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EDITORIAL POLICY

Although the Roman Numeral LXXIX appears on the banner of this issue, it is only the beginning of the second year of the CRIMSON AND WHITE in the form of a newspaper.

The 1931-32 staff, Miss Katherine Wheeling, advisor, and the teachers of the two journalism classes deserve a great deal of credit. They started an hitherto unheard-of project in Milne High School, and successfully carried it out.

It is, however, now up to this year's staff to take up the work where it was left off and to greatly improve the paper. For, although there is no disputing the fact that last year's sheet was a good one, many mistakes were naturally made which should be corrected this year. The work has been begun. It is for the present staff to strive for every improvement possible and to attain as near perfection as possible.

The editorial policy for 1932-33 can very easily be outlined. As is the aim of every newspaper, the CRIMSON AND WHITE will attempt to present to the student body and faculty a fair and accurate summary of the news of the school. As far as is possible for a weekly newspaper, the news will be presented while it is still news. In any case, facts, not fiction, will be printed.

Probably one of the greatest and most permanent faults of the CRIMSON AND WHITE since its beginning in 1904 will be corrected this year. This is the method by which positions on the staff are filled. The method which is being replaced provided that members could present for the board's approval the name of their assistant. This might have been all right in some cases, but often good friends and popular students did not make good journalists. The cub class, therefore, is a distinct step forward, for this class will be open to any student in Senior High School. From this group the most deserving and capable will be selected as reporters and assistant department heads. This system is certainly democratic, and it is hoped that a large number of students will be interested in the class.

Footlights and Spotlights by Otis Skinner, "creator of Kismet", will be of special interest to classes studying drama.

The social science classes are fortunate to have such books at their disposal. Epic of America by James Truslow Adams, Only Yesterday by Fredrick Lewis Allen, and 20,000 Years in Sing Sing by Warden Lewis.

DIVISIONS OF GIRLS' GYM CLASSES ANNOUNCED BY MISS HITCHCOCK
