















LEGEND OF 1933


Even as the Indian youth sang as he went forth to a great adventure, so we of the class of '33 came singing to a new experience when we left our sheltered ways and arrived at the portals of college. Even as he met and surmounted new dangers and difficulties and gave thanks in joyful songs, so have we always sung in the joy of the quest. Even as he sang triumphal chants at the end of a strife well won, we sing ours which fades slowly into the sad strains of farewell.

We sang—our voices at first a little discordant, perhaps—having not yet learned to mingle in one chord of strength. We listened to lore of legend and tradition, but like the Indian child, intent still on games and feats of physical strength, we comprehended not their truths. We worshipped our glowing fire of crimson with hearts as glowing. With our fellow tribe of '32, we participated in rivalry and, endowed by the Great Spirit with strength and eagerness, we surpassed them. Our eyes, keen for the hunt found the mascot; our voices, tuned already to love of tribe, sang out a victorious Alma Mater. We initiated a feast celebrating our victory—which has now become for us a sacred custom observed on Moving-Up Day Eve. The impulsive tom-toms of our first "scalpdance" still echo on our ears, but now softened by more patient and lyrical strains.

Now as young braves, having met the first adventure with high hearts, we proceeded—hearing ever the voices of our fathers. We guarded our most sacred possessions; our fiery banner we concealed in suitcases; our fiery owl we kept secure from the grasping hands of '34. A new tribe equalled us in valor, and rivalry was tied. We consoled ourselves by knowing that we had established a precedent in being the first class to both find and keep the mascot. Our song endured—its composition became more complex. Our story, like that of the Indians, can not be fully told without the cadence of song. We left behind our days of rivalry and turned the eager courage and confidence gained from them to more vital things. We, who survived the tests of college living, saw promises of a great majestic strain. Our Junior Prom Week-end was as brilliant as the red of our emblem, which was almost imperceptibly gliding into a background of purple and gold. Slowly we began to be aware of the background and to value it as much as the fire of our youthful spirit.

Now we have put the last strokes to our painting in the sands of S. C. T. The legends taught to us as youths we have seen with a clearer appreciation and have woven into our lives, so that we in turn hand them down to future warrior tribes. Skilled in all the crafts of hunters, in all youthful sports and pastimes, we have become warriors, worshipping our flame, now blended into the Great Fires—its color still richly glowing in the infinite reflection. Our song still lives—we are now aware of the various tones of its composition—a sweetly piercing obligato, a firm and vibrant melody, and a steady beat of the bass. Too soon, we fear, its music fades and as we go down the steps into blackness, deep with unseen visions, we leave a lovely echo of harmony blended in a single voice of farewell.


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















PEDAGOGUE

DUSKANIA

Myskania, organized in 1917, is an honorary body composed of seniors who have led in scholarship, literary effort, debate, dramatics, and in undergraduate affairs generally.

This organization leads in formulating student sentiment in matters relating to student activities. These activities include: induction of freshmen into college customs, organization of the freshman class, guardianship of college traditions, preservation of student morale, direction of Campus Day program, and Moving-Up Day.

The main victory in the Purple and Gold quintet's eight victories for the 1932-1933 season was that over a strong Hamilton aggregation, by the score of 34-23. Captain Gill De Laura gave his usual exhibition of clever defensive play. On offense De Laura played back guard, and was a main cog in the fast passwork which characterized State's early season form.

Roger "Sparkie" Bancroft, peppy forward veteran, playing in the forward berth for the third consecutive season, took honors in scoring with eighty-six points.

Ray Harris, who fought off Ben Boldt for the regular assignment at center, proved to be the player necessary in smoothing out the State passwork.

Cliff Rall, who with De Laura, teamed at guard to form the finest guard combination seen on the State court in years, was third in scoring with fifty-three points.

Bud Kissam, Bill Allard and Ossy Brooks were leading figures in the final victory of the season over Montclair. Allard and Brooks outdid the first string men and won the game with brilliant baskets in the final minute of play. Other players who saw action were Ben Boldt, Tom Garrett, George Bancroft, Ed. De Temple, Jerry Butler, and Paul Bulger.

This year's freshman class has shown much more tennis ability than any one in several years. Decker and Hardmeyer plus several others show considerable promise. Since the entire team graduates this year, it is probable that considerable reliance will be placed upon these men and other underclass players.

Last year, State started the ball rolling by taking over St. Stephen's in the initial contest with the loss of only one singles match. Rain resulted in the second game with the Ithaca College of Physical Education being called off. Journeying to Vermont, the Purple and Gold suffered two defeats at the hands of the University of Vermont and St. Michael's College. The last trip was made to Ithaca where the Physical Ed. College was taken over to the tune of 4 to 2.

Oh yeee, oh yaah—Oh hear, my people, Hear the Tom-Toms beating—beating— Hear the singing of the Great Fires.


