UNIVERSITY AT ALBANY AWARDED \$4.3 MILLION FOR NATIONAL TEACHING CENTER FOR LITERATURE

The United States Department of Education awarded the University at Albany School of Education a \$4.3 million, five-year grant today (December 6) to promote the teaching of literature in the nation's elementary and secondary schools.

Albany was selected as the site for the nation's Center for Literature

Teaching and Learning after a coast-to-coast competition this summer and fall.

Professor Arthur Applebee will direct the Center. Professors Judith Langer and Alan Purves will be co-directors. The three scholars are members of the School's Department of Educational Theory and Practice.

"The teaching of literature is at the heart of the teaching of English language arts," Applebee said. "By strengthening the teaching of literature, we will be improving students' literacy and critical thinking skills."

The new grant represents the second major national funding competition won by the team of Applebee, Langer and Purves. They were awarded \$1.5 million in 1987 for an initial series of studies on the teaching of literature which provided the intellectual foundation for the current award. The three scholars were recruited to the University at Albany in 1987 with funds provided by SUNY's Graduate Research and Education Initiative, a special legislative program designed to promote research at its four university centers.

The Center for Literature Teaching and Learning will sponsor a wide variety of collaborative projects focused on developing effective, literature-based approaches to improving students' literary skills, reasoning abilities, and motivation for learning, grades K through 12, Applebee said. Projects will place

special emphasis on the use of literature with students who are historically at risk for school failure, and on developing advanced literacy and critical thinking skills in all students.

The grant will enable the School of Education at Albany to coordinate a National Literature Network to link the work of the Center with other efforts across the country as well as to enable the Center to sponsor publications and conferences about the teaching of literature.

The Center for Literature Teaching and Learning is an educational research and development center funded by the Office of Research of the Office of Educational Research and Improvement, U.S. Department of Education. It will be a collaborative project involving university faculty from a variety of disciplines as well as teachers from a number of local schools and districts. Center-sponsored projects and networks will also involve teachers, faculty members and professional organizations from around the country.

Applebee pointed out that "the teaching of literature is also at the center of current concerns about promoting a common cultural heritage on the one hand, and fostering multicultural awareness and sensitivity to diversity on the other hand." The projects which will be sponsored by the Center will be designed to help teachers and schools deal effectively with these issues.
