M. Livingston reported on the developments with the Local Organizing Committee, the Legislature, and a recent Times Union article, copies of which were distributed. The envelope stuffer developed by the LOC for use in mailings by corporate sponsors was also distributed. The volunteer reception following the opening ceremony was discussed. TV spots and coverage are starting to be seen. A request to vend souvenirs was referred to UAS.

D. Stevens gave a detailed update on the parking plan and the decision to not charge for any parking on campus during the games. The topics covered related to the list of concerns from Lisa Delsignore (copy attached) and other campus concerns. The items were: shuttle bus from state campus lots; disabled and handicapped parking; ESG staff parking; ambulance and medical parking/station; VIP parking and shuttle to the games and back; special permits for ESG live-in regional staff (10 authorized per region); shuttle busses from the campus quad lots will not be provided; charter bus arrival and drop-off of athletes on the quads; movement of the athletes who will reside on other campuses; the shuttle system to other venues and our role in it; campus pick-up point for shuttle to the off-campus venues.

Other business included an update on the cellular phone system, assignment of J. Doellefeld to work with the volunteer program, a strong urging for all who need volunteer workers to identify how many, when, what skills, type of training and schedule for training and the like and communicate those needs to S. Hutson. For campus employees who wish to volunteer the question of supervisors approval and release time were raised. This topic will be discussed with S. Beditz with a request then going forward for approval.

Residential Life will be hiring about 50 employees for the week to assist in their activities. Food Services will also be hiring. If you know anyone who is available, please have them contact these departments.

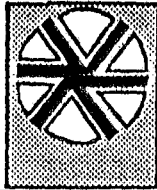
Things are looking up for Games

ALBANY — The chairman of the state Assembly committee studying Gov. Mario M. Cuomo's proposed legislation to save the 14th annual Empire State Games said Tuesday he expects the bill eventually will be passed.

Joseph T. Pillittere (D, Niagara Falls) said the Assembly's Tourism, Arts and Sports Development Committee will address the bill at its 10 a.m. meeting today.

Pillittere said he expects the bill will then go to the Assembly's Ways and Means Committee Thursday or Monday, then on to the Rules Committee and finally to the floor of the Legislature for a vote.

"I anticipate the bill should hit the floor sometime early next week," said Pillittere.

Asked if the input and general feedback he's received from other legislators leads him to believe Cuomo's bill will be passed by the Legislature, Pillittere answered, "Yes. ... It's getting support from both sides of the aisle."

Meanwhile, the state Senate's Tourism, Recreation and Sports Development Committee, chaired by John B. Sheffer II (R, Amherst), also must act on the legislation. A Sheffer spokesperson said the committee will meet Monday and at that time address Cuomo's bill.

The bill, which would also allow 20 state parks which might otherwise have closed to remain open, in effect would restore \$400,000 cut by the Legislature June 3.

While the impending meetings of the committees in the two legislative houses can be viewed as good news for Empire State Games supporters, it also means they will wait still longer for definite word that the Games will go on as scheduled July 24-28 in the Capital District.

ESG officials, supporters and athletes, some of whom already have qualified for berths on sports teams in the six regions of the state, have gone ahead with their plans even though the status of the event has been in doubt

because of the state's fiscal problems.

Fred Smith, Games public relations director, is getting very weary of waiting.

Ongoing tryouts continue in both Scholastic women's basketball and Scholastic women's soccer.

I. University Parking Plan:

Due to the absence of Dennis Stevens, an official University parking plan was not presented at this meeting. Karl Scharl was able to share with the committee some of the details that have been worked out for parking on Wednesday, July 24th:

-The University will make available the four larger exterior parking lots (approximately 3,000 spaces).

-A parking fee of \$2-\$3 was discussed. This fee was to be collected once the car is parked. John Hartigan, after consultation with Dennis Stevens, decided to drop the idea of the fee because of logistical reasons.

-Special parking spaces (VIPs, medical staff, etc.) will be available in the interior lots. A shuttle bus will bring them to the opening ceremony.

-All University classes will be canceled after 4:00 p.m. on Wednesday.

Lisa DelSignore added that we also have available to us the Washington Avenue parking lot and the State Offices lots next door once the on-campus lots are full. Shuttle buses will bring people to the campus. In addition, she suggested that the sooner the University can make parking information available (such as maps, VIP parking passes, etc.) to participants and staff the better. She will include this information in the packets her office will be sending out in early July.

II. Traffic Control : Wednesday, July 24th:

Jim Williams informed the committee that additional University officers, as well as officers from Albany City Police and the State Police, will be on duty Wednesday to control traffic. Stop signs at the entrance of the campus from I-90 will be covered to keep traffic flowing. If necessary, police officers will be used to direct traffic at the Washington Avenue light at the I-90 intersection. University police will be on-duty from 4:30 - 9:00 p.m., outside police units will not be needed until 5:00 p.m. The Albany City Police will inform the local media of the possibility of a traffic tie-up during these 2 hours, so local residents can

avoid the area. Lisa Delsignore will also talk to the State Thruway Authority about posting signs at the exit to direct people to campus, as well as broadcasting information on the new Thruway radio station.

III. Empire State Games Financial Transactions:

James Van Voorst passed out a memo to the committee regarding the income fund reimbursable process for University departments.

IV. Closing Announcements:

Dr. Livingston concluded the meeting with the following announcements and reminders:

~~-Regional and local fund-raising efforts have raised approximately \$295,000. In addition, "Keep the Torch Alive" decals will be sold for \$5.00 a piece to local businesses to display in their store windows.~~

-We need to decide where on campus we should set up a command center for the games.

-We will finalize the University parking plan at our next meeting on Wednesday, June 19th.

After reviewing the campus needs regarding the Empire State Games and what the campus will be asked to provide, I believe the Income Fund Reimbursable process would be the most desirable fiscal mechanism to use. I have discussed with SUNY Central the use of the mechanism, and they are willing to give full waivers to administrative and maintenance and operations overhead for this particular project, as all related costs will be recouped via the contract now with another state agency. Following is a description of how transactions will take place:

1. Each functional area will be assigned an IFR sub-account. The functional areas include Security, Campus Center, Plant Department, Gymnasium, Food Service, Telephone, Health Unit, Parking, Public Relations, and Educational Communications Center. The accounts will be established and allocation equal to the amount budgeted in the main contract and known amendments will be placed in the respective accounts. The allocation level will be used as the "budget" for each of the areas.
2. Another set of accounts will be established to provide an account against which items not specifically provided for in the contract would be charged and revenue credited. As items occur which were not provided for in the contract, the person(s) should obtain a document from the individual in the Parks Office authorized to request additional services. A listing of such people will be published. This authorization should be submitted to the Accounting Office immediately and will be used to initiate billing. The document must be obtained in all cases. Reimbursement of the costs could be delayed or not received if the approval is not submitted.
3. The largest cost for each area will be Personnel. As persons are hired specifically for the Games, they will be placed against the specific IFR account associated with

their activity. Persons who are currently on the payroll and will be used for the Games will need to have a Personnel Transaction Form submitted to have their costs charged to the respective IFR account for that particular period. It is likely that some of these charges will be estimates.

4. Billing/Collection

- a. All activities related to items in the main contract will be billed in accordance with the contract. Dollars received will be distributed according to the following hierarchy: (1) to Food Service, (2) to Dormitory, and (3) to the operating units. This distribution is being done to ensure Food Service receives funds to allow it to purchase necessary food items as well as allowing it to accumulate interest where possible to defer their costs.
- b. All special items will be billed via the IFR invoice process. Bills should be coordinated as they would be under "normal" operations to ensure that the group being charged understands what the bill is for and services provided to the groups. A separate invoice should be issued by the unit coordinating the service for each function, and all funds will be received by the Bursar's Office as a regular IFR receipt. The revenues will be credited to the appropriate accounts based upon the split of revenue indicated on the invoice, and likewise the costs incurred by the various units will also be charged to the appropriate account.

6. Special handling of payrolls for use of the typewritten payroll will be established for the Empire State Games special needs. Persons who are already on the state payroll will be charged to the Empire Games for the days they are working on the Games and to other accounts for the remainder of the summer.

You will be emceeing a brief (10-15 minute) speaking program during the Empire State Games VIP Reception on Wednesday, July 24. The program is scheduled to begin at 5:40 p.m. Scheduled speakers are you, Governor Cuomo (if he is there), Parks and Recreation Commissioner Orin Lehman, Mayor Whalen (and, if he attends and you want him to speak, the Chancellor). Here is the proposed format; I will provide you with some text next week:

- 5:40 HPS welcomes everyone, says how happy the University at Albany is to serve as Host Campus. Recognizes Al Lawrence, for the hard work he did on behalf of the Games as Chair of the Local Organizing Committee. Recognizes the Chancellor, if he is there. If Governor is not there, HPS acknowledges his role in restoring funding for the Games.
- 5:43 If Governor is there, HPS introduces him for brief remarks. After Governor (or if Governor is not there), HPS introduce Parks and Recreation Commissioner Orin Lehman, under whose auspices the Empire State Games are conducted.
- 5:48 After Lehman speaks, if Chancellor is there and HPS wishes him to speak, HPS introduces him for brief remarks. After Chancellor (or after Lehman, if Chancellor does not speak), HPS introduces Mayor Whalen.
- 5:53 After Mayor Whalen, HPS again thanks everyone for attending and introduces Jack Prenderville, Deputy Parks and Recreation Commissioner, who will tell describe the arrangements that have been made for getting everyone to the opening ceremonies.

I am assuming you already know that you are slated to be a member of the Platform Party and Speaker at the opening ceremonies. The ceremonies begin at 7 p.m., you are scheduled to make brief welcoming remarks to the athletes, their family members and guests at 8:05 p.m.

SUNYA police set to handle Empire Games traffic flow

ALBANY — University police and other agencies are combining their efforts to keep traffic running smoothly during the four days of the Empire State Games.

Except for slower traffic flows expected around the State University of New York at Albany campus Wednesday for the opening ceremonies, authorities say driving should remain unaffected the rest of the week with events scattered across the Capital Region.

Parking plans have been made to accommodate extra people at the university and in the city throughout the games.

All regular Capital District Transportation Authority buses will be operating, but the authority has not planned any special service for the public during the games. Most of the events are on public transit routes.

About 20,000 people are expected at the 7 p.m. ceremony opening the games, including family and friends of the more than 7,000 amateur athletes participating in the 14th annual event.

Sgt. William P. Georges, Traffic

Safety Management coordinator for the Albany Police department, said Wednesday's traffic slowdowns are expected to last between 5 p.m. and 9 p.m.

The main entrance to the campus, located on Washington Avenue between the Interstate 90 exit and the Thruway House, will be closed, Georges said. Motorists will be able to use the entrance at the traffic light in front of the Thruway House, he said.

Albany police will help handle the flow of cars at the university's entrance at Washington Avenue and Exit 2 of Interstate 90, he said. Guilderland police will handle traffic on the Western Avenue end and University police will direct it through the university campus.

"We suggest people do not come at the last minute because they will miss the start of the opening ceremonies," said James Williams, director of public safety at the university.

Williams said people won't want to miss any of the opening — which features a lighting of torches, fife and drum bands music, flyovers by hot-air balloons and F-16s, and fireworks.

"They start promptly at 7 o'clock. They don't delay it like a play might," he said.

The university has 5,000 parking spaces and has made arrangements for additional cars to be parked at the State Office Campus down the street from the university, Williams said. Shuttle buses will run between the campus and the university.

Williams said the university has dealt with large crowds at its athletic fields before, but has added extra public safety recruits to boost the university security staff to about 50 for the games.

Most of the 28 sporting events will be held at the university.

Other isolated events throughout the Capital Region, such as the canoe competition at Grafton Lake Park in Rensselaer County or synchronized swimming at Albany High School, are not expected to cause any traffic problems, Georges said.

Some events, like boxing and gymnastics, are slated for the Knickerbocker Arena but will not affect downtown parking since nearby garages can handle 15,000 fans.

U.S. Senate confirms SUNYA prof for Endowment for the Humanities

ALBANY — The U.S. Senate confirmed Thursday the appointment of State University of New York at Albany political science professor Michael J. Malbin to the advisory council for the National Endowment for the Humanities.

The full-Senate action followed Wednesday's approval by the Senate Labor and Human Resources Committee of two of the three candidates nominated to the council by President Bush, according to a university announcement.

The 26-member advisory council

advises the NEH about grants, policies, programs and procedures. Members — drawn from scholars, professionals and people recognized for knowledge and support of the humanities — are nominated to six-year terms.

Malbin, a Delmar resident, is director of the Center for Legislative Studies at SUNY's Rockefeller Institute of Government.

A spokesman for the NEH said Malbin was commended by senators for his "excellent resume, significant publications and the numerous citations to his works over the years," according to the university release.

Malbin served on the staff of the

House Iran-Contra Committee in 1987. He also has been a speechwriter for Secretary of Defense Dick Cheney and associate director of the Republican Conference of the House of Representatives.

Earlier this year, Malbin testified before the Senate Committee on Rules and Administration hearing on campaign finance legislation.

Malbin said he has devoted his life to understanding the performance of government institutions — which is one aspect of the NEH.

"I look forward to being a small part of it," he said.

Organizers turn it over to the athletes

ALBANY — After months of preparing for the onslaught of 7,200 athletes who will participate in this year's Empire State Games, there comes a point when you just sit back and hope for the best.

Fred Gula, director of the Games' Adirondack Region, said he has adopted this theory in these final hours before the start of the Empire Games — an Olympic-like sports festival that will bring together the state's best amateur athletes for four days of competition.

"The games don't just happen

overnight, but that's the kind of state we're in right now," said Gula, whose region will play host to the Games.

"We're in the 11th hour and we're just hoping that we've planned for everything we will need."

Starting with Wednesday's 5:30 p.m. opening ceremony at the University at Albany campus and ongoing athletic competition in 28 events that run Thursday through Sunday, it will mark the first time in its 13-year history that the Games will be played in the Capital District. Ten times the Games have been held in Syracuse, once each in Buffalo and Ithaca.

The Games, Gula said, will bring a buzz to Albany.

"You'll see athletes in uniforms walking all over, people with credentials and tickets, official cars back

there will be a sense that something's happening — no question about that," he said.

Games spokesman Fred Smith said the switch of region will give local residents a bird's-eye view of an event that has since inspired

similar amateur athletic competitions in dozens of the other states.

"It's best to move the Games around," Smith said. "It really brings fresh faces to the Games — not just volunteers, but who you make the games available to."

So far so good with preparations in Albany and its surrounding environs, where various fields, pools, gyms and auditoriums will house events ranging from archery to water polo.

"Preparations seem to be going very well," Smith said. "I can't think of any major concerns. Albany is a wonderful host."

Mind boggling are the logistics of housing hundreds of athletes and busing them all over the Capital District — to places like Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute, the College of Saint Rose, Union College, Clifton Common, Saratoga Yacht Club, the Castleton Fish and Game Club and Knickerbocker Park in Troy.

Having enough volunteers was the one thing Games officials were most concerned about given that the New York state budget crisis had almost torpedoed this year's Games.

"There was some concern a few weeks ago that the budget crisis

would have left some people up in the air," Smith said. "But we have as many if not more volunteers this year."

That list of about 2,000 volunteers includes mostly Capital District residents, Smith said. It includes about 800 referees and officials; 79 sports field reporters who will relay scores back to the main office; 36 doctors and short-wave radio operators.

"We have dozens of ham operators because we have to communicate and this is one way to unclog phone lines," Smith said.

For Albany, the Games arrive about five years after Mayor Thomas M. Whalen began negotiating with the state Office of Parks and Recreation. The area was granted the Games when it proved there were enough venues and enough housing for athletes and spectators.

For hosting the Games, Albany and other parts of the Capital District should be bolstered with about \$8 million to \$10 million in revenues for area hotels, restaurants and other businesses.

Coincidentally, the Games arrive the same week as the city of Albany celebrates its newly awarded "All-American City" status.

"It's a nice thing to happen," Gula said. "The Games will bring a lot of people in and provide an opportunity to show the city off."

Gula said the Adirondack Region, with great help from Capital District businesses, has raised \$300,000 in donations, money that will supplement the \$1.15 million the state budgeted. Gula said this is about twice as much as other regions have raised in previous years.

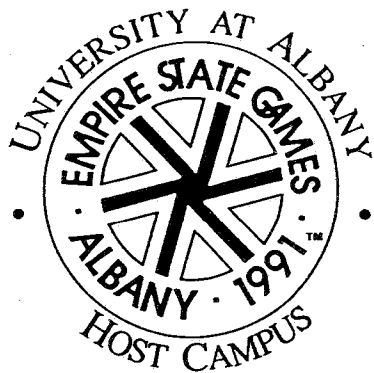
"You have to recognize the business community, firms like the Lawrence Group, Norstar Bank," Gula said. "They're behind it."

As for Capital District residents, Gula said they'll have their chance to get behind the games starting Wednesday evening, when the opening ceremonies take place at the University at Albany football field.

Entertainment begins at 5:30 and spectators are urged to bring blankets and lawn chairs since there's seating for only about 4,500. Hot-air balloons, a trampoline act, and a fly-by by F-16 fighters will precede the opening speech by Olympic medalist Jeff Blatnick and the parade of athletes and fireworks.

"It's an excellent opportunity to see an excellent program," Gula said.

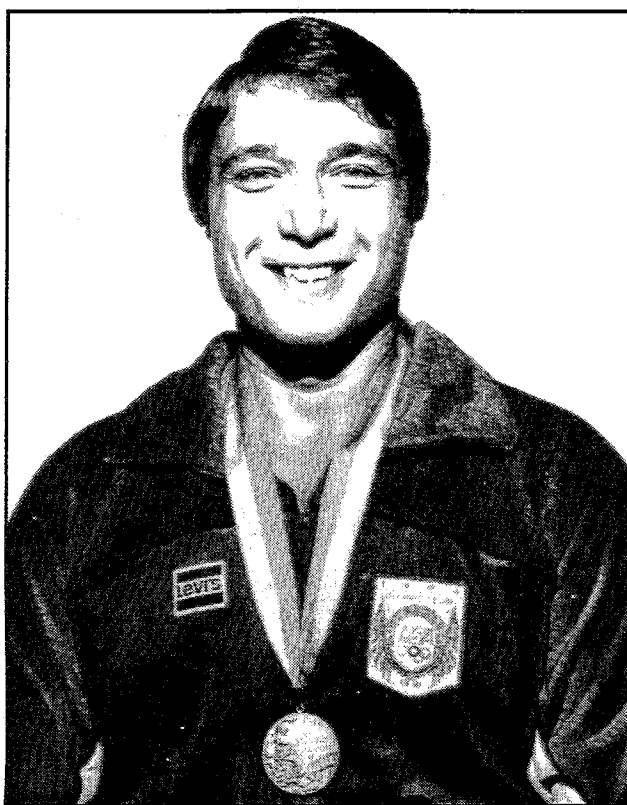
The festivities will be held at the University at Albany athletic field on Wednesday, July 24.

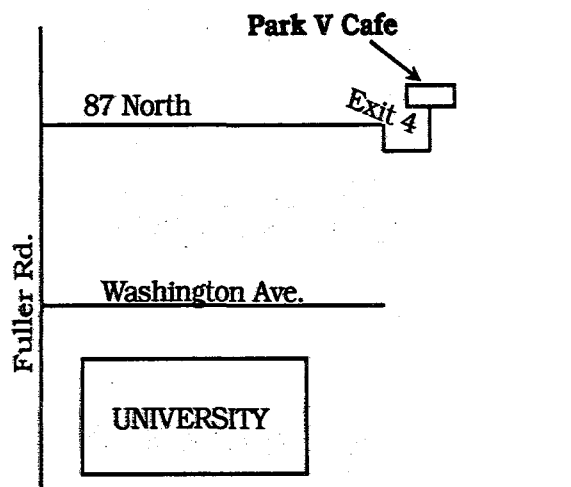

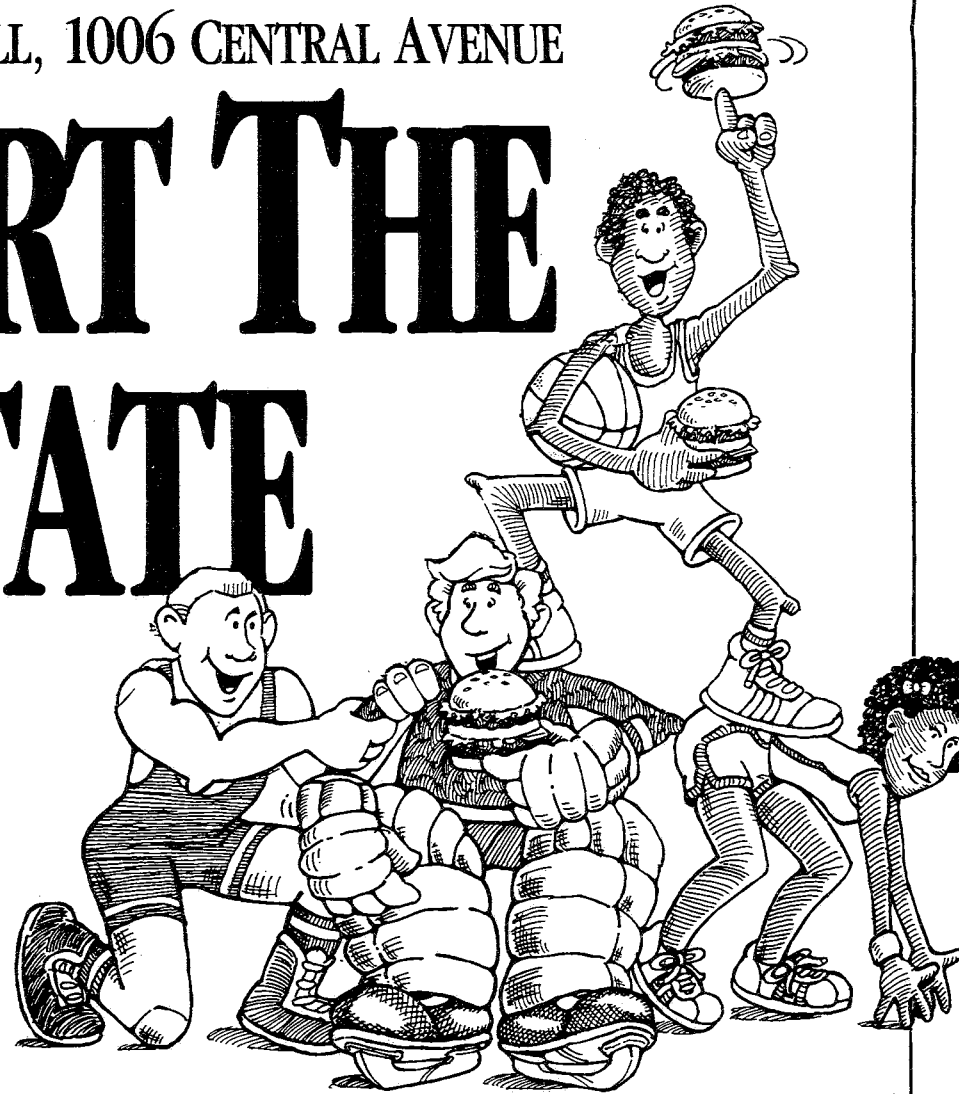

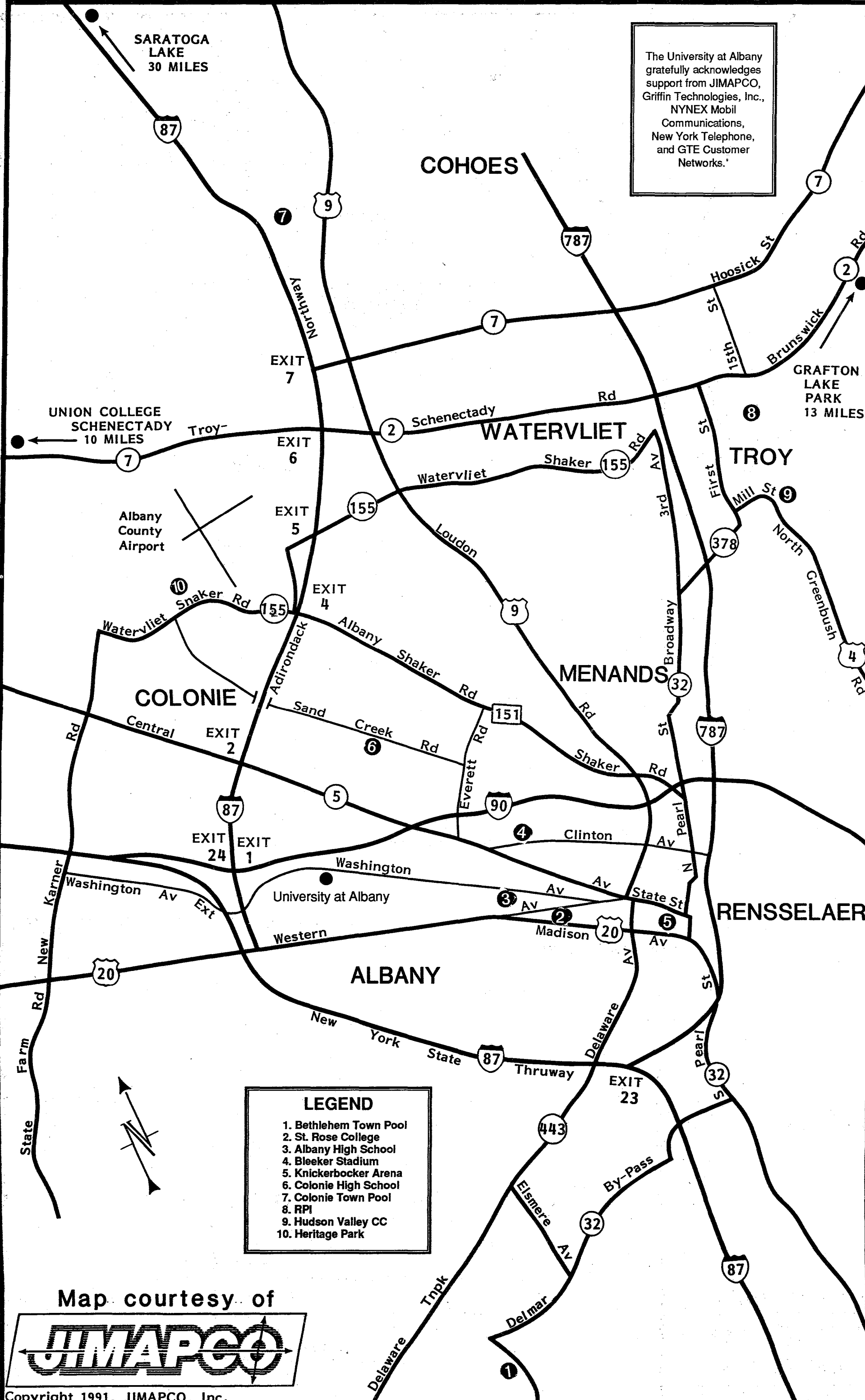
