## Establishing Local Chapters of the Society of Indian Psychologists

This proposal is respectfully submitted to the Society of Indian Psychologists Council of Elders by Jacque Gray for consideration this 6<sup>th</sup> Day of April 2009.

This change is proposed to help inform students about the Society of Indian Psychologists (SIP), recognize connection and mentoring by American Indian/Alaskan Native (AIAN) psychologists around the country, provide for regularly scheduled meetings, speakers, research opportunities, educational opportunities, emotional support and mentoring of students through the process of becoming an AIAN psychologists and professionals.

It is believed that this change would provide:

- 1. Increased awareness of SIP,
- 2. increased membership in SIP,
- 3. increased awareness of AIAN student opportunities,
- 4. inclusion of clinical, counseling, and school psychology graduate and undergraduate students.
- 5. inclusion of Chapters at Tribal Colleges with psychology students and Universities with graduate programs in psychology,
- 6. inclusion of faculty interested in the success of AIAN students, and

1. A SIP member as an advisor,

2. At least 2 AIAN students,

3. Approval of the SIP Executive Council to establish the Chapter.

The Society of Indian Psychologists establishes that Colleges and Universities may apply to begin a Chapter of the Society of Indian Psychologists at their educational institution to provide education, mentoring, training, and research opportunities to American Indian/Alaskan Native Students.
