University at Albany's Center for Stress and Anxiety Disorders Receives \$351,000 Grant for Hypertension Study

ALBANY, N.Y. - Researchers at the Center for Stress and Anxiety Disorders at the University at Albany have received a \$351,000 grant for a study that could mean greater freedom from drugs for people who suffer from high blood pressure.

The two-year grant, from the National Heart, Lung and Blood Institute, is a follow-up to an earlier, pioneering project carried out in collaboration with research scientists in the Soviet Union. That study, conducted in 1984-88 involved the use of "thermal biofeedback" - an electronic relaxation technique that involves warming the hands and feet - and other drug-free forms of relaxation therapy to treat mild hypertension among American patients. The Soviets, meanwhile, used a method called "autogenic" training, a combination of relaxation, meditation and self-hynosis.

High blood pressure affects one in five adults in both the United States and the Soviet Union, and can lead to strokes, increased risk of heart attack, and heart and kidney failure if it is untreated.

The study found that both non-drug treatments could work in both cultures. But while both treatments produced significant, short-term decreases in mild hypertension, Soviet patients were much more successful in maintaining lower blood pressure readings than their American counterparts three months to one year later, according to Dr. Edward Blanchard, co-director of the Center for Stress and Anxiety Disorders and a Distinguished Professor of psychology at the University. At one year, Blanchard reported in the journal <u>Health Psychology</u>, 75 percent of the treated Soviet patients had diastolic blood pressures (DBP) of 90 millimeters of mercury (MM), while only 24 percent of American patients had comparable readings.

"We suspected that one reason for the disappointing maintenance results may have been that American patients practiced the relaxation trechniques less faithfully than Soviets," Blanchard said. "But all we had was anecdotal evidence. We'll be trying to get a better sense this time as to what's going on during the follow-up period."

In the new project, Blanchard and his associate, Peter Cornish, will also monitor the blood pressure of patients for 24 hours straight - a step which will give individuals a clearer sense of whether they actually suffer from hypertension.

"There have been questions raised in stress management treatment as to whether patients have really lowered their blood pressure, or whether they've just learned how to achieve lower readings while they're in the doctor's office," Blanchard explained. "If the readings are lower over a 24-hour period, then it's safe to conclude that blood pressure is really lower."

Blanchard and Cornish, a doctoral candidate in clinical psychology, believe that an individual's blood pressure does change during the course of the day, depending on one's activities.

To carry out their study, Blanchard and Cornish are seeking about 40 men and women ages 21 to 65 who either have mild hypertension (DBP of 90 to 105 MM) and are not taking anything for it, or who are currently taking drugs for high blood pressure and would like to eliminate them. Those who are accepted for the study will receive a physical at Albany Medical Center, then meet in

small groups to practice biofeedback techniques twice a week for eight weeks at the Center, which is located on Western Avenue near the University at Albany campus. Patients will have their blood pressure monitored for 24-hour periods both before and after the treatment program and again at a one-year follow-up. 

Center for Stress and Anxiety Disorders Studies Headaches in the Elderly

ALBANY, N.Y. - Wanted: individuals 60 years or older who suffer from recurring headaches.

With a growing proportion of elderly in the nation's population, scientists at the University at Albany are investigating new ways of helping older headache sufferers relieve their pain without drugs.

Earlier studies have found that the older a patient was, the more difficult it was to teach that individual to use "thermal biofeedback" - an electronic relaxation technique that involves warming the hands and feet - and other drug-free forms of relaxation therapy as a way of reducing headaches. But researchers at the University's Center for Stress and Anxiety Disorders are carrying out a new study that may challenge the results.

"We hope to show that older people can respond as effectively as younger people if the treatment is delivered carefully," said Nancy Nicholson, a doctoral candidate in clinical psychology who is carrying out the study with Dr. Edward Blanchard, co-director of the Center.

The study, now under way, features a more flexible, "building block" approach to the way in which older people are taught to use biofeedback and other forms of relaxation therapy. While Nicholson has kept the same number of sessions as younger headache sufferers, she has lengthened them by one-half hour, providing for a more leisurely learning pace. Older patients also receive some information by audiotape.

While headaches generally tend to decrease with age, 14 percent of women over 60 and seven percent of men over 60 continue to suffer from headache, Nicholson said.

"Since this is the fastest growing segment of our population, the study takes on growing importance," said Nicholson, a migraine sufferer herself as an adolescent and a nurse for 20 years before deciding to pursue a career in behavioral medicine. "Second, this the elderly are often subject to other health problems that require other drugs, it could help reduce the potential for side effects from multiple drug use."

Many clinicians - and lay people as well - believe incorrectly that older people "are just supposed to live with their aches and pains," Nicholson added.

To complete the study, Nicholson and Blanchard are seeking 12 to 15 men and women 60 years or older who suffer from either tension or migraine headaches. Participants will first be examined by a neurologist and then be asked to maintain "headache" diaries for either one or three month, followed by 12 treatment sessions of one to one-and-one-half hours for eight weeks. Following the treatment, all will be asked to keep their "headache" diaries for an additional month.
