

#### A HISTORY OF THE CRIMSON AND WHITE IV.

Since the early 1900's Milne stud-ents have published five times a year, and later quarterly, a magazine called the Crimson and White. This magazine was put out by an organized staff of students and contained such items as the running of important events, the activities of societies, and organizations, and student literature.

In 1931 journalism was established in Milne, and the quarterly magazine was changed to be semi-annual, the Christmas Literary issue, and the Senior issue, or yearbook, and in addition a weekly mimeographed newspaper we inaugurated. Both publications retained the name, Crimson and White, until, for the sake of more distinction, in 1939, the magazine was renamed Bricks and Ivy.
