#### WILL BRAND NAMED NECC ROOKIE OF THE WEEK IN BASKETBALL

Rindge, N.H. -- University at Albany's Will Brand has been chosen as the New England Collegiate Conference Rookie of the Week (Nov. 23-29) in men's basketball. Brand, who earned the award for the second straight week, averaged 19.0 points and 8.5 rebounds in two games.

Brand, a 6-foot-4 freshman, netted 22 points, including 16 in the second half, and added 11 rebounds with four steals in last Saturday's 87-78 overtime victory against Molloy. He also posted 16 points and six rebounds in a 74-72 loss to Division I Arkansas-Little Rock on Nov. 23.

Albany, N.Y. -- Freshman Will Brand had 22 points and 11 rebounds, as Albany rallied from an 11-point deficit with six minutes left in regulation to post an 87-78 overtime victory over Molloy on Saturday afternoon at the Recreation and Convocation Center.

Molloy (1-3) built a 68-57 advantage with 6:06 remaining, but the Great Danes stormed back with 13 of the game's next 14 points. Petr Burda, who came off the bench to net a career-high 12 points, hit a three-pointer to slice the lead to 69-68, before Brand scored the go-ahead basket in the lane off Matthew Haggarty's lob pass.

Eric Schuh regained the lead for Molloy on a follow shot, but Albany's Burda canned another 3-point jumper from the left side to put his team up 73-71. Malcom Watson, who led all scorers with 24 points, and added 10 rebounds, forced overtime when he hit a driving layup with 3.1 seconds to play.

Albany (1-4) led all the way in the extra period. Dave Schloss, a 6-foot-11 freshman who had 11 points, 10 rebounds and six blocked shots, split a pair of free throws to give his club the lead for good. Burda was later fouled on a three-point attempt from the right corner, and he sank all three foul shots for a 77-73 lead. Todd Cetnar (Amsterdam H.S.) had 15 points and six assists, and converted 6-of-6 attempts from the line down the stretch.

"We went to a zone, and then a trapping defense to prevent them from getting to the basket," Albany coach Scott Hicks said. "(Dave) Schloss was exceptional, and Petr Burda gave us a big lift off the bench. This is a huge boost for our confidence; we have a young team which is learning how to win."

Molloy shot 55 percent from the field to move out to a 10-point lead in opening period, before settling for a 39-34 halftime cushion. The Great Danes came back to go in front at 55-53 in the second half, but the Lions regrouped with a 15-2 run to post their biggest lead.

Reginald Dorsey scored 20 points for Molloy, while Frank Wassenberg and Schuh each had 11. Haggarty was the fifth Albany player in double figures with 14 points.

Little Rock, Ark. -- Alan Barksdale had 28 points, including eight three-point field goals, and Maurice Bowie added 21 as Arkansas-Little Rock edged Albany, 74-72, on Monday evening at Barton Coliseum.

Albany (0-4) took a 55-52 lead on a three-pointer by Todd Cetnar, before Barksdale buried consecutive long-range jumpers to pull his team ahead. Matthew Haggarty, who tallied 17 points, drew the Great Danes even at 58 apiece with another three-point shot.

Arkansas-Little Rock (2-0) took the lead for good at 59-58 on Bowie's free throw, and later moved out to a 69-65 advantage on Barksdale's eighth 3-pointer. Haggarty, who hit 5-of-10 trifectas, canned another shot from beyond the 19-9 arc to close the gap to 69-68 with 4:03 remaining.

The Trojans, coach by former Alabama mentor Wimp Sanderson, used the free throw line to stretch its lead to 73-68. After a Will Brand basket made the contest a one-possession affair, Cetnar and Petr Burda both missed 3-point attempts in the last 36.4 seconds in an effort to force overtime.

"We played terrific for 40 minutes," said Albany coach Scott Hicks. "We had two open three-point looks in the last minute, and they just didn't go. We had a chance to win it. I am proud and satisfied with our kids performance. That was a very athletic and quick team, and we did a good job of taking care of the ball.

I am looking for hard work and improvement from this group, and I think our team grew up a lot over the last several days."

The Great Danes trailed 37-35 halftime to their Division I opponent, as freshman Joe Vukovic scored 15 of his season-high 17 points in the period. Brand, a 6-foot-4 forward, finished with 16, while Cetnar (Amsterdam H.S.) had 14.

Waltham, Mass. -- University at Albany's Michael Oliva has been selected as the Eastern Football Conference Offensive Player of the Week, while teammate Mike Grever won the EFC's weekly defensive award for their performances in Saturday's 25-24 come-frombehind victory over American International in the conference championship.

Eastern Football Conference Championship Albany 25, American International 24

Albany, N.Y. -- Junior quarterback Michael Oliva came off the bench to pass for three touchdowns and run for another score, as Albany rallied from a huge first-half deficit for a 25-24 victory over American International in the Eastern Football Conference championship game on Saturday at University Field. The Great Danes, who move to Division I-AA in 1999, captured their second straight EFC title, and finished the Division II era by winning 21 of their last 22 contests.

American International (7-4), the EFC's Bay State Division champion, looked liked it would easily avenge a seven-point loss to Albany in last year's championship by sprinting to a 24-0 lead early in the second quarter.

Tailback Kavin Gailliard, who rushed 38 times for 234 yards, broke two tackles around right end, and headed up the sideline on a 47-yard scoring run with 10:18 left in the second stanza to give the Yellow Jackets a commanding lead.

AIC, the nation's top-ranked offense, scored on its opening four drives. Quarterback Rick Hebert, who completed 15-of-22 passes for 246 yards, hit fullback Shawn Feeney with a seven-yard TD toss for a 7-0 lead. Gailliard, who set school records with 1,971 rushing yards and 23 touchdowns this season, reached paydirt on a 32-yard scamper, before Larry Moses kicked a 33-yard field goal for a 17-0 advantage.

Oliva, the championship MVP, was inserted in the second quarter, and immediately directed his club to the end zone. His one-yard sneak finished off a 66-yard drive, before a two-point pass failed. He then fired a 41-yard scoring bomb to flanker Greg Butryn, who made a diving grab just across the goal line with 2:25 left in the stanza. Deron Regev's PAT pulled the Great Danes within, 24-13, at halftime.

Albany (10-1), the EFC's Atlantic Division winner, used a 14-play, 87-yard march to get even closer early in the fourth quarter. Oliva, who connected on 5-of-8 attempts for 101 yards, and rushed for 22 more, flipped a two-yard TD pass to tight end Steve Checksfield to complete the six-minute-15-second drive. Running back Ben Kelcey's first-down run on fourth-and-two at the AIC 45 kept the scoring sequence alive.

The Great Danes were on the move again the next time they touched the ball, and used eight straight running plays to reach the AIC 22. Oliva, a 5-foot-10 signal-caller, used a play-action fake to throw a strike to Checksfield, who outleaped an AIC defender in the endzone for the go-ahead touchdown with 5:50 left. A two-point conversion attempt failed, and Albany had a 25-24 lead.

The Yellow Jackets, who amassed 527 total yards on the day, rode Gailliard's back down the field on its next possession, before Albany's defense stiffened at its own 26. With the championship on the line, and exactly one minute remaining, Moses attempted a 42-yard field goal, but his kick sailed wide left.

"When you dig a hole, there's usually a shovel nearby," said Albany coach Bob Ford, whose 1985 team came back from a 21-point halftime deficit to beat Plymouth State for the ECAC-North Division III crown. "I told the kids you just have to gradually work yourself out. We made some big plays, and our offensive line took over the line of scrimmage in the final quarter. This was gratifying because we were truly a team this season. You would be hard pressed to find any stars."

AIC's Dan Grant had five receptions for 134 yards, and established a single-season record with 997 receiving yards. Greg Garrett led Albany with 74 yards rushing on 15 carries, while Kelcey ran for a career-high 66. Starting quarterback Eric Williams passed for 71 yards, but was sacked twice.

### ALBANY PLACES FIVE PLAYERS ON ALL-CONFERENCE TEAM BOB FORD NAMED EFC COACH OF THE YEAR

Waltham, Mass. -- Linebacker Mike Grever and offensive tackle Jason Barra have been selected first-team All-Eastern Football Conference, and Bob Ford was chosen as the EFC Coach of the Year for the second straight season, as the conference office announced today.

Albany, the EFC Atlantic Division champion, had five players named to the all-conference squad. Cornerback Troy Rhett, free safety Fred Daughtry, and offensive guard Billy Van Jura were second-team selections.

Grever, a junior inside linebacker, is the team's leading-tackler with 113, and is the first player since 1987 to record 100-plus tackles in back-to-back seasons. Grever, who is making his second straight appearance on the All-EFC team, has 10+ hits in eight of 10 starts with three interceptions and six pass break-ups. Barra, a 6-foot-5, 280-pound lineman, blocked for an offensive unit which is ranked nationally in scoring (32.8 ppg) and is averaging 327.0 yards per game.

Rhett, who has 29 tackles and a team-leading five interceptions, is an All-EFC choice for the second consecutive year. Daughtry (74 tackles, 2 interceptions) and Van Jura, a 6-foot-1, 270-pound junior, were voted to the all-star unit for the first time.

Ford, the architect of the Albany football program since its formation at the club level in 1970, guided the Great Danes to their second straight EFC Atlantic Division crown, and a berth in the conference championship game. Ford, whose program has won 20 of its last 21 contests, has a 166-122-1 career record. He was the *Football Gazette* non-scholarship Division II national coach of the year in 1997.

Albany, N.Y. -- Todd Cetnar (Amsterdam H.S.) had 13 points and freshman guard Mike Everett came off the bench to score 12 in leading Albany to a 71-47 exhibition victory over Brock (Ontario) on Wednesday evening at the Recreation and Convocation Center.

Albany hosts Korabel (Ukraine) on Mon., Nov. 9, at 7:30, in preparation for the season opener on Nov. 14 at Division I Duquesne in Pittsburgh.

The Great Danes led 35-30 early in the second half, but then pulled away with seven straight points. Karim Ouattara, a 6-foot-7 freshman, hit a hoop in transition, before his steal resulted in Cetnar's fastbreak layup. Cetnar buried a three-point shot off an inbounds play to finish off that stretch.

Albany built a 14-point advantage in the first half, as Brock, who lost to Canisius, 76-56, the previous night, was limited to just 6-of-32 shooting in the period.

"It was a good team effort," said head coach Scott Hicks, who led Albany to a 19-8 record in his first season. "We were fundamentally sound on defense and offense, and moved the ball around to the open man."

Ouattara, who hails from Paris, France, finished with a game-high 15 rebounds to go with eight points. Mike Hurley led the Badgers with 15 points, while Tyler Bettridge added 14.
