JANIS PIPIKIS WILL MISS THE REMAINDER OF THE 2003-04 SEASON

Albany, N.Y. – University at Albany basketball center Janis Pipikis will miss the remainder of the season with a knee injury. MRI results showed today that Pipikis has torn both his anterior cruciate ligament and a medial collateral ligament in the right knee. He will have surgery within the next two weeks to correct the damage.

Pipikis, a 6-foot-8 senior from Ventspils, Latvia, suffered the injury in a morning practice on Dec. 27. He was averaging 5.6 points and 3.1 rebounds through the opening seven games. However, Pipikis had stepped up his performance during a recent four-game stretch, when he contributed nearly 10 points and five rebounds per contest. He scored a career-high 18 points against Sacred Heart on Dec. 20, and had 11 points in his team's 68-62 victory over Army earlier this month.

"I feel badly for Janis," said Albany coach Will Brown, whose top player Jamar Wilson had season-ending surgery on Monday to repair a fractured patella. "He was making great progress and had bought in to what we were trying to accomplish as a team. It's unfortunate because he was becoming a solid player at the America East level."

Albany (2-7) will begin America East Conference play this weekend. The Great Danes host UMBC on Friday, Jan. 2 at 7:00 p.m. and Boston University, a 61-60 winner over Michigan in its last outing, on Sunday, Jan. 4 at 1:00 p.m.

MEN - Wagner 69, Albany 59

Albany, N.Y. – **Courtney Pritchard** scored 15 of his 18 points in the second half, as Wagner rallied for its third straight win with a 69-59 non-league victory over Albany on Tuesday evening at the Recreation and Convocation Center.

Wagner (3-6) trailed by as much as 21 points in the opening period, and still was behind 45-35 with 15:10 remaining. The Seahawks then reeled off 15 of the game's next 19 points to go ahead. Pritchard, a 6-foot senior, canned a pair of three-point field goals in the run, before his steal and layup gave his team a 50-49 advantage.

Albany (2-7) went back in front, 51-50, on a 17-foot baseline jumper by **Aquawasi St. Hillaire**, who finished with 13 points and seven rebounds. However, the Seahawks, who shot 57.1 percent from the field after halftime on 16-of-28 attempts, ran off nine unanswered points to take the lead for good. **DeEarnest McLemore** broke a 51-all tie with a three-pointer from left of the circle. Freshman forward **Durell Vinson**, who had eight points and six rebounds off bench, made a free throw to complete the decisive run with 4:41 to play.

The Great Danes stunned the visitors in the first half by making 13-of-24 field goals to begin the contest in jumping out to a 30-12 lead. Sophomore **Levi Levine**, who had 13 of his team-high 15 points in the opening period, and freshman guard **Jon lati** (12 points, five assists) keyed the outburst. **Todd Martin's** three-pointer gave his team its biggest lead with 6:53 left in the period, before his club settled for a 36-24 halftime margin.

"That's the first time a team has played a triangle-and-two defense against us this year," said Albany coach **Will Brown**, whose team was held to 29-percent shooting in the final period. "They forced our other players to make plays. We played well and with energy at the start, but when we began to miss shots we hung our heads and were slow getting back in transition."

Wagner's **Nigel Wyatte**, a 6-foot-9 senior, had 11 points and seven rebounds, while **Sean Munson** was the third player in double figures with 10.

"They took Levi (Levine) and myself out of the game with their defense," offered lati, who played all 40 minutes. "I had good looks in the second half, but I just didn't shoot well. Our defense just collapsed."

Miami, Fla. -- Tournament MVP **Shandrika Lee** scored a season-high 28 points on 11-of-23 shooting from the floor and knocked down five 3-pointers to lead Pepperdine to a 70-49 victory over Albany in the Sun and Fun/Herald Classic championship game on Monday, December 29 at the Golden Panther Arena.

Pepperdine (5-6), who was an NCAA Tournament participant last season, trailed 28-22 at halftime but opened the second half with a 6-0 run to pull within, 30-28, on Lee's conventional three-point play. Miami, Fla. – Junior **Danielle Hutcheson** recorded her second consecutive double-double with 17 points and 11 rebounds in leading Albany to a come-from-behind victory, 61-57, over host Florida International on Sunday afternoon during day one action of the Fun & Sun/Herald Classic. The Great Danes will take on the winner of the Hofstra/Pepperdine match up tomorrow at 7 p.m.

FIU (4-7), which trailed by nine with under a minute left, pulled to within two, 59-57, with 18.6 seconds remaining in regulation on junior **Milena Tomova's** three pointer from the left wing. Albany junior **Alicia Learn**, who added 16 points and seven rebounds, and Hutcheson each split a pair of free throws to seal the Great Danes' first road victory since Dec. 21, 2002.

After the teams traded baskets, the Great Danes tallied six unanswered points on a left hook by Hutcheson and fastbreak lay ups by sophomores **Becky Ayers**, who had 10 points, and **Jen Schumacher** for a 49-40 lead with 8:38 to go.

UAlbany took an early 14-4 lead in the first half as the Great Danes went on an 8-0 run ignited by Ayers' free throws with 17:22 left before halftime.

FIU crawled back into the contest on a 13-4 run to tie the game at 19-apiece as sophomore **Allison Bustamante** who chipped in with 10 points, and junior **Faeza Bouderra** scored five points apiece during that spurt. After a **Sarah Sweetland** three pointer put Albany back ahead with 6:08 to go before intermission, the Panthers closed on a 12-4 run for a 31-26 lead at the break. **Milena Tomova**, who had career highs in points and rebounds with 33 and 17, respectively, tallied 10 points in that span including a baseline jumper with two seconds left in the opening period.

"I think the win was big for our program because of the caliber of FIU's basketball program," stated head coach Trina Patterson, whose team had a season-low nine turnovers. "We played together as a team and handled diversity in a very hostile environment. This win is going to help build confidence for our team heading into conference play."

GARY JONES ON ASSOCIATED PRESS ALL-AMERICA FOOTBALL TEAM

Albany, N.Y. – University at Albany's **Gary Jones** (Ravena-Coeymans-Selkirk) has been named to the 2003 Associated Press I-AA All-America Football Team, as announced today by the national wire service. Colgate and Delaware, who will meet for the national title on Friday, Dec. 19 in Chattanooga, Tenn, combined to place seven players on the AP All-America team.

Jones, a third-team running back, makes his second consecutive appearance on the Division I-AA All-America squad. He earned second-team recognition as a junior.

Jones, the Northeast Conference's Offensive Player of the Year for the second straight year, broke his own conference single-season rushing record with 1,524 yards, and scored a league-leading 19 touchdowns. He ran for 100 or more yards against eight opponents, including a career-high 242 yards against Stony Brook on Oct. 25. Jones broke or tied 12 school records this season, including career rushing yards (3,033), touchdowns scored (42) and all-purpose yards (3,639).

The UAlbany tailback is sixth among the nation's rushing leaders at 138.6 yards per game. He is fifth in Division I-AA in scoring (10.4 points per game) and 16th in all-purpose yards (153.6 ypg). Jones, a senior from Ravena, N.Y., was chosen to The Sports Network I-AA Mid-Major All-America Team earlier this month. He led the Great Danes to a 7-4 record and a share of the program's second consecutive NEC championship.

ALICIA LEARN EARNS AMERICA EAST CO-PLAYER OF THE WEEK HONORS

Boston, Mass. – University at Albany's **Alicia Learn** has been named America East Conference Co-Player of the Week in women's basketball as announced by the conference office on Monday, Dec. 15.

Learn, a junior forward from Watkins Glen, N.Y., recorded her first career double-double with 18 points and a career-high 10 rebounds in the Great Danes' 86-63 non-conference victory over Charleston Southern on Dec. 13. UAlbany snapped a three-game losing skid and improved to 2-4 overall for the season. The 6-foot-1 Learn also dished out a career-high six assists and tied the school's single-game record for blocks with seven, previously set by Ikeuchi Franklin against Rensselaer on Nov. 21, 1992.

Learn currently ranks first among the America East leaders in blocks (3.67 pg), third in rebounding (7.3 pg), fourth in field goal percentage (.507) and eighth in scoring (13.8 ppg). She is also among the NCAA Division I leaders in blocked shots.

WOMEN – Albany 86, Charleston Southern 63

Albany, N.Y. – **Alicia Learn** recorded her first career double-double with 18 points and 10 rebounds, as Albany snapped a three-game losing streak with an 86-63 non-conference victory over Charleston Southern on Saturday afternoon at the Recreation and Convocation Center.

Albany (2-4) held a 26-18 lead in the opening period, but then seized control with 13 unanswered points. Sophomore guard **Becky Ayers**, who had a season-high 21 points on 7-of-10 shooting, sank three foul shots and converted an offensive rebound during that stretch. **Maree Jones**, who totaled 12 points and nine rebounds, made a jumper in the lane to cap the decisive run.

The Great Danes, who shot 55.6 percent from the field, leaped to a 15-2 lead over the opening six minutes and 23 seconds in leading wire-to-wire. Sophomore **Jen Schumacher**, one of five players in double figures with 12 points, canned a pair of three-point field goals in that outburst. Meanwhile, Albany used a zone defense that confused Charleston Southern (2-4), as the visitors made just 5-of-26 field goal attempts and committed 14 of their 24 turnovers in the first half.

"We worked on our deficiencies all week," Albany coach Trina Patterson said. "Our defensive play and rebounding were much better. The 3-2 zone was something they probably were not prepared for; they didn't shoot well against it."

The Great Danes, who hit 18-of-28 from the floor in the final period, were never threatened after halftime and led by as much as 27 points in the late going. **Danielle Hutcheson**, a 6-foot-4 junior, made her first appearance of the year after having surgery to remove a blockage near her left kidney during the preseason. Hutcheson contributed 12 points and three rebounds in 17 minutes off the bench.

"I think we just wanted the game," said Learn, a 6-foot-1 junior who tied the school's single-game record with seven blocked shots. "We worked on the zone and our block outs in practice and it paid off. It's a great asset to have (Danielle) Hutcheson back, she brings so much emotion to the game."

Natalie Caldwell led the Lady Buccaneers with 16 points, while Keena Wicker and Deborah Cherry added 13 apiece. Albany's Learn, who matched her career-high scoring total set against Fairleigh Dickinson earlier this year, added six assists and two steals in 36 minutes. The Great Danes' victory margin was their largest in three years.

UALBANY'S JAMAR WILSON SCHEDULED TO HAVE SURGERY ON DEC. 29

Albany, N.Y. – University at Albany men's basketball standout Jamar Wilson has decided to have surgery to repair a fracture at the lower end of his right patella or knee cap, as Director of Athletics Lee McElroy announced today. Dr. Max Alley, of Capital Region Orthopaedic Group and a member of the UAlbany sports medicine staff, will perform the surgical procedure on Monday, Dec. 29.

Wilson, who suffered the injury on Nov. 6 and was ruled out for the season last week, will have a surgery that removes the bone fragment at the tip of the patella. A rehabilitation period of six to eight weeks will follow.

"When I looked at all the options, I felt most comfortable with this procedure," said Wilson, who averaged 18.9 points per game as a freshman when he was the America East Conference Rookie of the Year. "After discussing with the doctors the surgery and the therapy that will follow, I am confident this will be the best for me."

Dr. Alley first confirmed Wilson's injury on Nov. 10. MRI results showed the right knee ligaments were normal and there was no meniscal or cartilage damage. Following non-operative treatment, subsequent X-rays showed no significant healing. Wilson then met with Dr. Russell Warren, the New York Giants Team Physician, on Dec. 4. Dr. Warren recommended surgery after the consultation.

ALBANY FALLS AT LONG ISLAND, 78-65, IN NON-CONFERENCE PLAY

Brooklyn, N.Y. – Freshman **Eugene Kotorobai** scored a career-high 20 points, and connected on five three-point field goals, as Long Island ended a three-game losing streak with a 78-65 non-league victory over Albany on Wednesday evening at Schwartz Athletic Center.

Long Island (3-3) snapped a 28-28 halftime tie with nine unanswered points to go ahead for good. Kotorobai, who made 5-of-8 from the three-point arc, canned a long-range jumper in that outburst, before **James Williams** converted a drive in transition to end the run.

The Blackbirds, who held the visitors scoreless over the opening five minutes and 31 seconds of the period, moved out to a 50-32 lead midway through the half. Williams, a freshman guard who had all 13 of his points after halftime, was fouled on a driving layup for a three-point play. **Raymond Edwards**, who had nine points and nine rebounds, scored in the lane to give his team an 18-point margin.

"We controlled the tempo in the first half," said Albany coach **Will Brown**, whose team shot 37.9% and committed 19 turnovers. "We have no room for error and in the first five minutes of the second half we turned the ball over and gave them second, third and fourth opportunities. We struggled to manufacture points, so we need to get a shot every time down the floor."

The contest went back and forth in the opening 20 minutes. **Levi Levine**, who scored a career-high 30 points on 10-of-20 shooting, and grabbed nine rebounds, hit a fastbreak layup for a 28-26 lead. **Esa Maki-Tulokas** made a follow shot as his team drew even with 12 seconds left before the break.

Albany (1-4) had two other players in double figures. Freshman **Jon lati** finished with a season-high 17 points, while **Aquawasi St. Hillaire** had 10. LIU's **Brandon Thomas** came off the bench to contribute 15 points and eight rebounds.

JON IATI NAMED AMERICA EAST BASKETBALL ROOKIE OF THE WEEK

Boston, Mass. – University at Albany's **Jon lati** has been selected as the America East Conference Rookie of the Week in men's basketball, as announced on Monday by the conference office. lati, a freshman guard from York, Pa., averaged 16.0 points and 2.5 assists in two games last week.

lati scored 13 of his season-high 16 points in the second half in last Friday's 68-62 victory over Army, as the Great Danes halted their longest losing streak since 1956. He also tallied 16 points and made 4-of-6 three-point field goal attempts in a 68-65 loss to Colgate on Dec. 2. lati, a first-team all-state scholastic player in Pennsylvania last year, is eighth among the conference scoring leaders at 13.8 points per game.

UALBANY PLAYERS ON SPORTS NETWORK MID-MAJOR ALL-AMERICA TEAM

Philadelphia, Pa. – Senior tailback **Gary Jones** (Ravena-Coeymans-Selkirk) leads a group of three University at Albany players who have been voted to The Sports Network's 2003 Division I-AA Mid-Major All-America Football Team. Offensive tackles **Mike Laroche** (Queensbury) and **Geir Gudmundsen** join Jones on the 27-player squad that was chosen by a panel of I-AA media and sports information directors.

Jones, who broke his own Northeast Conference single-season rushing record with 1,524 yards, and scored a league-leading 19 touchdowns, makes his second consecutive appearance on The Sports Network All-America squad. A two-time NEC offensive player of the year, Jones is sixth among the NCAA Division I-AA rushing leaders at 138.6 yards per game, plus is fifth in scoring (10.4 ppg). He broke or tied 12 school records this season, including career rushing yards (3,033), touchdowns scored (42) and all-purpose yards (3,639).

Laroche, a 6-foot-4, 280-pound senior, and Gudmundsen, a 6-foot-6, 315-pound junior, anchored an offensive line that helped Albany set an NEC and school single-season record with 3,215 rushing yards. The Great Danes, who are fourth nationally in rushing at 292.3 yards per game, were also second in the conference in total offense (377.1 ypg) and scoring (27.2 ppg). Laroche, a right tackle, and Gudmundsen, a left tackle, were each named to the All-NEC first team for the second straight year. Both linemen have made 33 consecutive starts.

Albany, N.Y. – **Malissa Burke** scored 14 of her 24 points in the second half to pace four players in double figures, as Colgate pulled away in the final period for an 85-67 non-league victory over Albany on Saturday afternoon at the Recreation and Convocation Center.

Colgate (5-1) led 49-48 in the final period, but then reeled off eight straight points. However, the Raiders would go back in front with 10 straight markers. Burke, who made 8-of-13 from the field, was fouled as she hit a driving bank shot that would cap that sequence.

"The difference was rebounding, we gave them too many second opportunities," said Albany coach Trina Patterson, whose team was handled on the glass, 52-32. "You will not win a lot of games being out-rebounded by that margin. Colgate is a high-scoring team, and we didn't do enough to slow them down today."

Albany, N.Y. – **Levi Levine** and **Jon lati** each had 16 points, as Albany held off Army, 68-62, as the Great Danes posted their first win of the season on Friday evening at the Recreation and Convocation Center. Albany (1-3) ended an eight-game losing streak that included the final five games of last season.

Army (3-3) rallied from an eight-point deficit with eight minutes remaining to close within 55-54 with 4:38 to play. **Bill Mohr**, who had nine points and seven rebounds off the bench, hit a pair of free throws and scored in the lane during that run, before freshman **Cory Sinning** canned a three-point field goal from the right corner.

"We paid attention to the scouting report, helped on their screens, and did a good job of getting each other into the flow on offense."

Albany jumped out to a 23-10 in the first half, as the Great Danes held the visitors scoreless for nearly eight minutes to start the contest. The Black Knights responded with 10 unanswered points. **Josh Wilson** made a jumper and two foul shots to ignite the run, before Sinning sank both ends of a one-and-one free throw opportunity to slice the deficit to 23-20.

JAMAR WILSON WILL MISS THE REMAINDER OF THE 2003-04 SEASON

Albany, N.Y. – University at Albany men's basketball standout Jamar Wilson will miss the remainder of the 2003-04 season, as announced today by Director of Athletics and Recreation Dr. Lee McElroy.

Wilson, the 2003 America East Conference Rookie of the Year, has three options following Thursday's consultation with Dr. Russell Warren, the New York Giants Team Physician and currently the Surgeon-in-Chief at The Hospital for Special Surgery.

Wilson, who fractured the lower end of his right patella or knee cap on Nov. 6, may have one of two surgeries, as recommended by Dr. Warren, or continue to use a non-operative method. A surgical procedure would either use screws to attach the bone or make use of a second option that would remove the bone fragment. If Wilson elects surgery, the rehabilitation period would last from six to eight weeks.

Dr. Max Alley, of Capital Region Orthopaedic Group and member of the UAlbany sports medicine staff, first confirmed Wilson's injury on Nov. 10. MRI results showed the right knee ligaments were normal and there was no meniscal or cartilage damage. Dr. Alley then prescribed a non-operative treatment; however, subsequent X-rays have not shown significant healing.

Dr. Alley, who has consulted with Dr. Warren during New York Giants Training Camp over the last eight years, then asked for the Giants Team Physician to examine Wilson's knee earlier this week.

Wilson, a 6-foot-1 sophomore, was the conference's second-leading scorer last year with an 18.9 average. He scored 20-plus points on 12 occasions, including a freshman record 39 points against New Hampshire.

ALBANY FALLS TO COLGATE, 68-65, IN NON-CONFERENCE ACTION

Hamilton, N.Y. – Sophomore **Alvin Reed** scored a career-high 26 points, and **Mark Linebaugh** made two key free throws with 9.5 seconds remaining as Colgate held off Albany, 68-65, Tuesday evening at Cotterell Court.

Colgate (2-2) snapped a 53-53 deadlock with seven consecutive points. Reed, who made 8-of-12 from the field, including five 3-pointers, converted a layup after a steal to put his team ahead. Linebaugh, who finished with 11 points, made two free throws and converted a fastbreak layup in the run.

The Raiders reversed a 36-32 deficit early in the second half by reeling off 14 straight points. **Howard Blue**, a 6-7 senior, had six of his 16 points in that stretch. Linebaugh and Reed drilled consecutive 3-point field goals to complete the outburst.

However, the Great Danes whittled away at the lead over the next eight minutes. **Aquawasi St. Hillaire**, who had career-highs with 13 points and 14 rebounds, made a bankshot to draw his team within 49-46. Wilson later connected on a spinning shot in the lane to tie the contest at 53 apiece.

"We didn't do what we needed to do in the stretch," Albany coach **Will Brown** commented. "We were not in sync with our youth and inexperience. They attacked us on the inside and were able to get easy baskets."

Freshman guard **Jon lati** led the Great Danes with 16 points, including four 3-point shots. **Levi Levine** added 15 points to extend his double-figure scoring streak to 18 straight.

"I am feeling better so I wanted to play," said Wilson, who had 13 points on 4-of-14 field goal attempts in 33 minutes. "It's a different level between playing in a game and practicing. I made some careless mistakes and there were a couple of shots I should have hit."

CAMACHO AND PARKS ON CoSIDA ACADEMIC ALL-AMERICA FOOTBALL TEAM Stamford, Conn. – University at Albany's Victor Camacho and David Parks have been named to the CoSIDA University Division Academic All-America Football Team. Camacho was a first-team selection, while Parks earned second-team honors. UAlbany joined Northwestern, Nebraska, Syracuse, Louisiana State, Pittsburgh and Dayton as programs with more than one student-athlete on the national squad.

Camacho, a senior inside linebacker from New York, N.Y., has a 3.79 cumulative grade point average in business administration/finance with a minor in sociology. He was ninth among the Northeast Conference leaders in tackles with 94, including 52 unassisted. Camacho, who was picked to the All-NEC second team, added two fumble recoveries, one interception and two sacks. He was twice named to the CoSIDA District I all-academic unit and has been a member of the NEC Academic Honor Roll for three years.

Parks, a senior defensive tackle from West Henrietta, N.Y., posted a 3.54 GPA in earning his B.A. in history with a minior in education last May. Parks, one of four Great Danes to receive first-team All-NEC recognition in 2003, made 37 tackles and led the team in sacks (7.5) and tackles for a loss (13.0). Albany is among the NCAA Division I-AA national leaders in rushing defense (8th), total defense (5th) and scoring against (12th). Parks was also a two-time CoSIDA District I selection and NEC Academic Honor Roll member.

Camacho and Parks are first pair of UAlbany football student-athletes to be voted to the national academic all-america team in the same season. J.T. Herfurth was a first-team offensive tackle in 2000, while roverback Ryan MacLean was chosen to the second team in 2002.

A student-athlete must be a starter or important reserve with a minimum 3.20 cumulative grade point average (on a 4.0 scale) to be nominated for the award. University Division incorporates all NCAA Division I-A and I-AA football programs.

GARY JONES NAMED NORTHEAST CONFERENCE PLAYER OF THE YEAR Nine UAlbany Players on NEC Football All-Conference Team

Somerset, N.J. – University at Albany's **Gary Jones** (Ravena-Coyemans-Selkirk) has been named the Northeast Conference Offensive Player of the Year in football for the second straight year, as announced today by the conference office. The Great Danes, who won a share of their second consecutive NEC championship, had nine players chosen to the all-conference squad.

Jones, a senior tailback from Ravena, N.Y., shattered his own NEC single-season rushing record with 1,524 yards, plus scored a league-leading 19 touchdowns. Jones, who established 10 school records this season, became UAlbany's all-time leader in rushing yards (3,033), all-purpose yards (3,639) and touchdowns scored (42). He is currently sixth among the NCAA Division I-AA rushing leaders at 138.6 yards per game, and is fifth in scoring (10.4 ppg). Jones is the second player in NEC history to win consecutive NEC offensive player of the year awards.

Senior right tackle **Mike Laroche** (Queensbury), junior left tackle **Geir Gudmundsen** and senior defensive tackle **David Parks** joined Jones on the All-NEC first team. Laroche (6-4, 280) and Gudmundsen (6-6, 315) earned first-team recognition for the second straight season. Each player has made 33 consecutive starts on the offensive line. Albany ran for an NEC and school record with 3,215 rushing yards, and is ranked fourth nationally at 292.3 yards per game. Parks, a second-team all-league pick in 2002, made 37 tackles and led the team in tackles for a loss (13.0) and sacks (7.5). The Great Danes are among the I-AA defensive national leaders in rushing (8th), total defense (5th) and scoring (12th).

UAlbany placed five players on the All-NEC second team. Senior fullback **Jon George** (Burnt Hills-Ballston Lake) and offensive lineman **Brandon Shaw** each made the second-team unit for the second year in a row. George rushed for 589 yards and four touchdowns, while Shaw started all 11 games at both center and left guard. Senior inside linebacker **Victor Camacho**, who was ninth among the conference leaders with 94 tackles, including nine hits for a loss, right guard **Tom Swicicki** (6-4, 290) and punter **Stan Zylinski** were also chosen.

NEC co-champions Albany and Monmouth each led the way with nine all-conference selections. The Hawks' **Joe Sentipal** was the league's top defensive player, while Monmouth's **Kevin Callahan**, a former UAlbany assistant coach, was the NEC Coach of the Year. The Great Danes finished with a 7-4 overall record, and reached the seven-win mark for the seventh time in the last eight seasons.
