The constitution to be presented to the student association today for adoption represents long work by the committee
on adjustments. But the student association should not adopt the constitution without weighing each article separately. With all the work of the committec, the constitution still needs polishing it it is to be adoptet
form it should thot be swallowed blindly.
Questions which the committee should be prepared answer include
council enforce the poimt syste that it be done?
Should an executive council be empowered to charter all organizations, without the approval of Myskania? That power has resided with Myskania sinice it was foumded. It has worked well in its present capacity,
How much emergency power shall the executive council How much emergency power shat the exceutive counci proposed constitution, in spite of the verbal assurances of committee members. Why should this emergency power ee provided for, wh
How much influe
How much influence would an advisory opinion carry if Myskania is to be a court, why not give it the power
o make decisions that have some power belhind them: Why expose Myskania to the expedient of making itseli unpopular: How often would Myskania be expected to ender an advisory opinion.

Death has thwarted the life ambition of 'Mollie Erlic̣, '29, to obtain a college education and become a school teacher, when the prize was almost within her grasp. She was to have been graduated with high honors at the June commencement.
Stricken with appendicitis two week ago, Miss Erlich was taken to Albany hospital, where she was operated on by Dr. J. Lewi Donhauser. For a time eemed as though the surgeon's skill had been successful in warding off the dan ger of fatal complication, but general peritonitis developed and she died Sunday might.
