A CHALLENGE TO INTERSORORITY TO DISPROVE THE NEWS' CHARGES
The State, Coblegak Naws has in two reven iswes com-
sidered at kength the new ruling of the lutersonority coturcil, the effect of which is to limit the number of new sororities which can enter its prokationary membership to two sentence intersiew given ont by the president of lntersororits, that hodly hats not replied to the charges made by this newspaper. The State Colleak News has no interest in the subject of sorority affairs except as it affeets the welfare of the College and the stuklent ludy. It has mo axe to grind; no motive to serve except what it helieves
to be the axe of the general student weliare. The Nows belieses that the Intersorority comeil is muwise in its ruling. It belieses that the comecil owes it to the College, as well as to its own members, to attempt to justiiy its action. The News, therefore, re-states its stand on the subject and asks that Imtersorority recognize publiely : student issue of importance.
The News asserts:

1. That the effect
