University Sociologist Wins National Award For Book Examining the Future of Cities

ALBANY, N.Y. - John Logan, chair of the Department of Sociology at the University at Albany, State University of New York, has received a major award in sociology for a book about urban development and the political process.

The award, which is for the top scholarly publication in the field for the last three years, recognizes <u>Urban Fortunes: The Political Economy of Place</u> (University of California Press, 1987), which examines the conflicts between business and development forces and residents over the future of American cities.

Described as "a major contribution to urban sociology, political economy, social organization and social psychology," <u>Urban Fortunes</u> has been widely used by scholars and undergraduate and graduate students at colleges and universities throughout the country since it was published.

Logan co-authored <u>Urban Fortunes</u> with Harvey Molotch of the University of California at Santa Barbara. They received the prize from the American Sociological Association, representing 7,500 sociologists in the nation, at the group's annual meeting in Washington D.C., in August.

<u>Urban Fortunes</u> analyzes the interests developers and residents have in urban development and the policy processes through which choices are made, with an emphasis on the importance of neighborhoods and communities to people's daily lives. It also examines how social class and racial composition affect neighborhoods' abilities to protect their interests. It analyzes how urban policy affects land development and community life and predicts how the globalization of the United States economy will affect American cities.

Logan, a resident of Schenectady, is currently collaborating with another Albany sociologist, Glenna Spitze, on a project about intergenerational relations and public services for older persons which is supported by the National Institute on Aging. Another Logan project, in collaboration with Albany sociologist Richard Alba, is a study of the patterns of segregation of racial and ethnic minorities in the United States.

Logan came to the University in 1980 and holds a joint appointment with the Department of Public Administration and Policy within Albany's Rockefeller College of Public Affairs and Policy. He has been chair of the Department of Sociology for the last three years.


University Lecture Series Concludes With Adirondack Photographer's View of Canadian Rockies

Vernon Lamb, well known outdoor photographer and former member of the 1980 Winter Olympic Committee, will discuss "An Adirondack Nature Photographer Looks at the Canadian Rockies" in the fifth and final topic of this year's Natural History Lecture Series at the University at Albany.

The lecture will take place on Tuesday, Nov. 13 at 8:00 p.m. in Lecture Center 7 on the uptown campus of the University at 1400 Washington Ave. Lamb's slide presentation will highlight his three-week, self-guided tour of the Canadian Rockies, which included four national parks and one provincial park. His slides will display the scenic mountains, lakes, waterfalls and wild flowers, as well as the fascinating wildlife of this wilderness region.

The Natural History Lecture Series, originated 20 years ago by University at Albany meteorologist Ray Falconer, is sponsored by the University's Atmospheric Sciences Research Center and the New York State Department of Environmental Conservation, All lectures are free and open to the public.

Roderick Chu to Keynote University at Albany Conference on Information Technology on Monday, Nov. 26

ALBANY, N.Y. - Roderick G.W. Chu, worldwide managing partner of Andersen Consulting government practice, a State University of New York trustee and former New York State tax commissioner, will be the keynote speaker on Monday, Nov. 26, at a conference on information technology hosted by the University at Albany, State University of New York.

The conference, to celebrate the formation of the University's Center for Information Management (CIM), is expected to attract more than 150 state officials and information management specialists in private industry. It will run from 9 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. in the Recital Hall of the University's Performing Arts Center at 1400 Washington Ave.

Also participating in the conference, titled "Achieving Organizational Goals through Information Technology," will be University at Albany President H. Patrick Swygert and Richard Nathan, provost of Albany's Rockefeller College of Public Affairs and Policy and director of the SUNY-wide Rockefeller Institute of Government.

The press is welcome to attend. A conference program is attached.

Chu, of Andersen Consulting's New York office, has international responsibility for the firm's government practice. He advises major clients in business and government on the use of information to create a competitive advantage. Prior to this, Chu served as commissioner of taxation and finance and president of the New York State Tax Commission. At the time of his appointment by Gov. Mario Cuomo in February 1983, Chu, then 34 years old, was the youngest tax commissioner in the history of the state. Chu joined the 16-member SUNY Board of Trustees in July.

The newly formed Center for Information Management, which is part of the University's Institute for the Study of Information Science (ISIS), focuses on information solutions to management problems in both public and private sector organizations. CIM is involved in the development of executive information systems, decision support systems and research on how organizations can use information technology more effectively. Lakshmi Mohan, a professor in the School of Business, is the director of the center.

ISIS is a research institute that brings together faculty from the University's Schools of Business, Public Affairs, and Information Science and Policy and the Departments of Computer Science and Communication. ISIS also

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Dr. Thompson's election came at the annual meeting of the National Association of Schools of Public Affairs and Administration, held Oct. 25-28 in Salt Lake City, Utah. He had been chair of NASPAA's Task Force on Revitalizing the Public Service, which assessed the implication of the Volcker Commission Report on rebuilding the public service. He was also formerly chair of the association's Commission on Peer Review.

"Dr. Thompson's election further establishes the University at Albany as a major national program in higher education for public policy and administration," said Dr. Richard P. Nathan, Rockefeller College provost.

Thompson will serve for one year in the vice-presidency, and take over NASPAA's presidency at the annual meeting next October in Baltimore.

Thompson became dean of the Graduate School in 1988 and associate provost in December of 1989. He joined Albany's faculty in the Fall of 1987, after having been head of the political science department at the University of Georgia. He has researched and published extensively in health policy and public management in respect to human resources, and has just completed a major text in public administration.

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University at Albany Students Announce "Giving Day"
