McGinnis Backs Big **CSEA** Correction Officers' Program

ALBANY - The State Commissioner of Correction threw his support behind several key issues proposed at a recent meeting with the Special Correction Officers' Committee of the Civil Service Employees Assn. in Albany.

The meeting was also attended by Dr. Theodore C. Wenzl, CSEA president, and members of the CSEA staff.

One of the main items supported by Commissioner Paul D. McGinnis was a request by CSEA for the three-grade reallocation of uniformed Correction Officers.

Other agenda items taken up and the commissioner's feeling on them were:

RECRUITMENT of Spanishspeaking officers to deal with the large Spanish - speaking inmate population at the various institutions. McGinnish said adjustments in the height and weight requirements for Correction Officers was made necessary because most Puerto Ricans were small in stature and could not meet the former requirements. The commissioner said that there are 30 positions Spanish-speaking officers which will be distributed throughout the State. McGinnis noted, however, that applicants for these positions must pass the same written test as other entrants and also must take a qualifying oral test in which he must demonstrate his ability to speak Spanish.

DETERMINATION on appeal for food service manager and supervisors. The Commissioner stated the appeal was still pending.

CASH PAYMENT for overtime. McGinnis agreed there was a need for change in the overtime law and rules, but noted that there was nothing the Department could do because overtime fell within the realm of the Division of the Budget. 

move by the State Department of Social Services to shift the Department's Commission for the Blind and Visually Disabled from New York City to Albany without any advance notice or consultation with interested parties leaves the motives of that agency open to some serious questioning.

The employees involved, the Commision's board members, private agencies in this particular field both here and throughout the State and the Civil Service Employees Assn. have protested the planned action. Particularly being protested is the fact that the decision to move alledgedly was made without any open debate on the effects of such a move.

The Employees Association has asked Social Services Commissioner George K. Wyman to rescind the order and open immediate hearings on the issue. Certainly, the needs of so many handicapped people is foremost and any action affecting their well-being deserves open debate and the contributions of ideas from all interested persons and parties.

The basic question is "Why the secrecy?"

Decentralization Issues

The City's decision last week to decentralize its examining and hiring procedures is welcome evidence of a desire to improve the manner in which new City employees are sought.

The action will undoubtedly help to reduce the discouragingly long wait that now often exists between the time a person applies for a job and the time he actually begins

It may also help to make the job requirements and test questions more realistic for the positions open-since employees of the agencies which have the jobs will be directly involved in writing the axsm and hiring those who pass.

However, the decentralization decision seems one based more on the limited budget of the Department or Personnel than on the reasons mentioned. The examining and hiring process appears to be one of the areas in which decentralization is not necessarily more efficient or economical.

If the decentralization can be accomplished with existing personnel, there is no doubt that an improvement will have been made in the personnel-hiring process-but perhaps a better long-range answer would be to add to the Personnel Department staff.

Many politicoes are said to have moved swiftly to Humphrey because they felt they were not in strong with Sen. Robert F. Kennedy or his two leading supporters in the state, State Democratic Committee Chairman John Burns and county leader Jack English, of Nassau. These politicoes had earlier committed themselves to President Johnson rather than Senator Kennedy. After being adrift for awhile when the President announced he would not seek re-election, these men soon found a new home with Humphrey, knowing that he not only has the sponsorship of LBJ and national labor leader George Meany but also many of the country's top Senators, Congressmen and strong political State leaders.

Kennedy Holding Strong

Under the direction of John Burns and brother-in-law Stephen E. Smith, the Kennedy people are still holding strong in New York, although losing some ground with the entry of the Vice President and the persistent boring in on all levels by Sen. Eugene Mc-Carthy. Basically, however, Kennedy can be said to control the vast majority of delegates here as of this writing and the McCarthy troops, although coming up strong, are expected to throw their support to Kennedy if the Minnesota Senator loses his bid for the spot.

Despite the dilemma this triple political choice might make for some politicoes it is not really a problem for the hard core Kennedy disciples, even if Humphrey should take the nomination and the election. What is not generally known at this point is that Humphrey and Kennedy have such friendship and respect for each other that even so unexpected a thought as a Humphrey-Kennedy ticket is not as outrageous as it sounds. Should this happen, anybody who stays for Kennedy right down to the wire would be "protected" and this is particularly true for New York Democrats.

Let's assume, though, that Kennedy doesn't get the nod for either spot. Humphrey or any other Democrat desiring White House residence would seek the support of the New York Senator before that of any other top Democrat. The Senator's effectiveness as a campaigner, his capacity for attracting people, his strong personal organization, all these qualities he holds to a higher degree than any other single campaigner in either the Democratic or Republican

Kennedy's importance to the s so significant that the pros believe that if President Johnson were drafted and ran again he, too, would stop first at the Kennedy door to seek support.

Add to all this the fact that Kennedy is a man that has a deep concern for his friends and that he will still be the Democratic chieftan of New York State, no matter what happens in the Presidential sweepstakes. On the Federal level, appointments still need his approval and he can still declare a person "obnoxious" and have his Senatorial prerogative heeded. Civil Service Law & You

By WILLIAM GOFFEN



TENURE STATUTES entitle the civil service employee to a hearing upon charges of incompetency or misconduct to be held by the officer having the power to remove him or by a deputy or other employee designated to conduct a hearing. The deputy or other employee is required to make a record of the hearing for referral to such officer for review and decision.

JAMES WALLACE, a patrolman of the New York City Police Department, was dismissed by the Police Commissioner after a hearing held by a deputy police commissioner or trial commissioner. The trial commissioner summarized the evidence for the Police Commissioner and made findings and recommendations which the Police Commissioner approved. He ordered Wallace's dismissal. The dismissal was ordered months before any transcript of the testimony at the hearing was transcribed.

WALLACE INSTITUTED Article 78 proceedings (Wallace v. Murphy, New York Law Journal, April 24, 1968, page 1). As the determination to be judicially reviewed was made after a hearing required by statute, Special Term directed that the case be heard initially by the Appellate Division, The Appellate Division unanimously confirmed Wallace's dismissal. In cases of unanimous confirmance by the Appellate Division, there is no automatic right to appeal to the Court of Appeals. However, that Court granted leave to appeal.

JUDGE JOHN F. Scileppi writing for the unanimous Court of Appeals noted that the statute under which Wallace was dismissed (Administrative Code of the City of New York) does not require that a stenographic record be available to the Commissioner before he makes his decision. However the Jurist held that another statute (Laws of 1940, Chapter 834, Section 1) is controlling and requires the trial commissioner designated to conduct disciplinary hearings to make a record of the hearing for referral to the Commissioner before he reaches a determination. Although the statute uses the word "record" and not "stenographic record" the legislative intention was to require a stenographic transcript of the hearing and any exhibits to be referred to the Commissioner.

IN WEEKES v. O'Connell, the stenographic record of a revocation hearing held before a "hearing commissioner" of the State Liquor Authority was not transcribed prior to revocation of the license by the Authority. As Chief Judge Stanley H. Fuld observed in the Weekes case:

The mere availability of such a record tends to guarantee independent and informed appraisal of the proofs and the contention of the parties; the summary of the hearing officers, the litigants' briefs, if any, and other secondary, fallible guides may be checked against the primary, unchangeable reference.

JUDGE SCILEPPI, in reliance upon the Weekes case, directed that the proceeding be remitted to the Police Commissioner for appraisal of the entire record. The Judge did not mandate the extent of independent study required of the Commissioner, but, in the words of the Weekes case, stated that "the extent to which independent study of the evidence in the record is necessary to required exercise of informed judgment must be left to the wisdom and practical good sense of the commissioners themselves."

PRIOR TO his hearing, Wallace was confronted with a recording of a conversation which indicated his knowledge of a ferry toll collector's solicitation and acceptance of monies above the regular fare. The gravamen of the charge against Wallace was such knowledge, not necessarily collusion. Therefore, Wallace's contentions that there was no proof of collusion between him and the toll collector, that he was entrapped, and that he was deprived of a fair hearing, were held to be without merit. Nevertheless, the fact that the law required the making of a stenographic record of the hearing further necessitated that the hearing be transcribed and made available to the Police Commissioner together with any exhibits for his appropriate consideration before reaching a determination.



THE NEW MUSCLE is the Urban Coalition, a public opinion conglomerate which includes an almost unbeatable combination of big business, big labor, big city government, civil rights leaders, and national church groups.

LESS THAN a year old, the Urban Coalition is taking on assignments to apply its strength in attacking the basic causes of the urban crisis-bad housing, bad schools, lack of jobs, aimless and jobless youth, and the lack of municipal finances to make even a slight dent in the escalating problems.

THE CIVIL service corps has long been aware of the deepseated reasons for urban decay. The frustration evolved from civil service's inability to do very much about the complex of problems because elected officials hoped that "the problem would just go away and get lost."

INSTEAD OF disappearing, the problems just heated up into the spontaneous combustion of urban riots-110 of them in the 48-hour

period following the assassination of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr.

WHAT THE Urban Coalition proposes is a do-it-yourself confrontation of ghetto and racial problems, using the know-how of its members to develop programs that would take the heat out of a potentially combustible situation in every part of the United States.

THE COMMITMENT by big business and big labor to use its know-how and its combined financial and political power to get things done - primarily through the Federal government-is a new twist in lobbying.

AMONG DEDICATED civil service people who have wanted to correct a badly deteriorating set of conditions for years, the new allies give renewed hope for extricating the country out of the serious trouble into which it has blundered.

THE NEW full-time chairman of the national organization of the Urban Coalition is John W. Gardner, who until very recently was U.S. Secretary of Health, Educa-

Health Careers Get Top Billing At CC VIII

Community College VIII, to be opened by the City University of New York in 1969, will focus on preparation for health careers in two-year programs leading to genior college transfer, two-year programs leading to jobs, and adult education leading to advancement for health workers on the

A prospectus for the new college prepared by university staff was adopted by the Board of Higher Education at its regular monthly meeting last week. The chairman, Porter R. Chandler. said that specific plans will await the appointment of a president and faculty. Approval of the trustees of State University will now be requested since community colleges operate under the program of the State University.

"Focus on the health sciences," said Dr. Albert H. Bowker, chancellor of the university, "will enshle us to move ahead with a number of new ideas aimed at providing enough and improved medical care in the next decade. The metropolitan area between 1966 and 1975 is expected to need 14,000 nurses and 2,700 other professional and technical workers in addition to doctors, dentists, and optometrists.

"Hopefully Community College VIII will produce new recruitment and admissions procedures to develop new sources of talent; new educational components for the career-ladder idea: new courses, schedules, and evaluation to upgrade workers already committed to service in the health field, but trapped at low levels: and new patterns of cooperation with organizations in the City concerned with education health personnel."

While no site was recommended. the planning report indicated that locating the college near the new Lincoln Hospital in the South Bronx, as has been suggested, would meet criteria for site selection.

It is estimated that 30 to 40 percent of the students will be in transfer programs, including prepharmacy and pre-occupational therapy; 40 to 50 percent will be in health related career programs; and 20 percent in business career programs. In addition to preparing nurses, medical technologists, X-ray technicians, and medical records librarians, Community College VIII may add curriculums in medical instrument repair, en-Vironmental technology, and biomedical computer science if the demand justifies it.

Board's Budget Cut; Big Classes, Fewer **New Teachers Planned**

The Board of Education has announced plans to eliminate all after-school recreational grams, evening academic high schools and evening trade schools next fall. A cutback in the number of teachers hired to handle air throughout the school system an expected enrollment increase as pupil musicians and singers ap- of 22,000 pupils in the day school

The Board said, in addition, that it must increase the size of many classes and reduce expenditures for textbooks and supplies.

Alfred A. Giardino, president of -Philharmonic Hall, Lincoln the Board, explained that these moves are necessitated by the Mayor's announced \$141.6 million cut from the school system's budget request for the fiscal year beginning July 1.

Giardino expressed grave regret at the prospects of these major cuts. "The State Legislature and the City Administration must recognize that it does not make sense to expect to raise pupil achievement and at the same time fail to provide funds for improvement and even take away from the present program," he said.

Other aspects of the inadequate budget allowance will be restrictions on the school repair and maintenance program, reduction of the system's teacher-training program, and an increase in the number of teacher-assistants hired to help instructors handle class loads.

However, Giardino pointed out, despite the system's financial predicament, it will undertake some new measures to strengthen education in poor areas.

School Volunteers Help 100,000 Pupils

The New York City public school system is inviting the cooperation of the entire City in its search for 3,000 additional school volunteers. The recruitment drive has the enthusiastic support of the City's first family as well as of civic and community leaders throughout the five boroughs.

Mrs. John V. Lindsay is honorary chairman of the school volunteer recruitment drive.

Mayor Lindsay noted that school volunteers had contributed half a million hours to more than 100,000 pupils in the City school system, working with individual students in reading, assisting young people for whom English is a second language, helping teachers with classes in art, music, creative writing and drama.

K, 1st Grade Began Registration May 6

New York City's 609 elementary schools will register kindergarten and first-year pupils who will begin their schooling next Fall in a preliminary two-week enrollment period which started May 6 and continues through May 17.

Children who do not take advantage of the Spring enrollment dates will be registered for these classes in the traditional Fall registration period on September 4, 5 and 6.

Spring enrollment is encouraged by public school officials because early pupil registration permits better planning for September programs in the individual schools.

Children born in 1963 will be accepted for placement in kindergartens. Those born in 1962 will be placed in first grade, including also children born in January, 1963 who have had acceptable previous kindergarten experience in registered non-public schools.

Parents should accompany children at the time of registration and bring with them proof of the child's age and of vaccination. The current kindergarten registration is approximately 91,000 and first-grade enrollment is about 92,000.

Puipsl who expect to enter prekindergarten classes in the public schools in September will not be registered in the May 6-17 period. They will be registered in the Fall on dates to be announced.
