The drive for enactment of the FORAND BILL moved into high gear, picking up major support from within the medical profession as the House Ways and Means Committee neared a vote on the AFL-CIO backed measure to provide medical care for the nation's older citizens.

Dr. Basil MacLean, former president of the National Blue Cross Association, and Dr. E. M. Bluestone, professor of hospital administration at Columbia and NYU declared that the "sheer humanity" of the bill "far outweighs" the misguided and illadvised opposition of the AMA and the insurance industry.

As support for the measure mounted, reports persisted that the Eisenhower Administration, spurred by political considerations involved in Vice Pres. Nixon's presidential bid, was considering an election-year-about-face on medical insurance legislation.

While your congressmen seem to favor this vital legislation to care for our aging citizens, they want to hear from the public whom they feel strongly desire this kind of a bill.
