

File your claim the next day after you finish work on your job. Delay in filing your claim after that time will cost you your benefits until you do.

Where to File Claim If you are a Schenectady resident, file your initial claim at the Unemployment Insurance Office located in the State Armory on Washington Avenue. After that, you will probably conduct further requirements at the regular office at 331 State Street. If you live out of Schenectady, apply at the USES office in your own community.

Office Hours

Mr Filkins, manager of the Unemployment Insurance Office in Schenectady has told the editor of the Electrical Union News that although the regular office hours will be 8 am to 5 pm, the office will remain open after 5 as long anothere are people to be taken care of.

Waiting Period Benefits are not payable for the first four "effective days" after filing your first claim in

the benefit year. Extended waiting and suspension periods are imposed for loss of employment due to voluntary quits without good cause, misconduct, strikes or lockouts, etc. Be sure to file a claim as soon as you are unemployed.
