# UNIVERSITY AT ALBANY NAMES 1999-2000 ATHLETES OF THE YEAR Todd Cetnar and Megan Buchanan Are Selected

ALBANY, N.Y. – All-Conference basketball standouts **Todd Cetnar** and **Megan Buchanan** have been chosen as the University at Albany's 1999-2000 Male and Female Athlete of the Year, as Interim Director of Athletics Gail Cummings-Danson announced today. The athletes were selected in voting by the head coaches of Albany's 19-sport intercollegiate athletics program.

Cetnar, a senior from Amsterdam, N.Y., was a 2000 first-team All-Independent selection, and led the Great Danes to an 11-17 record in their inaugural NCAA Division I campaign. He was among the Division I Independent leaders in scoring (16.1 ppg), assists (4.2 pg), steals (2.1 pg) and free throw percentage (.820). He scored 20-plus points on eight occasions, including a career-high 30 in Albany's first Division I win against Elon.

Cetnar is one of two players in school history to combine for 1,000 points, 350 assists and 150 steals in a career. He finished ninth on the all-time scoring list with 1,345 points and reached double figures 68 times. The 6-foot guard is also second in steals (188), fifth in assists (367) and third in both three-point field goals (215) and free throw percentage (.816) on UA's all-time charts.

A native of Arkport, N.Y., Buchanan was voted to the Division I All-Independent first team, and ranked third among Independent scoring leaders at 15.0 points per game. Buchanan's 404 points are the fourth-highest single-season total in school annals, while her 33 points against Cornell in December tied the second-best single-game mark. She also averaged 4.3 rebounds, 1.4 assists and 1.4 steals, and scored in double figures in 22 contests. In addition, Buchanan posted the second-highest single-season total with 55 three-point field goals made, and set a single-game record with seven 3-pointers against Lehigh.

Buchanan, a 5-foot-11 senior forward, became the fifth player in the program's history to score 1,000 career points, and ended up third overall with 1,093. She is the school's career leader with 124 three-point field goals, and ranks 16<sup>th</sup> on the all-time rebounding list with 365. The Great Danes completed their schedule with a 12-15 record.

#### STEVE CHECKSFIELD NAMED TO ECAC DIVISION I ALL-STAR TEAM

Centerville, Mass. – University at Albany's **Steve Checksfield** has been named to the 2000 Eastern College Athletic Conference (ECAC) Division I Baseball All-Star Team. The 12-player unit was chosen in voting by ECAC head coaches.

Checksfield, a junior outfielder and first baseman, was selected as a first-team utility player. He posted a .329 batting average, and set the school's single-season record with 12 home runs.

Checksfield, a 6-foot-2, 235-pound athlete, led the Great Danes in RBI (46), runs (38), extra-base hits (23), doubles (10), total bases (100) and slugging percentage (.633). His RBI total was the second-highest single-season mark in UA history.

Checksfield, who was a first-team all-conference tight end in football last fall, is Albany's all-time leader in five categories, including home runs (30), total hits (165) and RBI (132).

Albany completed its first NCAA Division I campaign with a 19-24-1 record.

### LUIS SOTO PLACES THIRD IN LONG JUMP AT IC4A CHAMPIONSHIPS

Princeton, N.J. – University at Albany's **Luis Soto** finished third in the men's long jump at the 124<sup>th</sup> Intercollegiate Association of Amateur Athletes of America (IC4A) track and field championships at Princeton's William Weaver Stadium.

Soto, who was also third in this event at the IC4A indoor meet, went 23-feet, 9.50-inches. The senior from Rio Piedras, Puerto Rico placed behind James Madison's **Anthony Wallace** (24-03.50) and Georgetown's **Davin Williams** (24-03).

Albany's **Ronald Edmundson** was 10<sup>th</sup> in the triple jump with a leap of 48-02, as the Great Danes tied for 36<sup>th</sup> in the men's team standings. Pennsylvania's **Tuan Wren** (51-0) won the IC4A title.

Albany's 4x100 relay ended up in 21<sup>st</sup> place. The team of **Jonathan Garrick**, **John Morris**, **Tony Davidson** and Edmundson were timed in 42.85 seconds.

At the 17<sup>th</sup> ECAC Division I women's championships, the Great Danes were 17<sup>th</sup> in the 4x100 relay. **Seidah Abu-Bakir**, **Tammy Freeman**, **Dinnah Decatus** and **Tameka Hutcherson** posted a time of 49.44 at Weaver Stadium.

### SHAN'TEL ALI SIGNS WITH GREAT DANES FOR 2000-2001

Albany, N.Y. – University at Albany women's basketball coach Mari Warner announced today that **Shan'tel Ali** has signed a national letter of intent to play basketball in 2000-2001. Ali, who played at Otero Junior College this past season, is a 6-foot forward from Colorado Springs, Colo.

The Great Danes added five players during this year's recruiting process. **Kathryn Hemlock**, a 5'3" point guard from Great Falls, Va. (Langley H.S.), also inked her letter during the late signing period. **Nicole Johnson**, a 5'10" forward from Avenel, N.J. (Colonia H.S.), **Teryn O'Bannon**, a 5'11" forward from Maple Plain, Minn. (De La Salle H.S.), and **Sarah Sweetland**, a 5'8" guard from Burlington, Mass. (Burlington H.S.), all signed last November.

Ali averaged 13 points and eight rebounds per game at Wasson High School in Colorado Springs as a senior in 1997. She was a four-year starter at center, and a District XI all-academic selection. Ali went on to attend George C. Wallace Community College in Alabama, where her team advanced to the NJCAA regional semifinals. Last year, she transferred to Otero Junior College in LaJunta, Colorado. The Lady Rattlers posted a 27-5 record, and reached the Region IX tournament semifinals in Wyoming.

Albany went 12-15 overall in its first season as a NCAA Division I program in 1999-2000, and has six letterwinners returning from that squad next year.

Checksfield, who went 2-for-5 at the plate, doubled and scored in the eighth's uprising, and then drilled a 2-0 pitch over the left-field fence to leadoff the ninth. Checksfield's 12<sup>th</sup> home run set the school's single-season record.

Jim Lovett (Colonie Central H.S.) had two hits, including a solo homer in the seventh, and scored twice, while reliever David Schrepper picked up his second win of the season.

Sophomore Jose Segura had two hits and slugged his ninth home run, a two-run blast, for St. Rose (29-14-1). Third baseman Pat Storz drove in a pair of runs with a double in his team's four-run second.

## TONYA DODGE RUNS TOP AMERICAN TIME IN 3,000 STEEPLECHASE

Albany, N.Y. – Former University at Albany All-American Tonya Dodge (Granville Central H.S.) posted the fastest time by an American this season in winning the women's 3,000-meter steeplechase at the 6th annual Albany Spring Classic and Adirondack USAT&F Invitational on Friday evening at University Field.

Dodge, who was ranked 20<sup>th</sup> in the World last year, established a facility record of 10:20.21. Carrie Morales, of NIKE Portland, was second in 10:27.45, while Kristina Laubenstein (Bryn Mawr Track Club) was third in 10:30.50. Dodge's time was more than four-tenths of a second faster than Kara Ormond's previous-best American mark of 10:20.66 set in California in April.

"I was nervous at the start, especially in front of my home area fans," said Dodge, who is training for July's U.S. Olympic Trials, and was fourth at the 1999 USA outdoor championships. "With 1,000 meters to go, I knew I could take the race. It's a good time for now; I am ahead of where I was last year."

Albany was first in the men's team standings with 148.50 points, as Luis Soto (long jump) and Ronald Edmundson (triple jump) won individual titles. Tony Davidson's come-from-behind anchor leg provided the Great Danes with a first-place finish in the 4x400 relay.

In the women's competition, Onieka Randall and Tammy Freeman each ran on Albany's winning 4x100 and 4x400 relays. The Great Danes scored 179 points to take the team championship. -agate-

### TWO ALBANY PLAYERS ON GTE DISTRICT I ACADEMIC BASEBALL SQUAD

Kalamazoo, Mich. – University at Albany's **Eddie Scott** and **Mark Zacharczyk** have been named to the GTE University Division District I Academic All-America Baseball Team. Scott, a sophomore who plays center field and second base, has a 3.67 cumulative grade point average in psychology with a minor in economics. Zacharczyk, a senior pitcher, has a 3.46 GPA in marketing/management with a minor in economics.

Scott, who is in his first year as a regular, is batting a team-leading .398 in the leadoff spot with 30 runs, 20 RBI, 14 stolen bases and a .521 on-base percentage. Zacharczyk has a 3-4 record with a 5.52 earned run average in nine appearances this spring. He leads the staff in innings pitched with 58.2, and has three complete games.

The Great Danes, who along with Harvard, Yale and St. Bonaventure had two players on the all-academic unit, are competing at the Division I level for the first time in 2000.

## (Baseball)

Syracuse, N.Y. – First baseman **Scott Edwardsen** belted his 13<sup>th</sup> home run of the season and drove in three runs in the nightcap to lead Le Moyne to a doubleheader sweep over visiting Albany on Thursday at Dick Rockwell Field. The Dolphins won the first game, 2-1, and the second, 4-2.

Edwardsen snapped a 2-2 tie in the sixth inning with a two-run homer over the left-field fence to decide the second game. Reliever **Adam Shaver** sent Albany (18-24-1) down in order in its last at-bat to pick up his third save. The Great Danes tied the contest at two apiece in the second, as outfielder **Mike Steinberg** doubled and scored to key the frame.

In the opener, Le Moyne (29-14) rallied from a 1-0 deficit in the sixth. Casey Sauke lined a leadoff double, and later scored on Brett Woodcock's single. Third baseman Jack Kennedy singled to right field to plate the winning run with two outs. Albany broke a scoreless deadlock in the fifth, when Chris Robilotti (Colonie Central H.S.) doubled and came across on Eddie Scott's sacrifice fly.

### CHATMAN TRANSFERS TO MEN'S BASKETBALL PROGRAM

Albany, N.Y. – University at Albany men's basketball coach Scott Hicks announced today that **Lindbergh Chatman**, an all-state player in Ohio as a high school senior, has transferred into the program. Chatman, who played as a freshman at Robert Morris College this past winter, will be eligible for competition in the 2001-2002 season.

Chatman, a 6-foot-5, 200-pound small forward from Akron, Ohio (Hoban H.S.), appeared in 26 games at Robert Morris, and averaged 2.5 points and 0.9 rebounds. The Colonials posted an 18-12 record, and reached the Northeast Conference championship final.

As a scholastic player, Chatman was named to the Division II all-state third team, and was a first-team All-Northeast Inland Ohio choice. He averaged 15 points and seven rebounds per game as a senior, when he led Akron Hoban to a 21-1 record and the No.1-ranking in the state's Associated Press poll. Chatman also played in the 1999 Akron/Cuyahoga County All-Star Game, and was an all-city selection.

The Great Danes have added five players to the roster since last fall. **Micah Mack**, a 6'3" guard-forward from Denton, Texas, and **E.J. # UNIVERSITY AT ALBANY ATHLETES AWARDED ECAC MERIT MEDALS Matthew Haggarty and Laura Walls Are Selected

ALBANY, N.Y. – **Matthew Haggarty** and **Laura Walls** have been chosen to receive Eastern College Athletic Conference (ECAC) Merit Medals, as University at Albany Interim Director of Athletics Gail Cummings-Danson announced today. The awards are annually given to school's top senior male and female student-athletes who have shown excellence in the classroom and as competitive athletes during the current academic year.

Haggarty, who ranked sixth nationally among the NCAA Division I leaders in three-point field goals as a 6-foot-3 guard-forward on the men's basketball team, has a 3.37 cumulative grade point average in communication with a dual minor in Spanish and marketing.

A native of Wayland, Mass., Haggarty was named to the Division I All-Independent second team, and averaged 13.7 points, 3.1 rebounds and 2.8 assists. He established the school's single-season record with 94 three-point field goals made, and also set the career mark with 256. Haggarty finished his career ranked 16<sup>th</sup> on the all-time scoring list with 1,096 points, and eclipsed another UA standard with 110 games played.

A two-time captain and three-year starter, Haggarty is a Presidential Scholar, and has served internships with Arnold Communications and WAMC Radio. He was selected to the GTE/CoSIDA District I Academic All-America Basketball squad.

Walls, a four-year regular on the women's lacrosse team, has a 3.57 grade point average in history with a minor in political science, and will attend Hofstra University Law School in the fall.

She scored 16 goals and six assists and had four multiple-goal games this spring. As a senior attack, she led the Great Danes to an 8-6 record in their inaugural Division I campaign. Walls, who hails from Yorktown Heights, N.Y., scored 69 points (52 goals, 17 assists) as a collegian, and her goal total ranks fifth on the school's all-time chart.

Walls, whose lacrosse teams combined for 34 victories during her career, will graduate from the University with honors later this month, and is a seven-time dean's list student. She has served a two-semester internship with the New York State Supreme Court, and is a member of Golden Key National Honor Society.

#### ALBANY'S 2000 FOOTBALL RECRUITING CLASS ANNOUNCED

Albany, N.Y. – Head football coach Bob Ford announced today that 38 student-athletes have signed enrollment cards to attend the University at Albany and play football next fall.

"This is a solid group of football players, who will increase our team speed significantly," said Ford, who led Albany to a 7-2 record in its first NCAA Division I-AA campaign in 1999. "We met many of our needs. The class includes a great group of inside linebackers, a decent group of offensive linemen, and six good defensive backs."

The 2000 class features 34 high school standouts, three prep school players, and one junior college transfer from seven different states. The group is comprised of 31 recruits from the state of New York, two from Florida, and one each from New Mexico, New Jersey, Massachusetts, Ohio and Rhode Island. The breakdown by position is six running backs, three quarterbacks, three tight ends, three receivers, six offensive linemen, eight linebackers, six defensive backs and three defensive linemen.

Dane Winget, a 6-foot-1, 210-pound linebacker, leads the list of defensive players. Winget, the first Albany recruit from New Mexico, was named USA Today honorable mention All-American, and had 65 tackles with eight sacks as a senior. Linebacker Kevin Gribbin (6-2, 235) was an All-Suffolk County selection, while Scotia-Glenville High's Fred Frese (6-0, 162) was third-team All-New York State as a defensive back.

Running back Tom Cuozzo (6-1, 185) was named by Fox Sports as a top-50 player in New York State last fall. He rushed for 2,099 career yards, and was a two-time Staten Island Advance all-star. Matt Crudo (LaSalle Institute) and Mike Hampel (Cobleskill-Richmondville) were consensus All-Capital Region running backs. Wide receiver Tom Burkhart (Averill Park) and tight end Michael Laroche (Queensbury) will also play for the Great Danes next year.
