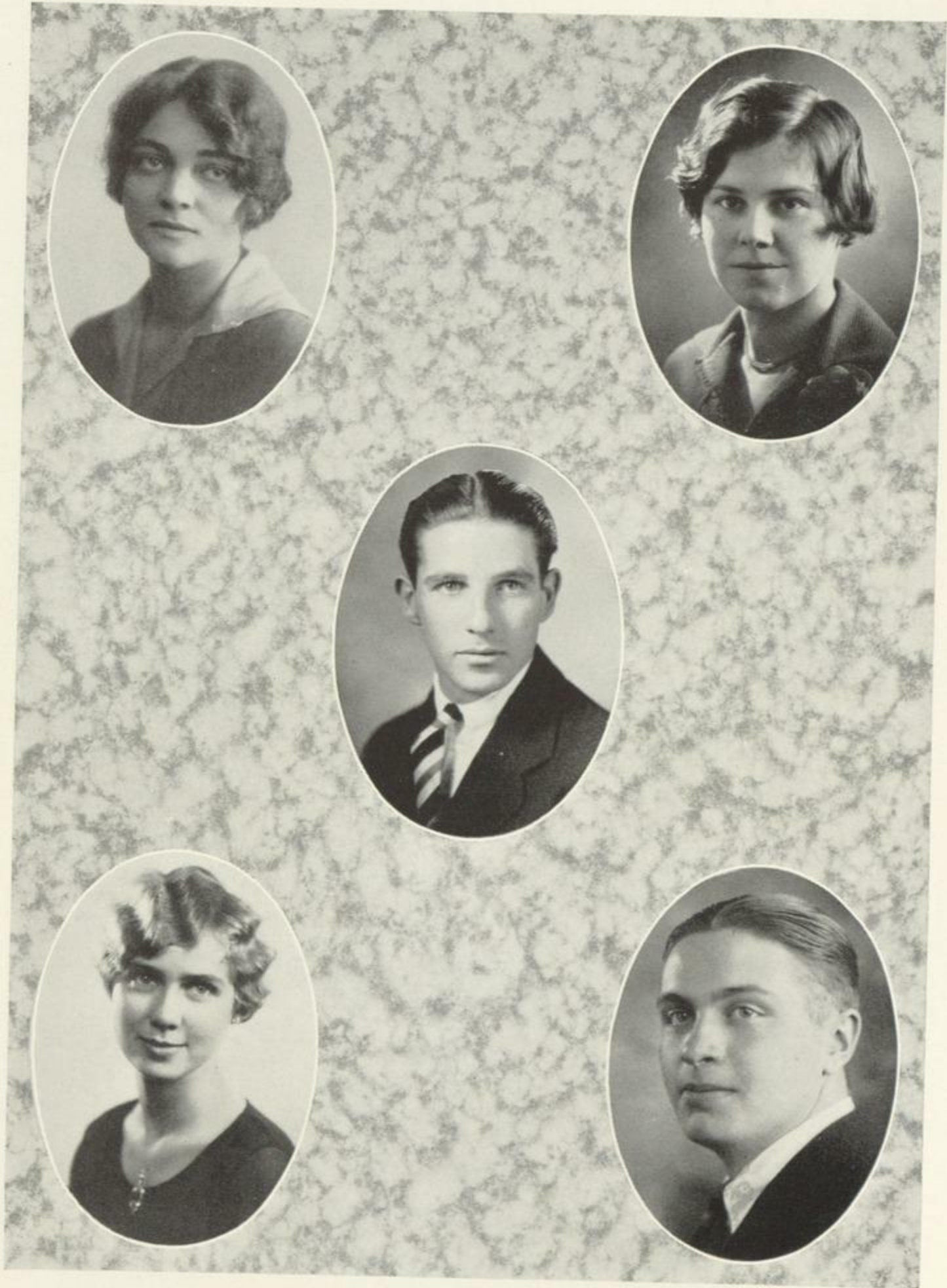

Although the final record of the games won and lost during the season of 1927-28 was not so good as that of the previous year, the State College quintet compared favorably with the State fives of the past. Three strong opponents appeared on the schedule. Of these three, two, Dartmouth and St. Bonaventure, won from the Purple and Gold, but the third, Providence College, fell before the home team in an overtime game. The team, which was well supplied with veterans (having six letter men back from last year's team), was handicapped at times by injuries. However, it managed to win eight games and lose but two, making an 800 average.

Joseph F. Herney, '29, will lead next year's quintet. Herney is a guard and has completed three years' service on the court. The retiring captain, Anthony F. Kuczynski, '29, who will be back in college next year to serve under the Purple and Gold, led the scorers of the team, making an average of over eight points a game.
