Thesis on Deforestation in the Amazon Wins University Award

A doctoral dissertation examining effects on birds of destruction of Amazon forests won the University at Albany's biennial Paul C. Lemon Award. The dissertation was done by Lee Harper, now a visiting assistant professor at St. Lawrence University. Harper received his doctorate in biology from the University at Albany in 1987.

The award, given in honor of former University biology professor Paul Lemon, is for a thesis done by an Albany graduate student that is "an outstanding contribution to our understanding of the ecological and environmental problems, interrelationships and challenges in man's natural world." A total of 220 doctoral dissertations and 74 master's theses were reviewed for the award.

Harper's work "provides valuable information on the size and shape of preserves or refuges that are needed to save endangered bird species," said John Mackiewicz, distinguished teaching professor in the Department of Biology at Albany.

Over a period of six years, Harper examined what happened to ten species of ant-following birds in areas of the Amazon basin where forest land was being destroyed. For such birds, army ants are a vital part of their diet. Harper found that three bird species decreased in forest fragments of 1 hectare, 10 hectares and 100 hectares. (A hectare is equivalent to approximately 2.5 acres.) However, the number of birds in the 100-hectare segment did not appear to decline while the segment was connected to the continuous forest by a 2-kilometer-long corridor. Declines occurred only after a 300-meter segment of the corridor was deforested, he found.

"Although small forest fragments were not effective biological reserves in themselves, they maintained populations of ant-following birds when a corridor was present and were used as stepping stones in a larger reserve matrix," reported Harper. He says his research indicates that forest fragments of at least 5,000 hectares are required to maintain the "minimum genetically effective population size of ant-following birds."

ATHLETIC COMMISSION NAMED

A special Commission on University Athletics has been appointed by President Vincent O'Leary of the University at Albany. The Commission, consisting of ten faculty members, five students, four administrators and two alumni will consider whether the University should advance the level at which it competes in intercollegiate athletics.

The University athletic program has been conducted within Division III of the National Collegiate Athletic Association for many years. Division III rules do not permit grants in aid for athletes, while Division II and Division I do.

The SUNY Board of Trustees revised its policies on athletic grants in 1986 which now allow SUNY campuses to request approval to participate at Division II and I. The University at Buffalo has secured SUNY authorization to move to Division I and currently competes at Division II.

President O'Leary asked the Commission on University Athletics to weigh carefully the benefits and costs of an upgraded athletic program, especially in terms of its impact on the educational program. "This campus is well positioned to consider a more prominent athletic program as part of its total development as a major university," said O'Leary. "With the construction of our new field house and the Knickerbocker Arena in Albany, facilities will be available for major athletic events, particularly men's and women's basketball. The academic quality of the institution has become clearly established and we need to determine if an enhanced athletic program could further help identify this campus with that select circle of national universities which almost uniformly have Division I athletics."

"However," O'Leary added, "the University is not prepared to sacrifice any part of its present resource base to build an athletic program. In athletics as in academics, our approach must be selective. Private financial support -- from alumni and the community -- must also be a key ingredient of any upgraded athletic program at this University."

The Commission on University Athletics will carry out its work during the Fall semester and is expected to report its findings and recommendations by December. The process of reclassifying an athletic program from Division III to Division I requires at least four years, including three years of competition at Division II.

Summer Public Science Lecture Series Returns to Whiteface Mountain

The global greenhouse effect, earthquakes in the East and mining in New York state are among the topics scheduled for the summer Public Science Lecture Series when it returns to the University at Albany's Whiteface Mountain Field Station in July.

In its 28th season, the series will open Tuesday evening, July 11, with a presentation by Bruce W. Piasecki, associate director of the Hazardous Waste and Toxic Substances Research and Management Center and a professor in the Center for Liberal Studies at Clarkson University in Potsdam, N.Y. Dr. Piasecki will discuss how energy policies can help counteract the greenhouse effect.

Seven lectures are planned for the series which will be held on consecutive Tuesdays through August 22. All presentations will begin at 8 p.m. at the field station located on Memorial Highway in Wilmington, N.Y. The talks are free and open to the public.

The popular series is sponsored by the university's Atmospheric Sciences Research Center and organized by well-known area meteorologist Ray Falconer. It features leading scientists and authorities--experts in their field--interpreting some of the many facets of modern science and of Whiteface Mountain. A report on the latest weather, using color projections, begins each lecture.

Here is the complete schedule:

--July 11: Beyond Blame--Securing Alternatives to Fossil Fuel to Help Counteract the Global Greenhouse Effect, by Bruce Piasecki, professor, Center for Liberal Studies, Clarkson University.

--July 18: A Tribute to the Wilderness, by Carl Heilman of Brant Lake,

N.Y. A professional maker of hand-split snowshoes and an accomplished photographer, Mr. Heilman will present a computerized, dual-projection, sound-synchronized visual tour of the Adirondacks using spectacular color slides.

--July 25: An Update on the Life of the Loon from Alaska to the Adirondacks, by Judith MacIntyre, well-known author and lecturer and professor of biology at Utica College, Utica, N.Y. Dr. MacIntyre, author of an article on loons that appeared in the March 1989 issue of Smithsonian magazine, will include slides from a just completed trip to Alaska in her presentation.

--August 1: Earthquakes in the Eastern United States and New York State, by Michael O'Rourke, associate professor of civil engineering at Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute. With some experts forecasting a catastrophic earthquake for the East in the early 21st century, Dr. O'Rourke will look at the prediction for the next 50 to 500 years while examining the causes, consequences and how one might minimize the damage of earthquakes.

--August 8: Exploring Glacier Bay Alaska by Kayak, by Rick Strimbeck, project manager, Branch Project, Whiteface Mountain Field Station. A kayak voyage up the 40-mile long bay is a trip back in time--10- to 10,000-year-old landscapes, creatures of the intertidal, whales, wolves, bears, an enchanted valley and an abandoned gold mine.

--August 15: Mines and Mineral Resources of New York State, by Donald Potter, professor of geology, emeritus, Hamilton College, Clinton, N.Y. An investigation of the history of mining and ore deposits in New York state, including some of the operating mines.

--August 22: The Adirondack Wildlife Program Including the Canada Lynx Restoration Project, by Rainer Brocke, co-director, The Adirondack Wildlife Program and professor at State University College of Environmental Science and Forestry, Syracuse, N.Y. An illustrated lecture on efforts to restore the lynx to the Adirondack High Peaks Region.

Lightning and Electrical Discharges Will Be Focus Of Conference

Scientists from Canada, Sweden and the United States will gather in Lake Placid for three days starting Wednesday, June 21 for the 17th Annual Conference on Electrostatics. Electrostatics is the study of charges that accumulate on conducting and nonconducting surfaces, and among the phenomena included in that study are sparks, lightning, xerography, and electrostatic spraying of paints and pesticides.

The conference will include presentations on thunderstorm electricity, the triggering of lightning by aerospace vehicles, the use of electrostatic precipitators in modern air pollution control, and the contribution of electrostatics to the finishing industry.

Thesis on Deforestation in the Amazon Wins University Award

A doctoral dissertation examining effects on birds of destruction of Amazon forests won the University at Albany's biennial Paul C. Lemon Award. The dissertation was done by Lee Harper, now a visiting assistant professor at St. Lawrence University. Harper received his doctorate in biology from the University at Albany in 1987.

The award, given in honor of former University biology professor Paul Lemon, is for a thesis done by an Albany graduate student that is "an outstanding contribution to our understanding of the ecological and environmental problems, interrelationships and challenges in man's natural world." A total of 220 doctoral dissertations and 74 master's theses were reviewed for the award.

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Over a period of six years, Harper examined what happened to ten species of ant-following birds in areas of the Amazon basin where forest land was being destroyed. For such birds, army ants are a vital part of their diet. Harper found that three bird species decreased in forest fragments of 1 hectare, 10 hectares and 100 hectares. (A hectare is equivalent to approximately 2.5 acres.) However, the number of birds in the 100-hectare segment did not appear to decline while the segment was connected to the continuous forest by a 2-kilometer-long corridor. Declines occurred only after a 300-meter segment of the corridor was deforested, he found.

"Although small forest fragments were not effective biological reserves in themselves, they maintained populations of ant-following birds when a corridor was present and were used as stepping stones in a larger reserve matrix," reported Harper. He says his research indicates that forest fragments of at least 5,000 hectares are required to maintain the "minimum genetically effective population size of ant-following birds."

Lightning and Electrical Discharges Will Be Focus Of Conference
