BUYING ONLY Union Made Goods

At the time of this writing, the Saveway Supermarkets are reneging on an agreement reached with District Union, #1, of the Amalgamated Meatcutters, Butcherworkmen, and Affiliated Crafts, according to a union spokesman interviewed on Wednesday, December 2, 1959.

Last Saturday and Sunday, according to a union spokesman, the union negotiated an agreement with an attorney and a stockholder representing the Saveway Supermarkets. According to the settlement, the Company would recognize the union as the bargaining agent for its members. The union agreed to call its pickets quiring as to which hotels and back to work on Wednesday, Dec? 2 of this week . . . The union also agreed when the settlement was reached that they would withdraw their "unfair labor charges" with the NLRB against the company.

Now it seems that a maze of red tape has appeared on the scene and that the employees will not be called back to work and The Vendome Restaurant, 414 that the agreement signed Sunday evening will not be kept in

The union has decided to continue to press the "unfair labor B. & G. Restaurant, 146 Broad- practice" charge against the Saveway Supermarkets since the Ferro's Restaurant, 1115 Barrett company refuses to fulfill its obligations under the settlement.

If the matter is not settled sat-ALCO Cafeteria, Maxon Rd., and isfactorily the pickets can be expected to return to the lines later

#### AREA AFL-CIO: LOCAL 301 TO TESTIFY AT MC CARTHY HEARINGS - DEC. 18TH

#### CENTRAL LABOR COUNCIL, AFL-CIO VOTES TO SUPPORT SAVEWAY PICKETS

Over 100 delegates from 33 Internationals and 44 Locals voted unanimously to support the pickets at the Saveway Supermarkets.

#### Volunteers Needed

A call for volunteers has been sent out by members of District Union #1; Amalgamated Meatcutters, Butcherworkmen, and Affiliated Crafts to help on the picket lines. Aid is needed to man the lines and give relief to the pickets who at present are walking 8 to 10 hours in all kinds of weather.

District Union Local #1, of the Amalgamated Meatcutters Union, representing 72 employees at the 4 Original Supermarkets in the area, had a contract which called the company was sold and operated under a | affecting this distressed area. new management. The new company was obligated under the terms of the contract, to recognize the union as the bargaining agent and to accept and continue the contract provisions now in force.

According to a union spokesman, Saveway completely ignored the union and refused to recognize it. 60 of the 72 employees with service up to 17 years were dismissed without cause. The new management then went about hiring new and cheaper help to replace the 60 employees.

The union members immediately called a special meeting and voted to picket the supermarkets in protest. A picket line was set up at all locations in the area to protest the lock-out tactics of the Saveway Supermarkets,

The Special Senate Committee will conduct an "on-the-spot" investigation to study the unemployment problems in the Schenectady Area. Senator Winston Prouty, (R) Vermont, will act as chairman of the Senate group.

Leo Jandreau, newly elected President of the Central Labor Council, AFL-CIO, Schenectady Area, will appear before the committee on behalf of the newly formed AFL-CIO Locals in the Schenectady Area. John Shambo, President of Local 301, IUE, will represent our local union and urge constructive legislation to correct the unemployment problems in our community.

Other representatives of labor in the community and civic and industrial repfor continuing their services in the event resentatives will also appear with testimony

> Lew Harris, President of GUTS, Inc., and Rep. Samuel S. Stratton are also expected to give their viewpoints on the situation in the Schenectady and surrounding areas.

In a recent statement to the press, Senator Keating, (R) N.Y., said, "I have long been aware of the problem of unemployment in the Schenectady Area and I am aware that this still is one of the major labor surplus areas." He also intimated that he would be present here on the 18th of December.
