Nursing, Music Add New Staff

Two new faculty appointments are of particular interest to the university community. Judith Whitaker, formerly executive director of the American Nurses Association, is associate professor of continuing education in the School of Nursing. Yehuda Hanani, described as "a brilliant cellist and pedagogue," has joined the faculty of the Department of Music as a lecturer in music.

Dean Dorothy Major stated that the appointment of Mrs. Whitaker would enable the school to initiate a comprehensive program of continuing education for employed nurses in eastern New York. It is anticipated that such a program will get underway by mid-1973.

Mrs. Whitaker, associated with the ANA for many years, more recently has served as associate professor of continuing education at the University of Vermont where she established a state-wide program for registered nurses seeking short-term training experiences through seminars, workshops, and conferences.

Mr. Hanani studied cello with Pablo Casals, Leonard Rose, and Bernard Greenhouse, and has attended classes at the Academy of Music in Tel Aviv, Juilliard School of Music, and Harvard University.

The musician, a recipient of many competition awards, has appeared in recitals and as soloist with symphony orchestras in the United States, Canada, and Israel, and in European countries.

His first appearance in the Albany area will be as soloist with the University Community Symphony Orchestra on Tuesday, Oct. 31.

Cowling Named Associate Dean

Vincent F. Cowling, professor of mathematics and department chairman, will serve as associate dean of the Division of Science and Mathematics in the College of Arts and Sciences until the beginning of the 1973 fall semester. The appointment, recommended by Dean Moyer Hunsberger and approved by President Benezet, was endorsed by Vice President for Academic Affairs Phillip Sirotkin.

Professor Cowling already has begun his new duties. Soon a search committee will be named to find a permanent associate dean.

In 1966 Professor Cowling joined the faculty here. He came to SUNYA from the Institute for Advanced Study at Princeton, N.J., where he was visiting professor of mathematics for a year. Earlier he had taught at Rutgers University, the University of Kentucky, Lehigh University, and Ohio State University.

Dean Cowling has been the recipient of several awards. He holds a Bachelor of Arts, a Master of Arts, and a Doctor of Philosophy from Rice University.

Council Delays Action On Parking Regulations

The University Council delayed acting on the proposed parking regulations at its meeting Friday, Sept. 8. The regulations, which were to take effect today, will not be enforced until formally approved later this fall. The delay is caused by changes in SUNY Board of Trustee regulations giving responsibility to the council.

The council is asking all interested individuals and organizations to present, in writing, their reactions, suggestions, and recommendations relating to parking to Vice President John W. Hartley, AD 326, by 5 p.m. Friday. All responses will be reviewed carefully by the members of the council at a special meeting on Friday, Sept. 29.

In delaying action on the regulations the council expressed approval of, and admiration for, the thorough manner in which the Security Office had prepared the present proposal in response to the provisions of the new authorizing legislation approved earlier this year. Confusion arose when SUNY's Board of Trustees acted in late August to permit local councils to approve local parking regulations which followed trustee guidelines.

Student Association President Michael Lampert attended the meeting and presented a plea for wider consideration of the parking regulations. A specially appointed committee will review all responses and prepare a summary for the council's consideration at the special meeting. Members of the committee are Vice President for Management and Planning John W. Hartley, Vice President of University Affairs Lewis P. Welch, Director of Security James R. Williams, and Mr. Lampert.

Present regulations will remain in full force and effect until new provisions have been approved.

The council also heard President Benezet report briefly on the SUNY Master Plan, reviewed the summary of the proposed 1973-74 SUNYA Budget, and received reports on research activities, student affairs, Community-University Day, and the Alumni Fund drive.

Members of the council also discussed plans for the second annual fall meeting of the Association of Council Members and Boards of Trustees of SUNY. The organization was formed last year to help council members perform their function better. Albany Council chairman J. Vanderbilt Straub is second vice president and council member Eleanor Posner is secretary. H. David Van Dyck, director of community relations, is executive secretary.

SA Opens Sale Of Tax Cards

Student Association is offering tax benefit cards to faculty and staff members at a reduced rate from that charged students under mandatory tax. The card admits the bearer to all SA sponsored concerts, plays, films, speeches, and other events at significantly reduced prices.

An undergraduate student is required to buy a tax card at \$60 per year. The same card is available to faculty-staff for \$25. The only restrictions on use of the non-student card are prohibitions on voting and holding elective office in student government.

SA is charging less for faculty-staff cards because "the program is tailored for the students, who are its greatest users" and because non-students supposedly "won't make use of all (the) privileges" awarded the bearer.

Six Presentations Scheduled For University Lecture Series

"The Search for Humanity," the university series of lectures and presentations by prominent faculty members, will be continued on campus this year. Initiated last spring in an effort to share with the larger community some of the special talents at SUNYA, the series, which met an enthusiastic response, has been expanded.

Arthur Lennig, associate professor of art, will be the initial lecturer on Wednesday, Oct. 4, at 8 p.m. in the PAC Recital Hall. His subject will be "The Eloquence of Silence in Film Art." Professor Lennig will look at the development of the cinema, with emphasis upon the silent film and mores of early 20th Century America. Film clips will be shown.

Other programs scheduled in the series include "Can Intervention Be Ethical?," A.C. Higgins, associate professor of sociology, Wednesday, Oct. 25; "Control of Limb Development and Deformity," John W. Saunders, Jr., professor of bio-

Also, "American Politics and International Trade," Walter Goldstein, professor of political science, Tuesday, Mar. 27; and the Robert A. Pinkerton Lecture, Marguerite Q. Warren, visiting professor, School of Criminal Justice, Friday, Apr. 27.

Professor Higgins, a medical sociologist, in the second lecture of the series, will examine the moral dilemma of the humanitarian. The particular question to be raised is "To whom does the clergyman, physician, teacher or social worker owe his allegiance? To the profession? To the employer? To self? Or to the client?."

In the concluding lecture of the fall Professor Saunders will provide a scientist's glimpse of an enigma of life-puzzling "conversations" between layers of cells that control the pattern of development of human limbs soon after conception.



Security Office Reports Three Arrests on Campus

Three youths - Gary Graffunder, last week Peter Benczes, and Paul Wehren - were fall term. The arrested Sept. 4 when they were apprehended allegedly in the act of stealing electrical equipment from a construction nearly all site in Mohawk Tower. The men were arraigned in Albany Police Court and released on bail.

A continuing problem is thievery of bicycles on campus. There were three bikes reported stolen during the first week in September, following 11 such thefts in August. SUNYA police are taking steps in an effort to reduce the number of bicycles stolen and to increase the risk factor of the thief. Free registration of bicycles owned by students, faculty, and staff is among the new services.

Bicycle thefts were prominent in the August report of activities by the SUNYA police, accounting for 11 of the 29 reports of petty larceny. Among other reported crimes were four grand larcenies; three each criminal mischiefs and false incidents, two each assaults, burglaries, and leaving the scene of an accident; and one disorderly conduct.

The first eight months of 1972 revealed a decrease in reported crimes in nearly all categories from the same period in 1971. Particularly striking were the decreases in burglary (106 last year and 32 this year), petty larceny (261 and 197), and criminal mischief (129 and 52).

SUNY Awards Programs Open

The 1972-73 SUNY University Awards Committee/Joint Awards Council has announced three programs, a continuation of the Faculty Research Fellowship and Grant-in-Aid awards, which will provide support for projects in amounts ranging from \$100 to \$3,200. Faculty members may apply for only one of the three programs. Guidelines for the award programs and application forms are available from the Office for Research, AD 216, 7-4393.

Completed applications must be submitted to the Office for Research for campus official signature, local administrative approval, and transmittal to The Research Foundation.

The foundation has announged an absolute deadline date of Oct. 15 for receipt of all applications by the committee. Completed applications should reach the Office of Research by Oct. 6.
