Classes of the school. Also it was resolved that the Commission's certificates issued to teachers under the system of uniform examinations as arranged by the department of Public Instruction be received as a satisfactory condition of admission.

The Chairman reported that in accordance with authority given to him at the last meeting he had obtained proposals for furnishing coal for the school. He received bids from the following dealers.

The contract was accordingly made with Mr. Charles M. Stuart, who furnished $406\frac{1}{4}$ tons of egg coal, and $12\frac{3}{4}$ tons of chestnut coal, amounting to $\$2015^{\underline{39}}$. The amount of coal was by agreement determined by the measurement of Captain Alexander Taylor.

The Committee on the Library reported progress in the work assigned to them.

The Committee on filtering the water supplied to the school reported, recommended

ing that a contract be made with the Albany Steam Trap Company to put in a filter of a capacity of thirty gallons per minute for six hundred dollars, and the extra expense of placing a supply in the front hall not to exceed one hundred and fifty dollars.

On motion of Superintendent Draper the subject was laid upon the table for future consideration.

President Waterbury reported in regard to the repairs of the roof, which had been effected within the appropriation designated by the executive committee.

The treasurer presented his annual report, which on his recommendation was referred to an auditing committee consisting of Dr. S. B. Ward and Mr. North, who were requested also to audit the treasurer's accounts for the year ending August 20th 1888.

The secretary reported that he had received through president Waterbury a letter from Mr. George W. Tradwell, notifying him that a box containing glass for the Alumni window was in his store, and suggesting that it be placed in the window. President Waterbury was directed to see Mr. Trad-

well and make such arrangement with him as seems desirable.

✓ ✓ Superintendent Draper presented a communication from Miss Bell in reference to her graduation from the Normal School in 1865 and asking that a diploma be now issued to her. On motion of Mr. Fryer the case was referred to the Chairman and President Waterbury with directions to report at the next meeting.

✓ President Waterbury called the attention of the executive committee to the provisions contained in Chapter 334 L. of 1888 in reference to instruction in industrial training. Without action the subject was left for future consideration.
